



Naturally, he didn't think too much of you if you wrote news for a newspaper. That is easy. It consists only in jotting down what people do and not much about why they do it. If you knew Mr. Schuldt and wrote news, you did it because it was easy. You didn't feel very well when you talked to him, because he knew you didn't go down deep in people and bring up something because it is hard. You kept trying to tell him you would do it later when you had more time. He never said much, but you knew he thought there wasn't much time. Now he has proved it.

You ought to be relieved when someone like that is gone. Everybody knows somebody who makes him feel uncomfortable because he isn't doing his best. You ought to feel happier when he is gone, because now there is one less to keep pulling you up where the job is hard. It should be easier now to slip down where the job is easy and learn your facts and make your grades and quit worrying about people. You should be relieved, but somehow, you aren't.

It's funnyabout a newspaper office. You try to write an editorial because you knew him best, but the words don't come. The typewriter that used to be a part of you becomes something foreign and mechanical, and the thoughts stop before they get to the keyboard.

Then somebody comes in and says to you, "Say, did you get the story on Schuldt?"

And you say, "Yeah, we got it."

Communique Comment

The economic situation in the Balkan states may have an important bearing on the moves made by Hitler and Stalin in the near future. In Rumania, Hungary, Bulgaria, Greece and Jugoslavia the British and French have been on the offensive economically—in the past three months; and Germany may send her troops into Rumania to check British and French economic penetration by the use

The Balkan nations—small, weak, predominantly agricultural—depend upon Germany as the biggest market for their produce and the source of their manufactured goods. This has been the situation in the past, at least. Now the British and French are taking important markets away from the Germans, in the Balkans, by paying solid cash for Balkan products and selling manufactured goods to the Balkan peoples at reasonable rates.

The Germans have a difficult time trying to combat the British and French in their efforts to make the Balkan area a British-French hinterland. For one thing, the Germans have no cash; for another, they do not have a large quantity of manufactured goods to pay for Rumanian oil and Hungarian wheat on a barter basis.

It is known that the Germans are massing troops on the Hungarian-Slovakian frontier. These troops are ready for a quick raid into Rumania across Hungarian Ruthenia. Hitler may decide that an invasion of Rumania and a division of that country (and later the entire Balkan region) between Germany and the U.S.S.R. is the only way to keep southeastern Europe within the Reich's sphere of economic influence.

Such a move on Germany's part would give the final push to the shaky props that now hold up the Berlin-Rome alliance. Mussolini has the Pope behind him in his determination to keep the Balkans out of the clutches of the Russian Bear and the Nazi Stormtroopers. It may be that Britain and France wil get Il Duce over on the Allied side without any bribes or promises—once the German troops march across Hungary into Ru-
