**Communique Comment** 

While the Greek disaster rocks Dominion capitals and discredits further the well-groomed wearers of the Old School Tie, whose hold on the British army and government was only slightly shaken by the Norwegian fiasco and Dunkirk a liberal group in England is urging the Ministry of Information to step forth with a set of war aims-and thus fight Hitler with his own weapons.

The papier-mache collapse of the nations which have rolled beneath the Teutonic war chariot cannot be explained by the lightning tactics, the amazing equipment of the Panzerdivisionen. Propaganda from the Reich had so sapped French morale by the spring of 1940 that the Nazi spearhead which struck westward from Sedan was slicing apart a country already disunited. Before the blitzkrieg conquest of Poland, Norway, the Low Countries and Jugoslavia, powerful blocs within those states had sold out to Hitler of their own free will. The na-tionalism for which men gladly died in 1914-18 seemed to be fit only for mockery today.

Since 1939, the Fuehrer has stated as his No. 1 aim the creation of a united Europe, free of tariff barriers, free of national rivalries, peaceful and prosperous. He points to John Bull as the war-monger who would keep the Continent divided into weak, competing states. Up to now, Britain has not come forward with an alternative plan for the post-war organization of Europe. The peoples living under the shadow of the swastika are left with the suspicion that Churchill intends merely to restore the status quo of 1939 or 1933a status quo in which incompetent and often corrupt governments paid lip service to democracy while revenues needed to relieve the distress of the masses were poured into the armaments race.

Unfortunately, the English Conservative Party would be unwilling to sanction a set of war aims that included the establishment of a united Europe after the smoke of battle has cleared away. A free-trade unit of such tremendous resources would be a competitor of untold strength for the industrial interests which dominate the party of Chamberlain and Churchill. The same men who lauded "Good Old Neville" as he handed over to Hitler the strategic bastions (Austria, Spain, Czechoslavakia) by which the Axis may win this war, are now unwilling to let the Ministry of Information meet Herr Goebbels' bureau in fair fight.




