# Vandal Stock Mounts After Utah Triumph

It will be a temporary suspension of the Armistice when University of Idaho Vandals entangle Washington State college's Cougars, Saturday in their annual grid-iron warfare at Rogers field in Pullman. The Vandals and Cougars have met 41 times since their grid relations started in 1893. Idaho has defeated the Staters 13 times compared to 28 wins for the Cougars. Two games have ended in ties.

With the Vandals coming up in every game, and the crimson and gray eleven, apparently hitting the down grade in each tussle, judging from their 38 to 0 trouncing by Oregon last week, the Bankmen show strong possibilities of knocking over their cross state foe, Idaho has not defeated the Cougars since 1925 and have not been able to cross the Staters' goal line since 1933.

"We are greatly improved after Saturday's game," Coach Ted Bank said last night. "Our tackling is much better and the team is running a lot harder. The squad's pass defense tightened for the first time this season against the Aggies last week. Pass offense is still weak, however."

**Plan One Scrimmage**  
Smoothing out plays headlined the practice tactics for the Vandals last night. Offense and defense scrimmage will be held tonight. Only one scrimmage will be held in practice this week. Pass offense and defense will be stressed in drill Wednesday and Thursday nights. A chalk talk will be held for the Vandals Friday.

Headlining the injury list is Harold "Bull" Durham, fullback who injured his leg Saturday and is definitely out of the game for this week-end. His loss will be a severe blow to the Vandal backfield. Italo Caccia, center, sprained his ankle in the Utah State clash and his appearance Saturday is doubtful. Joe Harrell is suffering from a bruised ankle but will be ready for Washington State. Chac Anderson, who has been nursing an injured knee, may be ready for Saturday's game.

Idaho's line stock took a decided jump yesterday with the return of Leonard Zenkevitch and Tony Kamelevicz, both guards. Tony has been nursing a knee injury since the start of the season and will probably be ready for action again by Saturday. Zenkevitch injured his back in scrimmage two weeks ago and has been kept from the lineup, but will probably be ready by game time.

**Vandals Wallop Aggies.**  
Showing a complete reversal from that of the last month University of Idaho bounced back into the win column last Saturday with a stirring 19 to 7 win over the Utah State Aggies. Idaho displayed a different brand of football than the fans have seen all season when they pushed across three touchdowns, one in each of the second, third, and fourth quarters.

Greatly improved on offense and pass defense, the Vandals revealed one weakness, the right side of the line. It was there that Bill Whitesides, Aggie end, broke through to block two of Stoddard's punts and one conversion try. Utah State's lone score came as the result of Whiteside's blocking one of Stoddard's kicks at the start of the third quarter. Seth Maughan picked up the ball on the Vandal 22 and scooted across the goal line.

Schedules for six minor sports and varsity track and field for the forthcoming year have been announced by Dean T. S. Kerr, head of the University athletic committee.

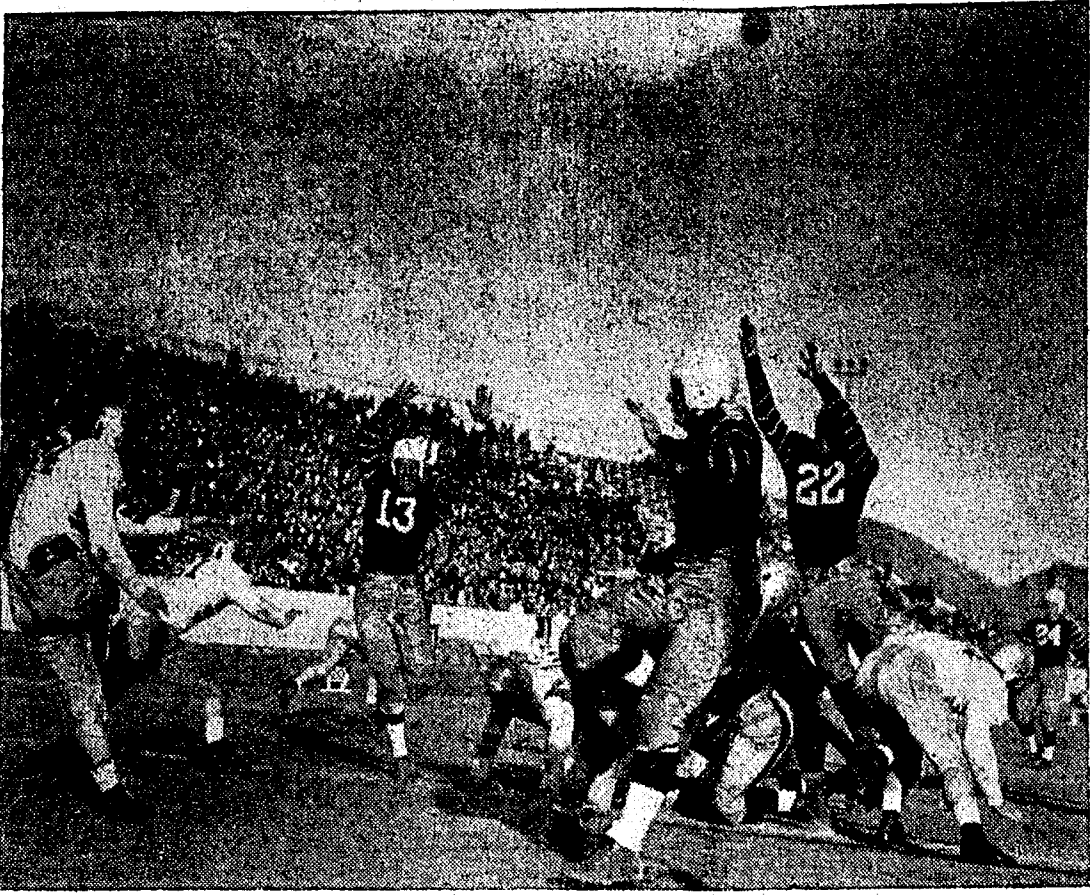

Only in the closing rush was Robert Dwyer able to beat off the challenge of Bob Emmick and Jim Monroe of the Missionaries. After the first three places, Idaho runners finished in a group to monopolize the next four positions.

Although Dwyer gets credit for winning the race, Bob White and Lemar Chapman of the Idaho freshmen finished ahead of him. Idaho's freshmen were racing the Whitman yearlings, but as Whitman failed to finish a complete team no score was kept. Next meet on the cross country docket is the all-important test with the strong Washington State team at Pullman next Saturday.

# Pricemen Blast Pups In Bruising Battle

Idaho's freshmen football team defeated Gonzaga frosh 8-6 last Friday afternoon, but the Pricelings showed enough spirit to win 40-6. The 600 spectators who watched the smashing Babes rip holes through Spokane's forward wall were probably not concerned with the figure side of the game. It was more fun to see alert ends and

Gonzaga received and moved the ball up to the 40 before the play was stopped. A series of punts by both sides took up most of the quarter. Idaho gained the best of the deal, keeping the Pups well back in their own territory. A frosh kick into the Gonzaga end zone started all the Bullpups' troubles and the winning margin for the frosh.

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
