







# Idaho Will Face Six Conference Teams in '42 Schedule

## Oregon State Beavers to Open Home Gridiron Season; Eight Games Set

Eight of the nine or ten foes of Coach Francis A. Schmidt's 1942 Vandal squad were named by Graduate Manager Gale Mix last night. Six Pacific Coast conference teams were listed on the yet tentative schedule. The schedule as announced gives Idaho only two home games, but the site of the Idaho-Gonzaga battle has not yet been determined. Mix said there would be at least three home games when the slate was completed. The schedule covers a ten-week period from September 26 to November 26, and no games are yet slated for November 7 or 21.

Washington State, Stanford, Oregon State, U.C.L.A., Oregon, and Montana are the conference opponents whom the Vandals will meet, and Gonzaga and Utah are the two non-conference opponents slated.

Oregon State's Beavers will open the 1942 season when they tangle with the Vandals here September 26. The following week the Idaho squad heads south for Los Angeles where they meet U.C.L.A., October 3.

Gonzaga is scheduled for October 10 with scene of the game still undetermined. October 17 the Vandals will clash with mighty Stanford at Palo Alto. University of Oregon will be the next Idaho opponent October 24 at Eugene, while October 31 the Vandals will invade Missoula for a game with the University of Montana.

**Meet WSC Here.**  
November 7 is an open date at present, but November 14 Idaho and WSC will meet here in the annual traditional battle. No game has been lined up for November 21 as yet. Final contest of the year will come on November 26, Thanksgiving, at Salt Lake when the Idaho griders meet Utah university.

All conference games were approved at the last conference meeting, while the non-conference contests were scheduled later.

## Vandals Pick Four Ducks On All-Opponent Team

Four University of Oregon griders were named by the Idaho football squad on their 1941 all-opponent team. The Vandals voted on the squad at a meeting Wednesday afternoon and also nominated candidates for next year's captain.

Results of the election for captain were not released yet. Game captains were named this year as follows: in the past, but Coach Francis Schmidt plans to name a captain for the entire season. Following Oregon in the number of players on the all-opponent team were Utah's Redskins and Oregon State, both conquerors of the Vandals, with three players each. University of Montana and Willamette placed one man each on the team.

## Vandals Face 28 Games During Hoop Season

With the first game of the season less than a week off, Coach Guy Wicks has been drilling the Vandal hoopsmen nightly in an effort to have them ready. A 28-game schedule has been lined up for the Idaho cagers by Graduate Manager Gale Mix and Wicks.

Next Wednesday the Vandals will open their season against Whitman at Walla Walla, and the following Saturday they will play host to the Whitman casaba team here. Twelve pre-conference games will prepare the Vandals for their 16-game conference schedule. The conference season will open January 9 against Washington at Seattle.

One regular and four other lettermen from last year's squad will form the nucleus of Coach Wicks' team. Ray Turner, veteran forward, is the only regular returning. George Steele, Vonley Hopkins, Ted Thompson, and Jimmy Foster are the returning lettermen. Steele and Turner player under Wicks at the southern branch.

Chrisman hall displayed flashes of power but failure to work together, especially on the net, spelled defeat.

Acutt, A.T.O. star, was the outstanding player for the champions while Mattson and Clark stood out for Chrisman. Bob Stratton played a major part in the A.T.O. victory when he rifled across seven consecutive points on his serve to put his teammates into a lead they never relinquished.

## Coaches Set Date For First Mat Tourney

Idaho's first all-university wrestling tournament will be held December 15 and 16, according to J. A. "Babe" Brown, minor sports director. All men interested in taking part should sign up with Hank Juran, team captain, as soon as possible, Brown said.


All men taking part in the tourney must have had at least ten workouts before the meet to be eligible to compete. Regular weights will be used and a five pound leeway will be allowed.

There will be nine weight classes as provided in the Olympic wrestling rules, Juran said. The weights are 121, 128, 136, 145, 155, 165, 175, 190, and heavy weight.

Juran said that there was no 121-pound man for the varsity team, no heavyweights, and very few lightweights. He also said that there were only five freshmen turning out and that he needed eight men to make a team.




