

Idaho Finishes Against Ducks Tonight, Wednesday

Team Expects Oregon To Be At Peak

When the thrice-victorious Vandals clash with the national champion Oregon Webfeet tonight and tomorrow night in Memorial gymnasium at 7:30 o'clock, they will be up against the strongest collegiate team on the Pacific coast and perhaps in the nation, believes Forrest Twogood, Vandal mentor.

"Realizing they have to win all of their remaining games to retain the northern division championship title, the Ducks will shoot the works against us," said Coach Twogood. "We have improved a lot since first meeting them early in the season, but they also have been fast developing into a better club."

Vandals Defeat WSC.

Captain Roy Ramey's two push shots, Chick Atkinson's sneaker in the court corner, and Rook Hilton's sixth straight foul shot of the evening, brought the Vandals from behind to victory over WSC in the last few minutes Saturday.

Even forward Gebert's lace-destined long shot, in the air as the final gun sounded, could not save the game for WSC.

Score Tied Often.

The first half saw the game tied twice at four and eight, with Idaho setting the pace for the first score-lead. Cougar center Jack Jennings led the Staters to a second tie, and Ron Harris and Rook Hilton met the eight count only to see the Cougars jump to a 19-13 half-time lead.

Howitzers by Bill Chase and short heaves by Bud Olson advanced the count to 24-19 in the second period, but at the half-way mark Idaho had knotted the score. Hilton's foul shot off Gebert with eight minutes to go gave the Vandals a lead that lasted only a minute as Jennings and Johnny Hooper pushed the State score up to 29.

Ramey's two rapid pushers started a Vandal spirit that put them in front for keeps.

Coach Twogood said he was pleased with the work of the entire team. He pointed out, however, that Idaho had to win the hard way, after missing shots engineered by deceptive work the first half.

However, he hoped his squad had improved in proportion to the Teachers. Center Fred Quinn kept Idaho well in the lead from the opening gun during the deciding Pullman contest. The halftime lead established by the yearlings of 27 to 10 was based on several points he contributed. When the youthful Cats started to creep up during the closing minutes, Quinn was good for a few more counters, his total of 17 winning scoring honors.

Idaho varsity men are delaying their selections until after tonight and tomorrow night's games with Oregon. Coach Forrest Twogood has put off naming his candidates for an "all-division team" until the same time.

Coach To Handle Minor Teams

Coach Bob Tessier, will have more than his hands full when he departs Friday morning for the northern division minor sports meet at Seattle. He will have the swimming, wrestling, and fencing teams in his charge.

The meet is the annual northern division conference championships which will pit Oregon, Oregon State, Washington, Washington State, and Idaho against each other. Montana will be represented with only a few swimmers in the various water events.

The Vandal water crew will enter men in the medley relay, free style relay, 100-yard dash, 50-yard dash, and the 150-yard back stroke. Tessier was undecided yesterday which men he will use in these particular events.

The fencers are holding an elimination tourney among themselves, to determine who will make the trip. They have not yet made out the traveling list.

Ryan Gives Report On Radio Finances

Trainer Mike Ryan today issued a financial report on the funds he has been collecting to pay for the training quarters radio. The portable electric and battery set was purchased for \$25, and a goal of \$35 was set so that an extra set of batteries and tubes would be on hand for future years.

To date \$28.40 has come in. Football players have led the contributors to date with \$8.25. They are closely followed by the track team with \$7.55. Coaches and managers are the next best contributors with \$4.50 and \$2.70.

The basketball and boxing teams gave \$1.80 each, and the gymnasium janitors \$1. Half a dollar has come from the military department and 15 cents each from wrestling and baseball.

If travel is broadening, Idaho's battlers of the squared ring will have plenty of education when the current fist-cuff campaign draws the curtain on another successful season for the Vandal scrappers.

Starting with the Northwest Intercollegiate Boxing Tournament, slated for the camp of the Vandals on March 7 and 8, Coach Louie August's team will face representatives of the best boxing teams in the nation in less than a month. Carded for Idaho are three important tournaments where the Vandals will face anywhere from one to six men, and two dual meets.

A team of eight fighters will board a train on the night of March 12, and they won't be back on the Idaho campus until March 28. The Vandals will arrive in Sacramento, home of the Pacific Coast boxing championships, on the morning of March 14, and they will meet the cream of the Far West's boxers in the two-day tournament there. March 16 and 17 will be spent in California's capital city, and on the night of the 17th, the Gem state contingent entrains for Chicago. On the 23rd they will meet the national champion University of Wisconsin pugns in a dual meet, the first between the two colleges. On March 24 the Vandals will arrive in Grand Forks, N. D., for a dual card with the University of North Dakota fighters on the next night, March 26 they start the trek back to Moscow, but with the start of the spring holidays on the last day of the month, the team will leave again for Sacramento, this time to do battle in the national championships on April 4, 5, and 6 against the nation's best. A very tough assignment for any team.

Conley Takes First In Ski Meet

Phil Conley, university freshman, copped top honors in the second annual Inland Empire ski tournament at Tollgate, Ore., Sunday. He finished more than five seconds ahead of his nearest competitor, Bob Frisque, Yakima, in the combined times.

Conley won both events in the senior division. His time of 1:01.5 in the slalom race bettered Frisque's time by three seconds and his :49.6 dash in the senior downhill event was a half second better than Teammate Hans Windbauer's.

The races started about one-half mile above the timberline and the steep part of the run had a .65 per cent grade for about one-fourth of a mile. Vandal skiers competing in the tournament were Conley, Windbauer, Martin Marquard, Sykes Gilbert, and Phil Remakius.
