

Vandals Gun for Upset Over Oregon State Beavers

Idaho Batters Bearcats 33-0 on Dad's Day

Idaho's football coaches put their heads together yesterday to plot an attack for the Vandals to use against mighty Oregon State at Corvallis this Saturday.

Last week Idaho ran over Willamette university 33 to 6 on the turf of Neale stadium, to lengthen their string of wins to three straight. This is the first season since 1929 that an Idaho team has registered three victories in a row.

Idaho is expecting the toughest game of the season against Oregon State, the team which broke Stanford's long string of victories several weeks ago.

Oregon State is one of the strongest teams on the coast this year, and fans believe they will be tougher than ever this week because of losing to Washington State last Saturday.

"Oregon State will be on the rebound from that defeat," a sports writer said yesterday.

Idaho Lineup Thinned. Idaho's lineup was thinned at last night's drill because of injuries to Ray Davis, left halfback; Earl Chandler, right halfback; and Veto Berlus, end.

Berlus, who received a neck and back injury while making a tackle in the Willamette game, was released from the university infirmary Sunday night with orders not to participate in any rough scrimmage until later in the week.

Chandler has a shoulder injury, and Davis an injured toe. All three gridderers are expected to be back in the lineup by game time Saturday.

Dale Clark, right halfback, who did not play against Willamette because of injuries, rejoined the squad last night.

Practice this week, it was announced, will consist mainly of defensive formations to use against a varied Oregon State attack, and the correcting of offensive weaknesses revealed last Saturday.

Idaho Passes Much. Against Willamette last week, Idaho was forced to use a passing attack to gain victory. Through the air, Idaho registered 210 yards from scrimmage, while with running plays, the Vandals netted only 90 yards.

Idaho scored first against Willamette in the initial quarter when Manson crossed the goal on a sneak play.

After that, Joe Malta, sub fullback; Bill Micklich, fullback; Jack Tewhey, sub end; and George Nixon, sub quarterback, went over for counters. Milo Anderson, place kicking end, booted three extra points.

Willamette's one tally came in the second quarter when the Bearcats intercepted an Idaho pass deep in their own territory and ran it to the Idaho 20. From there, a pass, Reynolds to Reder, scored. The kick was blocked.

Reserves Do Well. Several Idaho reserves, who had had no previous chance to show their ability, were outstanding against Willamette, Idaho coaches said this week.

Among them are Bob Vandenharr, halfback; Malta, Tewhey, Dale Burkhalter, halfback, and Ed Keiper, end.

Golf Coach Halts Fall Tournament

Cancellation of the fall golf tournament was announced yesterday by Golf Coach Frank James who said that unfavorable weather conditions have made it impossible to conduct the tourney.

Twelve golfers interested in competing on the Idaho varsity and freshman golf teams next spring met Thursday night and selected Bill Holzer to represent the group at the weekly meetings of the minor sports council.

The group also discussed the possibility of using a six-man team in the coming spring tournaments. Coach James pointed out that other members of the northern division conference were represented by six-man teams, but that financial problems held the

On January 30, Oregon State college invades Moscow and on February 7, the Vandals travel to Seattle to meet Washington. The season ends with the Northern Division meet at Seattle on February 28.

At a meeting held Friday, the wrestlers elected Juren to represent the sport in the newly formed minor sports council. It will be his duty to report on the progress of the team and to state any of its needs.

Skiers May Enter P.N.S.A. Meets

Skiers for the University of Idaho may be able to enter six Pacific Northwest and Pacific Coast Intercollegiate ski meets if plans being formulated by Graduate Manager Gale Mix work out satisfactorily.

Entrance of the University of Idaho into the Pacific Northwest Ski association is being contemplated which could give all skiers for the university the right to compete in all meets sponsored by the P.N.S.A.

The Pacific Coast conference meet which is open to ski teams of the members of the conference will be held on Mount Rainier, the 20, 21, and 22 of March according to a schedule of meets released by the P.N.S.A. last week.

Coast meets which may draw Idaho skiers are the P.N.S.A. class A championship meet in downhill, slalom combined which is to be held at Mt. Spokane February 14 and 15. February 15 is also the

date scheduled for the class B and C downhill, slalom combined meet at Tollgate, Ore. For entrance to this meet, skiers will have to place in the Zone 5 meet. Date and site of this meet has not yet been announced.

Intercollegiate ski championships are to be held at Sun Valley December 29, 30, 31, and January 1. The championships are decided upon results of four events; slalom, downhill, cross-country, and jumping.

The Pacific Northwest Ski association has 23 meets scheduled for the coming ski season.
