The recent statement of Wendell Willkie supporting the plan to give Roosevelt unprecedented power lends credence to the charge that the two men were and are in unusual accord, especially as regards the foreign policy of the United States. Many voters feel that between the two candidates was no real difference in choice for president. Those opposed to involving this country in war by too close support of the British claim that the pro-war groups could not lose because they backed both men; that regardless of who sits in the White House, their cause was assured full favorable audience to the presidential ear.

The president openly favors "all out" aid, but the term is very conveniently undefined. Whether it means 100 per cent aid, including the navy and later the army, is still a moot question that isn't likely to be answered just yet.

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Willkie, who supported whole-heartedly the presidential foreign policies before November, has kept his peace until his recent support of "greater power to the White House" plan. Now he finds it necessary to fly to Europe to see for himself what's going on over there. The state department approved the trip by granting his passport to the war zone.

What the English can tell Willkie which they haven't al. ready told Roosevelt pobably won't make good gossip. But if Willkie should wish to bring this nation in closer support of the presidential view, it's good logic to look over the British ruins, then to fly back to this continent and loose a few more bombshells on a nation which is trying to draw a line between war and peace. -----R. S

Last Friday's Russo-German trade pact stands as evidence that the Kremlin is still playing a waiting game, backing Hitler in the hope that Soviet aid to the Axis will prolong the present conflict. The Soviets see the inevitable exhaus tion of both Germany and Britain, their two rivals for world power, in a long war. Stalin will step in to keep Hitler afloat, but he will not work for an early or decisive Nazi victory.

**Communique Comment** 

Under the treaty of January 10, the U.S.S.R. will supply two million tons of oil to the Reich on a barter basis. The Red General Staff would hardly permit the shipment of a military necessity of such value to Germany if it were preparing for a Russo-German break and eventual war against the Nazis. The Russian petroleum will enable the Luftwaffe to continue its destructive raids against London, the citadel of capitalism, and to spite the British naval blockade which cuts off Hitler's war machine from the oil fields of the Western Hemisphere.

The "People's Convention" of left-wing groups which has been meeting at London is probably the first of a series of working-class conferences, public and underground, in the belligerent nations. As the war goes on, and bombers and hunger take their toll of civilian lives, one can expect a growing demand on the part of the proletariat in the wartorn countries for out-and-out Socialist governments and immediate peace. This was the development in the later stages of the 1914-18 struggle.

One can detect the fine hand of the Kremlin behind the London "People's Convention." That meeting and those which are to follow will play into the hands of Stalin. According to the long-range Soviet program, the continuance of the war will result in a demand of the proletarian regimes and peace on the part of the workers of Britain, Germany, the Low Countries, France, Italy, Spain. The natural big brother for the working-class governments thus set up would be Soviet Russia, unscarred by the conflict, its resources intact.
