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MURAL MUSINGS.

Maybe it's the tang of a victory spirit that has been enveloping the whole campus this year since Coach Francis A. Schmidt has taken over the reins of the Vandal gridmen and maybe it's just the growing enthusiasm for intramural sports, but plans are underway to pit the Idaho mural football champions against the mural champs from Washington State in an annual "howl" game of some sort.

The intramural program has long attracted a large share of students who don't participate in inter-collegiate athletics. The athletic department this year has shown an increased interest in both minor and intramural sports as essential to a well-rounded athletic program. Another step in the promotion of a better intramural program—one that will draw even more interest—would be a regularly-scheduled post-season game between the intramural champs of both campuses in all minor sports.

SPIRIT CUP SQUABBLE.

Bruce Gordon, ex-yell duke, won his point, but he had to resign his position to convince the rally committee. The rally committee Wednesday, in effect, admitted its mistake and decided not to give away a "spirit cup" to the group house which showed the most "enthusiasm, cooperation and organization" in rallies for the rest of the year.

A squabble with members of the rally committee over the method of selecting the "most spirited" house or hall coupled with pressing scholastic duties, caused Gordon to resign his position.

The rally committee and Yell King Ozzie Walch evidently get a little over-enthusiastic with their "big ideas" and don't get the details worked out well enough in advance before they make a "big splurge" through the Argonaut of elaborate plans to award a spirit cup. The idea is swell, Jason believes, providing that a definite and concrete way that will avoid personal opinion and bias can be selected to award the cup, but evidently that is where the sticker comes in.

A disastrous experiment with the awarding of the cup to Phi Delta Theta at the pajama rally has caused the rally committee to carefully drop the "hot potato" and try to forget the whole matter rather than to try and revise the plan and devise some definite method of selecting the "most spirited" house or hall.

The Phi Deltas' winning the cup at the pajama rally has boomeranged on the rally committee and yell team. Cries of "politics" has been heard from all sides. It was publicized that the rally committee was to decide which group won the cup, yet three people who were not members of the rally committee were given ballots by Yell King Ozzie.

Jason isn't kicking about the Phi Deltas winning the cup. Perhaps they did have the "most spirited" group, but such things as "enthusiasm, organization, and cooperation" are intangible elements hard to evaluate in a definite manner.

Two years ago, Alpha Phi Chi and the intramural program gave intramural points to the men's houses having the largest percentage of its membership turning out to rallies. Jason realizes that this system has its defects, too, but it is at least based on something tangible.

The number of students attending a rally is no indication of the spirit. One live wire can make more noise than ten dead heads, but in the long run—over a period of the rest of the year—the group with the largest turnout would probably show the most spirit.

Historians Praise Dale's Book On Expeditions

The revised edition of President Harrison C. Dale's book, "The Ashley-Smith Expeditions and the Discovery of a Central Route to the Pacific," has been greeted with praise by western historians, reports the publishers, The Arthur H. Clark Company, Glendale, Calif. One reviewer lauds President Dale for having brought together "for the first time all the documents on which a knowledge of the Ashley and Smith expeditions is based."

Twenty years ago, culminating years of research, President Dale wrote his first book on the adventures of two of the West's most important explorers. He covered the expeditions of William Henry Ashley and Jedediah Strong Smith. These two expeditions together form a single enterprise—the discovery of the central and southwestern route to the Pacific.

That book, which has long been out of print and has regularly been quoted by dealers in Americana at prices ranging from \$30.00 to \$50.00, was received with such praise President Dale resolved to continue his research in the history of western explorations. The intervening years resulted in the accumulation of so much new material, including the Smith journals, that last year President Dale practically wrote a new book.

The new edition, of 362 pages, not only is an interesting and entertaining account of the first overland expeditions to the Pacific by a route different from that followed by Lewis and Clark but contains a wealth of closely related historical material about the area included in the present states of Idaho, Colorado, Wyoming, California, Oregon, Nevada, Utah, and Montana.

Perhaps even these proposals are not the best cure for the present and anticipated Gem ills, but I sincerely believe they are a step in the right direction.

Varsity Seeks Fourth Straight Win In Oregon State Game Tomorrow

They Whipped the Best of the 'Mural Teams

Thirty-three Vandal gridders boarded the 7:10 train last night and headed west on an invasion of Corvallis, where they meet Oregon State's Beavers tomorrow afternoon. The Vandals will be shooting for their fourth consecutive victory of the year.

The squad will arrive at Corvallis this morning, and Coach Francis Schmidt has scheduled a short practice session for Friday afternoon on Bell field. Saturday night the Vandals will leave the Oregon State stronghold to arrive in Moscow Sunday.

Schmidt sent the Idaho footballers through long hard drills all week long in preparation for the Beaver game. With fog and darkness closing in early all week, the team was forced to practice under the lights much of the time. Yesterday afternoon a light drill was held as the Vandals worked against Oregon State offensive plays.

Concentrating especially on the Beaver optional pass or run play Schmidt had southpaw Fred Nichols at right halfback and Dale Burkhalter simulating the Oregon State touchdown twins, Don Duran and Bob Dethman.

Styles of the two teams are

almost entirely different with the Vandal attack depending largely on deception and the Beavers using power to a great extent. Oregon State has won two games and lost two this year all in conference play. Southern California edged the Beavers in the opening game while last week Washington State sprang a sensational upset by winning 7 to 0. However, Coach Lou Stiner has led his team to victories over Washington and Stanford's defending champions, and the Beavers are rated as one of the strongest teams on the coast. That O.S.C. loss was the only defeat Stanford has suffered this year.

Clark, Franklin Stay.

Idaho will go into the game with two lettermen missing and possibly one more player unable to play. When the Vandals left, right halfback Dale Clark and fullback Rudy Franklin were not with the squad. Clark, although turning out for practice, is not ready for actual competition because of a rib injury received in the Gonzaga game, while Franklin cut his hand in an engineering lab last week. Regular end Vic Berllus may not

be able to play because of a neck injury.

With Clark out and Berllus a doubtful starter, Earl Chandler and Ed Keiper will move into the starting roles in those two positions. Other members of the probable starting lineup are Milo Anderson, left end, Irv Konopka, left tackle, Bill Lockey, left guard, Tony Aschenbrenner or Hank Crowley, center, Cleo Rowe, right guard; and Joe Piedmont, right tackle in the line. Teaming up with Chandler in the backfield will be Howard Manson, left half; Pete Hecomovich, quarterback; and Bill Micklich, fullback.

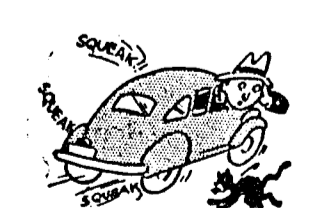
The Vandals open their season with a non-conference meet against the Montana State university team here December 9.
