# Communique Comment Mayor Open's Book Drive

Roosevelt, Churchill and Chiang Kai-shek have met in the shadow of the Pyramids and produced a Casablanca Declaration for the Orient. They have promised utter defeat to Japan and the restoration of lost territories to China, but they have made no attempt to enlist the support of the native millions now living under Nipponese rule in former British, Dutch, and French colonies in the Far East.

The Cairo Agreements will strengthen the hand of Chiang Kai-shek, for a time in his struggle with the appeasement wing of the Chungking government. If Britain and the U.S. fail to follow up their dramatic pledge with strong offensive action close to China, white prestige in the Orient will be lowered and Chiang will find himself in another wrangle with those leaders in the Kuomintang regime who want an armistice with Japan and a Sino-Japanese campaign against the Chinese Red armies.

Japan occupies a strong defensive position in the western Pacific, with the advantage of interior supply lines, control of adequate strategic materials, and industrial centers bevond the range for repeated Allied air raids. As General Strong's report to congress pointed out, fifteen months of hard and costly fighting in the Solomons have brought the Allies about 200 miles closer to Tokyo-with 3200 miles still to go. The Chief of U. S. Military Intelligence warned the federal legislators that the Nipponese are not facing manpower shortages and are still turning out planes and war equipment of new and improved types.

Sympathizers with the nationalist aspirations of the Asiatic and East Indian peoples express discouragement over the failure of Roosevelt and Churchill to implement the Cairo Agreements with a Pacific Charter promising extensive reform of Allied imperialism in the Orient. It is a serious reflection upon white rule in the Far East that important Indian, Burmese and Indonesian nationalist leaders are openly supporting Japan's Greater East Asia Co-Prosperity phere at this time. Allied reconquest of Burma, the Malay Peninsula and the Dutch East Indies, will be more difficult if the local populations are apathetic toward our cause or actually hostile.
