University Builds New Structure for Navy Trainees

Construction was begun this week on a new classroom modeled after the University Classroom building to be used by the naval aviator trainees, according to President Harrison C. Dale. The building is located between Willis Sweet hall and the Idaho club.

The new building will provide large classrooms for the naval trainees. Each room will seat 50. After the war, the building will be used for university classes, Dale said.

Be Completed Soon.
The building will be completed in a few months," R. W. Lind, superintendent of buildings and grounds, estimated. The question of obtaining some vital materials makes it impossible to set any definite date for completion of the building.

The frame structure will be 165 feet long and 61 feet wide. It will be east and west parallel with the Idaho club. The cost of the building has not been determined, according to President Dale.

UCB and the Forestry classroom building will be used as classrooms for the first contingent of trainees, President Dale said. Former occupants of the forestry classroom have been moved into Merrill hall.

Partitions have been torn from rooms in the UCB turning what was four classrooms into two large ones, each of which will seat 50 and office space for naval officers and supervisors. All the desks are also being removed from these rooms, and will be replaced by specially constructed combination benches and tables as specified for the navy.

The second allotment of men, expected to arrive about June 1, will be housed temporarily until the new building is completed, President Dale said. As this contingent will arrive after graduation, it will require no dislocation for members of the art department, the president explained.

Army Will Accept Advanced Men

Applications for the advanced course in military will be accepted between 2:30 and 4:30 p.m. on April 15, 16, and 17, according to Lt. Col. Edwin U. O. Waters. Students interested should see Lieutenant Colonel Waters at that time.

Students who have enrolled in the navy or marine corps are not eligible, Lieutenant Colonel Waters said.

All graduating seniors who desire a physical examination may make arrangements for such a checkup by applying at the infirmiry.

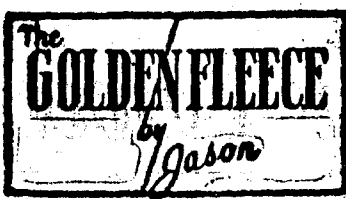
Communique Comment

In 1812, when Napoleon was pushing toward Moscow, Wellington and his small British army in Spain were holding at bay over 100,000 French troops under two of Napoleon's best marshals—and stiffening the resistance of the Spanish guerrillas to the French invaders. In 1942, the Russians are asking Britain to open a second front on the Continent and thus force Hitler to detach from the eastern front divisions that are marked to take part in the Nazi assault on the U.S.S.R. this spring and summer.

In his conferences at the London War Office this week, General Marshall, the U. S. Chief of Staff, will get an understanding of the attitude of the heads of the British army to an Allied invasion of the Continent in 1942. Official statements indicate that the British generals are not in favor of such a move this year—on account of the difficulty of supplying large forces at bridgeheads established across the North Sea or the English Channel. The London strategists warn that the United Nations do not control sufficient merchant tonnage for such an effort. Allied shipping losses have been estimated at over 600,000 tons per month since December 7th, and they are still on the increase.

Recent British commando raids on the Norwegian and French coasts have helped morale on John Bull's home front. If they are continued on a larger scale, they may force Hitler to keep in western Europe divisions that might otherwise be sent to the Russian battle. But it would take a large-scale Allied invasion to make Hitler shift from the eastern theatre of war a sizable proportion of his huge army. The daring hit-and-run attacks of the commandos in the past three months have kept Nazi forces along the occupied coasts on the alert, but the German pressure on the Red armies will be eased only by Allied seizure and retention of several important harbors and a long strip of the French or Norwegian coastline.

The warmth of the Nazi reception to the British commando raid on St. Nazaire on March 28th showed that key points are strongly held by German troops and batteries. Since June 1940, Hitler has been building a new Siegfried Line along the shores of Norway, Denmark, Holland, Belgium and Occupied France. British losses in an invasion of the Continent would not be light. Britons who argue for an Allied thrust into the Continent in 1942 declare that losses will have to be taken to help the Red armies stay in the fight against the Axis. They remind their countrymen that Britain has been saved thus far by Russian courage and by the staggering Russian casualties since June, 1941.



POLITICAL POT

Ever since the week end of January 31, a memorable date to some 24-odd fraternity sophomores, a big shot Independent politician has been carrying out a one-man investigation against T.N.E., fabulously corrupt sub rosa clique behind the scenes of Greek politics.

It seems that on the night of January 31, Theta Nu Epsilon, the undercover group, took a prize bunch of sophomores by truck to the old Troy pavilion some 18 miles from Moscow and indoctrinated them with the ideals of T.N.E.

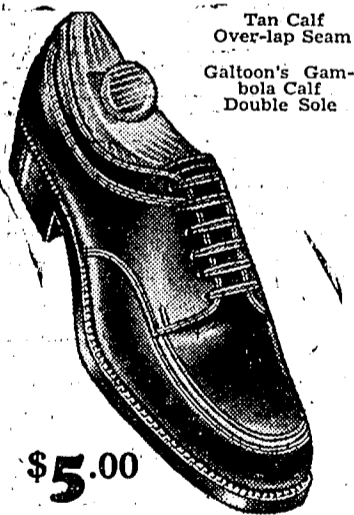

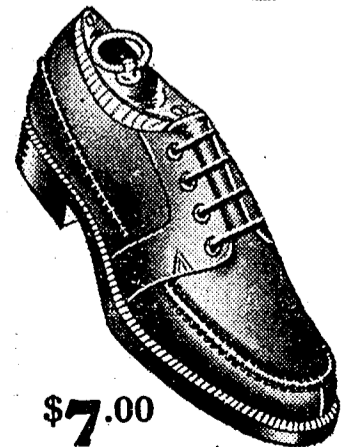

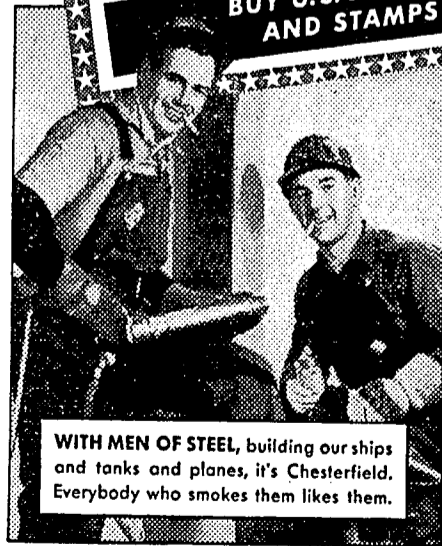
