.. Classroom Panhandling ...

Students who head the informative talks given by Dr. T. Z. Koo in various classes on the campus, were somewhat amazed at the near panhandling methods employed by the smiling little oriental, especially in his morning appearances.

The plight of Chinese students is undoubtedly sad. as vividly pictured by Mr. Koo, but to adopt a moneyraising campaign which stops just short of passing the hat in college classrooms, seems slightly out of place, as well as contrary to university rules.

True, Mr. Koo did not actually pass his skull cap among students, but his appeal for money was no less real than a street-corner plea for price of a cup of coffee. It was a heart-rending appeal directed at student poc-

Americans are more than willing to help a worthy cause. Usually, they are so sympathetic to the hardluck stories of foreigners that many an equally worthy home cause is neglected.

Many a student in the University of Idaho is forced by lack of funds to quit school. Many another potential student never finds his way here because of financial difficulties. Yet, a speaker who took up a classroom hour in their behalf, and used such methods as employed by the eminent Mr. Koo, would be tossed out on his brazen ear.

Somehow, the foreigner can make his story more real. His pitiable tale is more impressive to a sympathetic, gullible American. The courageous Finn, fighting insurmountable odds, and the stolid, patient Chinese student, reading in a mud hut, are pictures which play on our charitable natures. They make us forget the old adage, "Charity begins at home."

We have some problems right here which could use the missionary zeal of some American Mr. Koo. Many students are poring over their books past the midnight hour. Many athletes need help.

But suppose some member of the athletic department, or some interested student, circulated among college classrooms and made such a plea. He'd probably be packed out on a stretcher by some of his needy constituents!

Communique Comment

Belgium and the Netherlands are now putting their armies and civilian populations on a war basis. The continued massing of German troops near the Dutch and Belgian frontiers—and the rumor that these forces are being made ready for a swift dash to the Dutch ports on the North sea—is giving government officials t The Hague and Brussels some anxious moments.

Dutch authorities claim that they can check the German advance, for a time at least, by the flooding of wide areas in the center of the country. The recent cold weather in northern Europe has frozen the Dutch canals and rivers, but the Netherlanders assert that their flooding system will not be affected by the low temperatures and the surface of ice on the waterways. The Dutch army appears to be in a state of complete readiness for the German "blitzkrieg".

The Belgians have rallied behind King Leopold, who has taken personal command of the armed forces of the nation—as his father did when the Germans invaded Belgium in August, 1914. The Little Maginot line which the Belgians have built along their eastern frontier is considered to be of substantial strength. The Belgians had the assistance of the foremost French military enmeers when they planned the fortifications. The Bel-

Britain will strike quickly if the Nazi leaders move their war machine into the Netherlands. The British are determined to keep the Dutch ports on the North sea out of the hands of the German navy and air force. German submarines operating out of Rotterdam or Amsterdam would be a decided menace to British shipping in the channel; German bombers could reach London in a comparatively short time from bases on the Dutch coastand they could be protected by pursuit planes acting as a convoy against British attack. The hop across the North sea is a bit too long for the German pursuit planes operating out of the Nazi air bases on the Helgoland Bight.

- - Classroom Panhandling - -

Students who head the informative talks given by Dr. T. Z. Koo in various classes on the campus. were somewhat amazed at the near panhandling methods employed by the smiling little oriental, especially in his morning appearances.

The plight of Chinese students is undoubtedly sad. as vividly pictured by Mr. Koo, but to adopt a moneyraising campaign which stops just short of passing the hat in college classrooms, seems slightly out of place, as well as contrary to university rules.

True, Mr. Koo did not actually pass his skull cap among students, but his appeal for money was no less real than a street-corner plea for price of a cup of coffee. It was a heart-rending appeal directed at student poc-

Americans are more than willing to help a worthy cause. Usually, they are so sympathetic to the hardluck stories of foreigners that many an equally worthy home cause is neglected.

Many a student in the University of Idaho is forced by lack of funds to quit school. Many another potential student never finds his way here because of financial difficulties. Yet, a speaker who took up a classroom hour in their behalf, and used such methods as employed by the eminent Mr. Koo, would be tossed out on his brazen ear.

Somehow, the foreigner can make his story more real. His pitiable tale is more impressive to a sympathetic, gullible American. The courageous Finn, fighting insurmountable odds, and the stolid, patient Chinese student, reading in a mud hut, are pictures which play on our charitable natures. They make us forget the old adage, "Charity begins at home."

We have some problems right here which could use the missionary zeal of some American Mr. Koo. Many students are poring over their books past the midnight hour. Many athletes need help.

But suppose some member of the athletic department, or some interested student, circulated among college classrooms and made such a plea. He'd probably be packed out on a stretcher by some of his needy constituents!

Communique Comment

Belgium and the Netherlands are now putting their armies and civilian populations on a war basis. The continued massing of German troops near the Dutch and Belgian frontiers—and the rumor that these forces are being made ready for a swift dash to the Dutch ports on the North sea—is giving government officials at The Hague and Brussels some anxious moments.

Dutch authorities claim that they can check the German advance, for a time at least, by the flooding of wide areas in the center of the country. The recent cold weather in northern Europe has frozen the Dutch canals and rivers, but the Netherlanders assert that their flooding system will not be affected by the low temperatures and the surface of ice on the waterways. The Dutch army appears to be in a state of complete readiness for the German

The Belgians have rallied behind King Leopold, who has taken personal command of the armed forces of the nation—as his father did when the Germans invaded Belgium in August, 1914. The Little Maginot line which the Belgians have built along their eastern frontier is considered to be of substantial strength. The Belgians had the assistance of the foremost French military engineers when they planned the fortifications. The Belgian army is almost completely mobilized.

Britain will strike quickly if the Nazi leaders move their war machine into the Netherlands. The British are determined to keep the Dutch ports on the North sea out of the hands of the German navy and air force. German submarines operating out of Rotterdam or Amsterdam would be a decided menace to British shipping in the channel; German bombers could reach London in a comparatively short time from bases on the Dutch coast and they could be protected by pursuit planes acting as a convoy against British attack. The hop across the North sea is a bit too long for the German pursuit planes operating out of the Nazi air bases on the Helgoland Bight.


