Every team on the coast is going to have to depend upon green material to make up their teams this year so if there is anyone in school who is skeptical about being able to break into the lineup shouldn't let this stop them. Cross country is the only sport at Idaho in season right now which has a schedule of meets and offers varsity letters. Coach Ryan would like to see 30 men, or more, out by next week. Thirty-three men from the Army unit are training for the Thanksgiving day race at Spokane. Lt. Col. Hale is anxious for these men to be in that race for the physical benefits achieved therefrom and of course to win the race if possible. There will be a separate race for the Army men stationed at the various schools. These men train under the Idaho coach along with the varsity runners.

This isn't a complete list of the Idaho men at home and abroad, but it is indicative of the quality of the Idaho men who are helping to win the war. Lt. Ray Smith, a former Vandal football star, is now stationed in Philadelphia. He has seen action in the South Pacific. Major Harold Roise of football fame in Vandalville is on a battleship in the Pacific. He is with the Marines. Major Russ Honschwitz, a football player, has seen action in the Pacific theatre this summer. Private Robert Ryan, basketball and track, is in the Ski Troops at Camp Hale, Colorado. Lt. Paul Ryan, track and football, is serving in the Pacific. Lt. Phil Leibowitz, of track fame, is stationed at Tendel Field, Fla. Captain Richard Slade, swimming and track, was wounded in action in the South Pacific. He is now in the hospital with malaria. Major George Whitlock, football, has been decorated for services in North Africa. Major Bill O'Neil, track star and Olympic candidate in 1936, killed in action. Ensign Babe Cascia, baseball and football, stationed in Tennessee. Lt. Bob Dwyer, track, wounded in the invasion of Sicily. Lt. Al Cohen, track, also in on the invasion of Sicily.
