Idaho Meets Montana State Bearcats In Boise Saturday Afternoon

Vandal gridders, still trying for their fourth victory of the year, leave Thursday evening on their annual invasion of Boise, where they tangle with Montana State Saturday afternoon. The Idaho squad made its final bow before home fans last Saturday in an unimpressive 16-0 defeat at the hands of Montana's Grizzlies. ASUI books will be good for the game. Reserved tickets can be purchased either in the graduate manager's office or from members of the varsity squad. The Vandals will probably work out in Boise Friday night on Public School field. A squad of about 30 men will make the trip, says Coach Francis Schmidt. The game will conclude the 1941 Idaho season, with the Vandal record now standing at three wins and five defeats. Seven seniors will be playing their last game for the Vandals Saturday. Cleo Rowe, Bill Piedmont, Tony Aschenbrenner, Milo Anderson, Chace Anderson, Dale Clark, and Rudy Franklin all graduate this year.

Cermak Lost. Idaho lost the services of John Cermak in the Montana game, leaving only sophomore Stan Waskiewicz for the left guard duties. Cermak, 220-pound guard, injured his leg in the first quarter of the game, and went home after the contest. To bulwark the post Cleo Rowe, regular right guard, will be schooled in the left guard mechanisms. Waskiewicz, who was a standout in the Montana con-

test, will continue as first-string left guard. Montana State, coached by Schubert Dyche, has a fast and tricky team this year. The Bobcats use several different formations, including a man in motion formation, and a spread play. Against Montana, the Montana State team scored twice in the first half before the Grizzlies came from behind for a 26-13 win. "Jinx" Anderson, 160-pound triple-threat, leads the Bobcat attack from the quarterback post. Anderson is an ex-Canadian rugby player. Other Bobcat offensive threats are Davis, a speedy right halfback, and Zupan, hard running left half. In their last start the Montana State gridders battled Idaho Southern Branch to a 13-13 tie at Pocatello. **Speedy Montana.** Montana, showing tremendous speed Saturday despite the water which submerged the field, scored touchdowns in the first and second quarters, and added a field goal in the final period. The victory gave the Grizzlies possession of the "Little Brown Stein" for the third consecutive year, and was their fourth victory over the Vandals in the past seven years. Fumbles proved disastrous to the Idaho squad as Montana recovered five Vandal bobbles, two of them setting up Grizzly scores and two more halting prospective Idaho touchdown marches. Montana struck first in the initial period when Arnold-Scott, fleet-footed sophomore star, scored on a 57-yard dash, through the Idaho team. The Grizzlies scored again in the second quarter after recovering an Idaho fumble on the

Vandal 29-yard line. Eso Naranche, triple-threat fullback of the Montanans, passed to Swarouth on the three-yard line, then bucked over standing up. He added the extra point on a place kick. **Field Goal.** A fumble in the fourth period led to the final Grizzly score. After the Vandal defense had tightened to stop the visitors on the 13-yard line, Naranche stepped back, and split the uprights with a field goal. Idaho made nine first downs, four in the first quarter, and five in the fourth period, to a total of four for the Grizzlies. The Vandals completed 14 out of 22 passes but they were good for only 69 yards. Fred Nichols, making his final appearance on the home field, led the Idaho attack, averaging 8.8 yards in the six times he carried the ball. Others standing out were Waskiewicz, Hank Crowley, Dean Lewis, and Bill Micklich.

Wrestling Chiefs Plan Tourney

Plans for an all-university wrestling tournament to be held before Christmas vacation were outlined last night by Hank Juran, team captain, and J. A. "Babe" Brown, minor sports director. The tourney, as planned by Juran and Brown, would pit only novice wrestlers and the meet would be conducted by the varsity lettermen. The tourney will be open to all men, and all interested men are urged to participate according to the planners. The tourney is planned to help secure material for the freshman and varsity wrestling teams. The varsity is short of men in the 115 and 148 pound weights, and the freshman squad is short men in several weights. The rules as outlined for the meet will be that each competitor must have worked out with the team at least 10 times before the bouts, and an allowance of 5 pounds over will be granted in each weight. The officials said that men who would like to compete in the meet should begin workouts now in preparation for the scheduling of dates for the tourney. The bouts will probably be in the afternoon, Juran said.

Idaho Harriers To Defend Coast Title Wednesday

Ten Vandal cross country men left early yesterday morning for Portland to defend their Pacific Coast Collegiate championship Wednesday afternoon. The Idaho harriers will also compete in the Northwest AAU championships the same day.

The races will finish the Vandal cross country season, and will mark the end of the heaviest season in Idaho history. Saturday Coach Mike Ryan's men downed Montana 21-41 to maintain their undefeated record.

Fourth championship in the last four years will be the Vandal goal in the collegiate race, first on the afternoon program. About an hour and a half later the Idaho harriers will compete in the AAU meet.

Men making the trip are Vic Dyrigall, Bob White, Bob Dwyer, LaMar Chapman, John Thomas, Sted Johnston, Francis McGuire, Jack Ragland, Ward Stroschein, and Bert Meagher.

Forced to run on a makeshift course over the old Pullman road because of rain, the Vandals still captured three of the first four places from the Grizzlies. Thomas finished first, timed in 18:02 fol-

lowed by McGuire and Johnston. Armstrong was the first Montana man to finish, taking fourth place.

The meet was originally planned as a triangular affair but Washington State didn't show up because of their intra-school turkey trot. A high school meet between Coeur d'Alene and Lewiston, sponsored by the Idaho athletic department, was also held with Lewiston winning. Believed to be the first high school cross country meet in the state, it was also originally scheduled for a triangular race but Moscow didn't appear.
