"If each student would do one thing, it would assure adequate preparedness and the success of the local effort to be ready for any eventualities," Dr. Lemon said.

Ten new defense courses giving university credit and aiding in equipping college students to serve in the armed forces or in war industry will be introduced tentatively next semester, President Harrison C. Dale announced yesterday after a complete survey of the university's curriculum has been studied by a committee of Dean Jesse E. Buchanan and Dean T. S. Kerr. The introduction of the new courses is subject to the approval of the academic council, which will meet Wednesday.

In addition to the new courses, the committee recom-mended a long list of subjects already given by the university that will aid in the national defense program. Also outlined are courses that will aid the naval reserve's V-5 and V-7 programs granted to sophomores, juniors, and seniors.

Naval Reserve Program Set

The naval reserve programs are designed to enlist college students in the naval reserve and allow them to continue their college education, taking special courses that will better equip them for naval service after they are graduated. Dean Buchanan explained. The V-5 program is for students who have enlisted in the reserve as aviation cadets, and the V-7 program is for those who have registered as midshipmen. Dean Buchanan indicated that if enough interest in the program is shown here a special lecturer on naval history will be sent here by the navy department.

Three courses for the national defense program will be given especially for women, Dean Buchanan said. Motor Corps, a two-credit course, will stress the servicing, maintenance, and operation of automobiles and •trucks, including elementary motor

mechinics, care and repair of tires, and other parts of the automobile. It will consist of one lecture and a three hour laboratory. Prerequisites are a Red Cross first aid certificate and a private driver's li-

cense. Other courses for women, both of which lead up to a Red Cross certificate, are Home Nursing and Hygiene, 2 credits, and Food Problems of Family Food and Nutrition, 2 credits. These courses have been given previously.

War Aims Course Added.

Recognizing the importance of knowing for what we are fighting, the committee has introduced a symposium course entitled War Background and War Aims. It is open to anyone but freshmen. A two credit course, it will cover the important causes of the war with particular emphasis upon politics, economic problems and foreign affairs, together with a study of international organizations, such as the League of Nations, and an examination of conflicting social ideals in an attempt to indicate the steps to be taken

President Dale Explains Accelerated Program

In adapting an accelerated program of studies the University of Idaho is falling in line with the national Insistence that every phase of production be speeded up, including the production of trained men and women needed to win this war. But this is not eason for shortening the university course. Most college the only students apprmally graduate at the age of 21 or 22. Since liability to militain service begins at age 20, college men naturally want to finish their course before getting into the war. The accelerated programits designed to help them do this. Many other students, women, cannot afford to put in the time or the money includin demanded by a four-year course. They can now, if they wish, get in three years. through

The stainment of all these objectives and purposes is made iv offering a twelve weeks', full university, summer term nossible beginning, in 1942, on June 8 and ending on August 28. Those who are now freshmen, sophomores, and juniors can go right into their next year by enrolling in the summer term. They will still have a month's vacation before the fall semester begins. High school studuates may enter the University either in June or in September.

The summer term, it should be noted, however, is not eighteen weeks or full semester in length but twelve weeks in length. Since the same ourses will be given as in the regular academic year. Twelve credits will be the student c maximum For those who are now sophomores or juniors this ordinarily will mean a maximum load each semester thereafter to permit guiluation in three years.

Nipponese air superiority continues to tell in the savage fighting in Johore. It is reported that constant danger from bombing has already rendered Singapore useless as a base for cruisers and battleships. The Malay campaign has shown that the designers of John Bull's largest naval base did not guard adequately against an assault on Singapore by ground troops advancing through the Malay States or by bombers through the air. The outer land approaches to the island-fortress were left unfortified, and air-fields in the northern Malay States were still in process of construction when the first Japanese transports appeared off Kota Bharu.
