

Roosevelt, Churchill and Chiang Kai-shek have met in the shadow of the Pyramids and produced a Casablanca Declaration for the Orient.

The Cairo Agreements will strengthen the hand of Chiang Kai-shek, for a time in his struggle with the appeasement wing of the Chungking government.

Japan occupies a strong defensive position in the western Pacific, with the advantage of interior supply lines, control of adequate strategic materials, and industrial centers beyond the range for repeated Allied air raids.

Sympathizers with the nationalist aspirations of the Asiatic and East Indian peoples express discouragement over the failure of Roosevelt and Churchill to implement the Cairo Agreements with a Pacific Charter promising extensive reform of Allied imperialism in the Orient.

Graue Contributes Research Work To Nat'l Magazine

Organized industrial research, which produces most of the mechanical inventions for which government patents are issued, did not lose confidence in the business future of the nation during the great depression of the late thirties, according to a study of trends and cycles of patents and industrial production from 1863 to 1939 by Dr. Erwin Graue of the University of Idaho school of business administration.

During the three-quarters of a century covered by the study—except during the great depression years—the curves representing inventions and production moved along together on a general course.

"The behavior of the inventions series during the late thirties indicates that in the severe period of the great depression the search for inventions became greatly intensified in preparation for the hoped-for upswing after the force of liquidation had spent itself," Dr. Graue commented.

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Red Cross Offers Financial Loans

Red Cross Field Director Charles DeKlyen, announced today that emergency loans are available to service men on the campus through his office, which is located at Hays hall.

These loans may be obtained after obtaining approval from the soldier's commanding officer. Red Cross authorities do not advertise themselves as a finance company. However, it is urged that all soldiers with urgent financial problems contact the field director's office.

Examples of emergency needs are expenses for emergency furloughs, personal expenses which cannot be met, due to not having received regular army pay and other unexpected needs which can not be met. Soldiers whose families are in need of financial assistance are requested to contact the field director who can refer them to the local Red Cross chapter.

Mr. DeKlyen states that not only financial aid is being rendered. Also numerous problems concerning the service men or their families have been handled.

Veterans To Have Opportunity For Education

Although all military leaders warn the road to final victory will be long and tough Uncle Sam already has begun to provide educational training for the partially disabled, honorably discharged veterans of the first part of World War II.

Enrollment of two such veterans at the University of Idaho under a contract with the veterans' administration, one in the school of business administration and the other in the college of law, is announced by President Harrison C. Dale. President Dale also indicated that additional contracts covering individual veterans, particularly in the field of agriculture, now are in the process of negotiation. Under its agreement with the veterans' administration the University of Idaho will train ex-soldiers and sailors in all fields in which the university offers instruction.

"Now that the Army and Navy are discharging partially disabled men at the rate of approximately 30,000 a month it is anticipated that the number of enrollees in colleges and universities under the rehabilitation program will rapidly increase," President Dale explained. "This rehabilitation training is open to women veterans as well as to the men. Every honorably discharged soldier or sailor with any disability should get in touch with the Veterans' Administration, Boise, which pays the entire expense of his university training, or with the University of Idaho, Moscow."

Cross Country Team Second To Canadians

Mike Ryan's thinclads, of cross country fame, lost their first championship race in seven years last Thursday to a fine University of British Columbia team. The boys from across the International line had five men in the first eight to turn in the remarkably low score of twenty points. This is the lowest score since the Vandals turned in a nineteen point victory in 1940, at Portland, in the championship race.

The Vandal team finished second with 45, followed by the University of Washington with 65. Idaho scored with Anderson, Putnam, Haworth, Ockert and Auger finishing fourth, fifth, ninth, twelfth and fifteenth. The individual winner was Bob Lynn of the Central Washington College of Education, who broke the tape in 21 minutes 45 seconds.

"Iron" Mike Ryan, who is perfectly content with six wins in seven starts, praised the British Columbia team which showed that they had the class this year. He gave his runners praise for finishing as well as they did considering that they started from scratch this fall.

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Vandal Cage Team Collects 53-43 Win Over Lewiston

Displaying a well-balanced offensive, the University of Idaho basketball team opened its season last Saturday night by turning in a convincing 53 to 43 victory over Lewiston normal at Memorial gymnasium.

Vandal Coach J. A. "Babe" Brown sent in plenty of substitutes in order to give his charges a chance to display their talents; and the mentor seemed satisfied with the results.

Top feature of the game was the foul shooting ability of the Idaho cagers as they got hot at the free-charge stripe, dropping in nine points in nine attempts.

Leading the scoring parade was Forward Russell Lentner of the invaders who counted for seven buckets and three fouls for 17 markers. Heading the Vandal quintet was Forward Emmett Callan, who chalked up six hoops and one free loss for 13 points.

Close behind Callan in the scoring was Guard Tom Collins who marked up five goals and two charity heaves for a total of 12.

With some fast moving basketball and some well placed floor shots, the Vandals held a 35 to 23 halftime lead. The Idaho crew counted for more than half of their buckets in the first half on long looping shots, but the under-basket work also helped to build up a comfortable half-time margin for the winners.

But at the opening of the second half, the losers came to life and pulled within four points of the varsity. However, some timely shots by Callan, coupled with a closer defense proved a little too much for Lewiston.

Of the Lewiston team, only one man, Captain Mike Kish, has had any college experience. Kish, a guard, played two years with Bowling Green State university in Ohio.

The game was not too rough and only one man, Lentner, went out via the personal foul route.

Here's More About— Dr. Treviranus

That one nation cannot have a closed-door policy while other nations are starving, he added. Dr. Treviranus said that it will take a long time to build up the credit which the world needs, but that even after the last war, Germany had the economic co-operation of Czechoslovakia, Poland, Belgium, France, Italy and Holland. He reported a period of several years' prosperity in post-World War I Germany, when Germany received European trade during the

British coal miner strike in 1927-29. Because defeated nations could pay their war debts only in kind, it upset the United States and British economic systems and they clamped down. High tariffs imposed after the depression made it impossible for some European countries to sell their goods and thus, they could not pay their war debts, Dr. Treviranus said.

The mainstay of politics all over the world after this war may be the farmer, the speaker said, pointing out that peasants everywhere will have their own say—and that they long to have peace—not for 10 or 15 years—but everlastingly. He thinks their patient, simple way of life will prevail in place of the scientific. "For what's the use of developing ways of fighting a condition with medicine when one condition such as war will destroy millions?" he asked.

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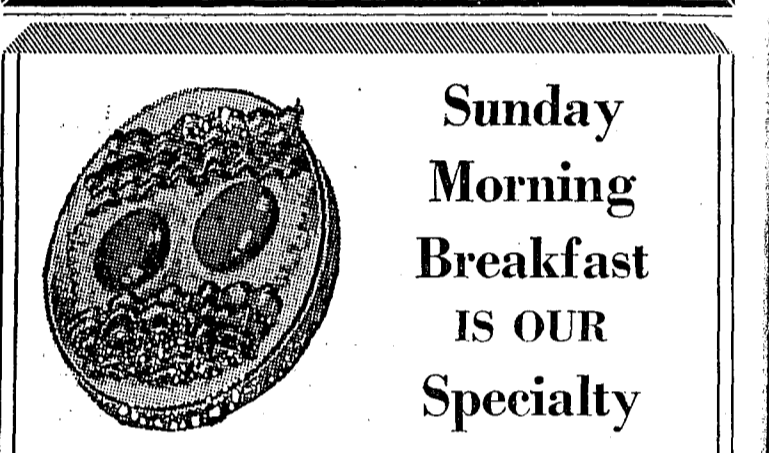
