Conquest of Libya by the British might neutralize part of the effect of Vichy's imminent swing to the side of Hitler—and confront Italy with the prospect Dorothy Mounce as a result of her Ernest Gnaedinger and Llewelyn of invasion from the south.

Cunningham must knock Rommel out of eastern Libya 80 that the British Middle Eastern staff at Cairo can sleep soundly, free of the nightmare of an Axis pincers movement starting from Turkey and Libya and directed against the Suez Canal. Turkey is developing an unsteady wobble with each new German success on the north shore of the Black Sea. Harassed President Inonu may bend at any moment before the dark threats of Ambassador von Papen and wave the Nazi troop trains through his helpless republic on their way to the Syrian frontier. Cunningham's task is to destroy the Libyan bastion for any projected two-pronged Axis assault on Suez, so that General Auchinleck in Egypt will be able to meet a German thrust from Turkey with his rear

Libya itself is a barren dessert that Italy pried away from he rotting Turkish Empire in 1912 after the choice colonial Subdivisions had been scooped up by Britain and France. It however, important to Britain as the avenue to Tunis and the French North African empire. Seething anti-Vichy senment has been reported in parts of French North Africa. The British hope that the arrival of their forces would be welcomed by the population of Tunis, Algeria and Morocco. With Petain going limp in the iron embrace of Berlin; Britain must smash through Libya to keep French North Africa, with its naval bases and its native army of 150,000, out of

the grip of Hitler. Rumors of dissension between the Italians and their erman allies increase in number each day. The subects of II Duce particularly resent the presence of heavyhanded German economic experts in their peninsula and some rather fancy chiseling by Berlin over spheres of Influence in the cadaver of Jugoslavia. Sicily is one center of Italian anger against the visitors from the north. The Sicilians have been noted though history for a certain flair in ridding themselves of unwelcome guests. Tunis, ninety miles away, would serve well as a springboard for the descent of a British "army of liberation" on the volcanic island at the toe of the Italian boot.




