Merry Christmas— Hung Jury Causes Case Dismissal The state dropped its involuntary manslaughter charges against Walton Unness of Chicago and Edward Vrabel of Trenton, N. J., and the two former university students were freed Friday after spending 11 weeks in the Latah county jail following an accident in which two Washington State college women were killed.

County prosecutor Murray Estes contended in a motion filed in district court that the state had insufficient evidence on which to retry Unness and Vrabel or on which to continue charges against the pair. District Judge A. L. Morgan granted the motion last Friday night.

Case Widely Publicized Unness and Vrabel were the center recently of one of the most widely publicized cases to be tried here in recent years. The state sought to convict them of criminal negligence, which the prosecution contended was responsible for the deaths of two Pullman women, Ruth Hewitt and Wilma Jennings, on a county road three miles southeast of here September 22.

The women had been passengers in a car which Vrabel owned and which Unness was driving at the time of the tragedy. After two days of presenting evidence in a courtroom that was packed until all standing room was gone, the case went to the jury. Ten hours of deliberation proving fruitless, the jury which had been evenly divided for and against conviction was discharged.

Plaintiff Receives Final Verdict 'n Mock Trial

Nine Man Jury Reaches Decision In Case Friday Night

A nine man jury Friday night returned a verdict for \$460.10 in favor of the plaintiff closing the case of Doane versus Barrett. The mock trial, sponsored by the bench and bar, climaxed weeks of preparation by students in the college of law.

Friday night's session convened at 7:30 in Henry Fulton's court room, Administration building, room 311. The defense opened their case by putting William Barrett, defendant, on the witness stand. Witnesses supporting his case were Bob Copple, Martin Huff, Bill Langley, Dave Pace, and Melvin Alsager.

Love Seeks First Jarvis Lowe made the first argument to the jury for the plaintiff, followed by Pete Leguineche for the defense. Rebuttal argument was made by Irving Bennion. The case then went to the jury after instructions from acting Judge Henry Felton, a Moscow attorney.

Because of a short panel, the case was tried with a nine-man jury. Most of the jury members were freshmen in the college of law. They were Curt Clark, Fred Konda, Henry McQuade, Sennett Taylor, Vern Kidwell, Irvin Alterwein, George Burson, Don Holm, and Dick Akers.

Seniors Defend Seniors in law who participated in the trial as defense attorneys were Alberta Morton, Richard Greiner, Bob Cole, Pete Leguineche and Clifford Dobler. Attorneys for the plaintiff, also seniors, were George Phillips, Irving Bennion, Robert Pritchard, Jarvis Lowe and Bob Alexanderson.

Juniors in law were witnesses and filled other court posts. Leslie McCarthy was the sheriff; Weston Abbott, bailiff; Rei Kihara, court reporter; and Bernice Bacharach, clerk.

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Pullman Calls Delta

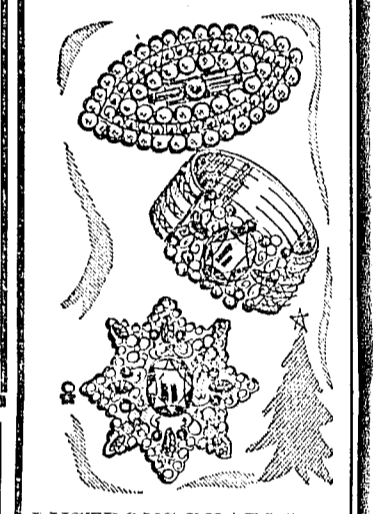

Idaho's barnstorming basketball team met its first defeats of the season Friday and Saturday nights when North Dakota State's Bison edged them 45 to 44 at Fargo, and the University of Minnesota Gophers outscored them 32 to 26 at Minneapolis.

"Birds" and fowls were responsible for bringing a comparatively dull "shooting match" to a frenzied finish at the Minnesota field house Saturday night, according to Bernard Swanson, Star Journal sports reporter. Officials called 19 fouls on Minnesota and 16 on the Vandals. Many of the loyalists deserted the Gophers to the support of the Vandals as they felt the Idahoans were being treated a bit roughly. Both the Vandals and the Gophers converted 10 free throws. Idaho had much the advantage in height, but the Gophers more than made up for that deficit by their speed. Hilton and Turner fouled early in the game.

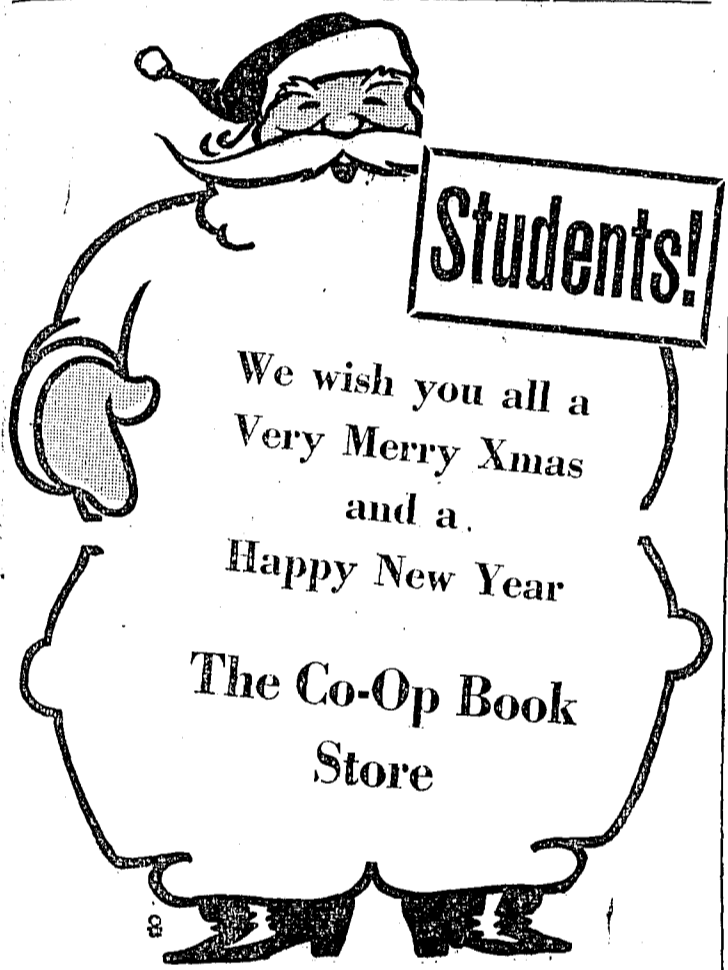

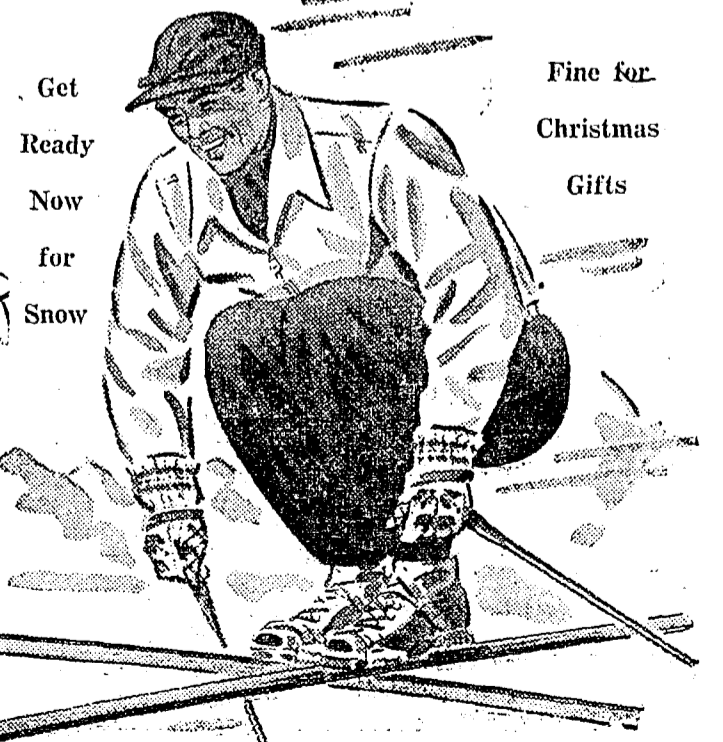

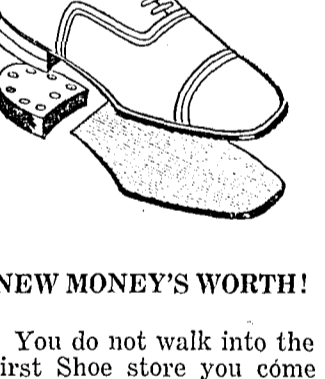

Home Ec Club Gives Christmas Party For Poor Children

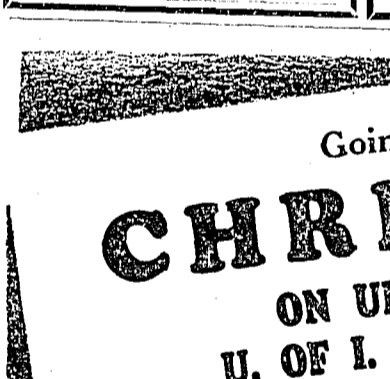

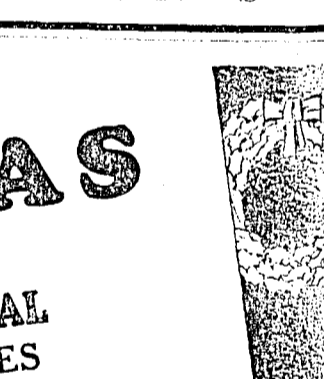
