Organization of a British-Russian stand in the area between the Black Sea and the Caspian is complicated by the fact that the Nazi spearheads pushing eastward between Kharkov and Leningrad have tended to isolate the three main Russian armies one from the other. The Red forces in the Ukraine are in need of rest and replacements. Reorganization under their new commander, Marshal Timoshenko, is still under way as the Soviet battalions retreat to new defensive positions. German attacks have already knocked out the industrial plants of the Donets Basin as a resource for Timoshenko.

"Pacification" of certain areas along the 800-mile single-track rail-BARGAINS way from the Persian Gulf to the Caspian, may have to be undertaken by the British and Russian forces protecting the new puppet Shah, before the dispatch of a sizeable British expedition from India to the Caucasus could be attempted.

Further Nazi success along the north shore of the Black Sea would leave Turkey in an unenviable position, outflanked to the north and west by Axis outposts. This month's German-Turkish pact was a tentative step by Ankara in the direction of Berlin. The British units guarding what was French Syria and Iraq must be on the alert for a Nazi thrust toward the Persian Gulf or Suez through a suddenly co-operative Turkey. Wavell cannot, therefore, weaken the British garrisons in Syria and Iraq in order to bolster the defense lines that keep the brown-cuffed tentacles from the black oil of Baku.
