



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## -Vandals vs. Vandalism-

The bovine-conscious element at the State College of Washington is apparently at it again. Or, perhaps, scatter-brained Idaho students painted the big "W" on the Idaho stadium scoreboard. Who did it is not important. The fact that either school could harbor such infantile intellects should prevent either of them from hurling the phrase, "Cow College!" across the line at the other.

One can easily classify the type of students who did the defacing, whether they came from Washington State to stir up resentment in Idaho or whether they came from Idaho to stir up resentment against Washington State. They were the kind of students who take delight in tearing down the carefully-nurtured cooperation between the schools. Probably their high school mates regarded them as being outstanding wits. One is half inclined to agree with the class mates. Colleges are liberally sprinkled with sophomoric seniors. Idaho students, at least, may be expected to ignore the efforts to revive the old destructive spirit between the schools no matter which side started them. Revenge never contributes anything to growth, and the hollow victory of superior destruction is distasteful to all but the old rah-rah students of a bygone day. Idaho-Washington State rivalry is not dead. It will be revived again Saturday on Rogers field in Pullman, and the rivalry will be no less intense because it is not accompanied by a paint brush school spirit. Both schools count on the fundamental sanity of their student bodies to maintain intelligent relations despite the occasional vagaries of their sophomorons. If sanity becomes outnumbered, perhaps the schools could erect a joint structure on the state line which their infantilects could daub whenever they pleased.


