Communique Comment

General Eisenhower's Tunisian campaign forms the minute hand on the clock that will time the expected Allied invasion of the continent of Europe. By sudden counter-attacks and deft use of rear guards, Rommel has escaped from the trap laid for his army between Gafsa and Mareth and has delayed by several weeks the final Anglo-American assault on the and a curtailment of the number northeast corner of Tunisia, the logical springboard for a descent on southern Italy.

The enemy grip on the northern part of Tunisia is menaced by Montgomery's advance northward from Gabes and by the arrival of reinforcements for the British 1st Army. But Allied military experts warn that the destruction of the divisions under you Arnim and Rommel will take one to two months rather than a four Rommel will take one to two months rather than a few weeks. The Germans have been using the winter to strengthen the natural and prepared defenses of the Bizente-Tunis sector, while the 90-mile strait between Cape Bon and Sicily gives the Axis commanders the advantage of short communication lines to Italian supply

Conclusion of the fighting in Tunisia may be followed immediately by Allied thrusts into the Balkan states or the Scandinavian peninsula. A successful drive through the Aegean islands and Greece would put the eastern Mediterranean under Anglo-American control, threaten Italy with invasion from two directions at once, and endanger the southern anchor of Hitler's long Russian front. Occupation of the northern part of Norway would strike terror into Finland and secure the vital sea route to northern Russia against attacks from land-based units of the Luftwaffe.

The most important offensive of the present spring is not being waged by Montgomery in the dust of North Africa but by the U-boat flotillas of Admiral Doenitz under the dark waves of the North Atlantic. The United Nations will not undertake landing in Norway or Greece or Italy or France until the shipping lanes between the U.S. and Britain and the Mediterranean have been made more secure against the fury of the undersea wolfpacks. The Anglo-American naval staff saved England from starvation and brought the A.E.F. to France by solving the submarine problem in 1917: it can and must repeat that triumph, in the face of greater odds, in 1943.




