



As the U. S. ship of Pep Band and (3) the Vandaleers. fit of the A.S.U.I. state tacks its way ever closer to the maelstrom, Americans must take stock of the new position of the British Empire realistically, rejecting both undue pessimism and wishful

German control of the Hellenic peninsula will secure the Reich against that attack from the rear which Winston Churchill has been planning since 1915. It will counteract the effect of the British naval blockade by insuring the foodstuffs, minerals and oil of the Balkan region for use by Hitler's countrymen. In the opinion of some neutral experts, loss of the Greek base will render close to impossible a British military triumph over the swastika, now that the new fortifications on the German-occupied coasts of France and the Low Countries bar the way to a sprint across the Channel.

Continued success for the Axis war machine is causing anxious seat-shifting among the neutral fence-sitters. General Franco now considers with care the Berlin request for Spanish co-operation in a thrust at Gibraltar. Outflanked by the Nazi penetration into Hellas, the Turks may open their poverty-stricken land to field-gray legions on the way to French Syria and Iraq. At Vichy, Admiral Darlan snubs Admiral Leahy and hands over to Hitler the French strong points on the Mediterranean. Tunis is under German control already; Syria may be next.

Morale on the English home front may be affected by the reverses in Greece. The inhabitants of the besieged island have stood up to terrific punishment during the winter, and they have expected their military leaders to open 1941 with a dramatic victory, that reliable tonic for war-weariness. The defeat in Hellas will probably deepen the conviction that keeps the English going in these dark days-the conviction that an aroused Uncle Sam must come to their rescue.
