

Boxers Leave To Tangle With Badger Mittmen

Idaho boxing team, defending national intercollegiate ring champions, left early this morning for Madison, Wis., where they will tangle with the Badger mittmen Monday night. From Madison the Vandals will go directly to Pennsylvania State for the national championships March 27 to 29. The Vandals passed up the Pacific coast title meet in order to meet the Badgers.

Before leaving, Coach Louie August announced that the boxing room would be open while the team was gone. Anyone wishing to work out will be able to do so between the hours of 3 to 5 o'clock every afternoon.

Coach August, Assistant Coach Sammy Zingale, and Manager Karl Greef accompanied the eight-man squad. The boxers are: Ted Kara, 120-pounds; Frank Kara, 127-pounds; Norman Jensen, 135-pounds; Don Reed, 145-pounds; Claude Hansen, 155-pounds; Erickson, 165-pounds; Chace Anderson, 175-pounds; and Vic Berlius, heavyweight. Reed has been bothered with a bad case of boils and has been unable to work out much lately. The rest of the squad is in top shape, according to August.

In Good Shape
"We are in better shape now than we have been at any time this year," said August. "Ted and Frank Kara have been looking better than ever before; Laune Erickson has been up to his usual standards."

"Chace Anderson has shown much improvement and I am expecting much from this trip. If Vic Berlius looks as good in the ring as he has looked here he will take the national title. His punching has been terrific and he looked 100 per cent better during the past week," added August.

Last year the Vandals battled Wisconsin to a 4 to 4 deadlock. The Badgers are undefeated so far this year and are ranking favorites to annex the national title. They have defeated Penn State, Michigan State, and West Virginia. Johnny Walsh, Wisconsin coach, has three complete teams on hand and had used a different team for each card this year, according to August.

Wisconsin Favored
"Wisconsin has a much stronger team than last year and I consider them the best in the nation," said August. "They should win the national title, and if we finish second to them I will be satisfied."

Different styles of fighting and different officiating will handicap the Vandals in their bid for a second ring crown, August pointed out. If no team wins more than two individual championships, Idaho will have an even chance, he said. Both the Vandals and Wisconsin have two almost certain winners and a third fighter who has a good chance.

Phil Conley Is Lone Vandal Entry in Intermountain Races

Intermountain Ski Council races at Lookout pass will draw only one University of Idaho ski team member away from the campus this weekend, and other members are planning to stay home and "hit the books," according to Frank Crowe, ski team manager. The team will leave next Wednesday for a four day trip to Mt. Rainier for the Pacific Coast Northern Division championship races.

Phil Conley goes to Wallace this weekend to participate in the Intermountain races there. Last week he placed fourth in slalom at the Payette lakes races near McCall.

"Washington is the team to beat at Paradise valley," said Crowe. "They have a bunch of top skiers."

Five Will Travel
The team leaves Moscow Wednesday, and will spend Thursday practicing on Rainier. Friday, March 28, the cross country race is scheduled, and the downhill races are set for Saturday morning. The first slalom run is scheduled for Saturday afternoon and Sunday will find the Idaho skiers making the second slalom run in the morning and entering the jumping contest in the afternoon.

Captain Jack Numbers, Ellis Wickward, Conley, and Mark Marquard will represent Idaho at the Rainier meet. Crowe will accompany the skiers.

Tauber Turns Pro

Dick Tauber, tackle on the University of Idaho football team during the 1938 and 1939 seasons, recently signed to play for the Pittsburgh Steelers, professional team.

The former Vandal received several offers from the pro ranks before signing with Pittsburgh. He will report in August to the Steelers' training camp somewhere in the west.

Ted Kara and Laune Erickson are the two Vandals who he named as certain winners with Frank Kara having a very good chance. Frank was forced out of the national finals last year with a cut eye. He has been undefeated this year as have Ted and Erickson.

Badgers Duplicate
Wisconsin's two certain winners are Gene Rankin in the lightweight division and Nick Lee in the 175-pound division. Lee won the national heavyweight title last year but dropped down one division this year. The third possible Badger winner is Verdayne John in the heavyweight class.
