No tryouts will be held, Walls said, and announced that persons interested should see either Mr. Walls at the Music Hall Annex or Prof. Alvah A. Beecher in the Music Hall.

Highlights of the chorus' performances throughout the season will probably be joining with the University Singers and the women's chorus, Treble Clef, in the presentation of two cantatas.

Other University Singers' activities during the year will include several appearances, culminating with a full male concert in the spring, Mr. Walls stated.

Numbers appropriate and interesting for male chorus are being sung by the group at the present time. Some of the compositions which the chorus is now studying are Victor Herbert's "On Parade" from the operetta, "Sweethearts," "Song of the Marching Men," "Ho, Jolly Jenkin," "Song of the Jolly Roger," and "The Sleigh."

The choral group meets 8th period Tuesdays and Thursdays under the leadership of Mr. Walls.

Work this year cannot be carried over from one month to the next, but each month's work must be completed during that month.
