And most of the other gaps were temporarily filled by the ASTP. They substituted for the Vandal football team, in the publication offices, and even for the Idaho wolf. And "Gee-Eyes Right"—well, it was something new and it too has its memories. And more than one co-ed side-stepped the wolf and found a good romance—GI style.

Through the persistence of Idaho coaches, Vandals hit the basketball and tennis courts, the cinder track and the baseball diamond. The frosh came to the front and their "Freshman Days" were marked by the wearing of the green. Everyone has been well aware that if they were to have good times, they had to work and provide them themselves. And while no new high in hilarity was set, it hasn't been so bad. As the last final looms in the face, Jason, for one can still truly answer, "I think it's swell," to the old first-of-the-year frosh question.

But what about next year? No doubt about it—more of the men will receive their "greetings from the president." And with the experience of this past year, we'll seek our own fun and relaxation probably in still different channels.

The ones of us who will return next fall again have doubts as to what the future holds for us at the U. of I. And Jason doesn't envy the incoming frosh. While maybe this wasn't the best year known on the Idaho campus, we made it good. "We did it before—and we can (if we will) do it again."

### ASUI Dramas Earn Record Income Throughout Year

In a year when many schools have been forced to choose dramatic productions calling for a smaller number of men, Idaho has maintained plays with the average casts of men and women. Besides this distinction, the dramatic department produced four plays instead of the usual number of three which have been done in the past years. "Gee-Eyes Right" was added to the list of dramatic achievements this year, being the most ambitious production of Idaho except for the annual pageant. Miss Jean Collette was the director of the plays. Each one was of a different dramatic type. The first play of the year, "The Romantic Mr. Dickens" was a period play, while "Hotel Universe" was a fantasy. "Gee-Eyes Right" was a musical comedy written and produced by Idaho people, and "The Late Christopher Bean" was an American drama-comedy.

Ted Sherman announced yesterday that the show bringing in the poorest income this year surpasses any of last year. The combined income for dramatic productions last year was \$135.50 for the three plays. Excluding "Gee-Eyes Right", there was a 75 per cent increase in sales on plays this year. "Gee-Eyes Right" brought in a total of \$600, which is an all-time high for the University of Idaho. Besides paying for itself, this play made it possible for the dramatic department to return over \$200 to the student body fund. Improvements were also made on stage equipment. Even with a smaller student body, Idaho dramatists has made a record year.

## Students Will Commence Summer School June 5

A six-weeks summer school or a twelve-weeks summer term will officially start June 5. All students desiring to attend the summer sessions should file their credentials with the registrar as soon as the previous term's work is completed.

Any student formerly registered at the University should obtain an application for registration blank from the registrar in order that his registration blank may be prepared, checked, and in readiness for registration on June 5.

Graduate students, who wish to be candidates for an advanced degree from the University of Idaho, must file transcripts covering all previous academic work.

The fee for either the summer school or the summer term is \$16. Out-of-state tuition for the twelve-weeks summer term is \$25. There is no out-of-state tuition for the six-week summer term. A general deposit is not required at this time.

Rooming accommodations will be available to summer school students at the Mary house for women and the Idaho club for men. Rates at the former will be \$2.50 per week and at the latter \$2.00 per week.

Courses that will be offered in one or the other summer sessions are under the following headings: American history, art, botany, business administration, chemistry, civil engineering, economics, education, English, European history, home economics, international relations, journalism, mathematics, modern languages, music, physical education, physics, political science, psychology, secretarial studies, sociology and zoology.

## 76% Favor Flying To Save Time, Survey Reveals

Seventy-six per cent of the Idaho students who filled out the air transport survey circulated by Argonaut representatives last week would travel by air according to tabulations made from the answers. A total of 343,819 miles would be flown both ways—with 1,528 as the average distance for each student—and \$90 a year as the average student cost.

Many students living in or near Moscow or in northern Idaho did not fill out the questionnaire, but of the 295 who did, 225 indicated that they preferred air travel.

Reasons listed for air travel varied for men and women, with 82 per cent of the women going by air because it saves time and 70 per cent of the men using this reason. Only three women, or 1.2 per cent, and no men said that they felt people in their circumstances should travel by air, while 11 per cent of the men and 18 per cent of the women admitted they would fly for the thrill and novelty of it.

Forty-three per cent of the men and 40 per cent of the women would travel by air because of the expense, while eight per cent of the men and six per cent of the women have plenty of time for other modes of travel. Three per cent of the women and only two per cent of the men think it isn't safe.

The sophomores seem to be in the biggest hurry, because 88.5 per cent of them would travel by air to save time, while percentages among the other classes range in the seventies. Twenty per cent of the freshmen would go for the thrill and novelty of it, while the more reserved seniors indicated a mere 7.1 percentage for this reason. And, the seniors with their 7.8 per cent indicated a greater fear of air travel than did the freshmen, with only 2.5 per cent listing this reason.
