Cardinal Key Sponsors Campus Drive For Russian War Relief

In cooperation with the Inter-faith committee for Russian War Relief, Cardinal Key will begin a drive on the university campus for food and clothing as a goodwill contribution to Russian families. Contributions for one food kit from each sorority house have already been made through Pan-Hellenic funds, as well as the pledged support of independent men's and women's houses and fraternities.

Estimated cost of each food kit is four dollars. Cardinal Key members, under the direction of Pat Hagan, president, will collect money for the kits in addition to purchasing materials and packing the boxes. Donations from the student body will be attributed to the state goal of 800 kits which must be prepared by April 1.

Cardinal Key representatives in each house will take charge of collecting clothing which will be sent with the kits. Working with the campus committee is Mrs. William Banks, acting chairman of the Moscow group.

Harrison C. Dale, honorary chairman of the Moscow committee, urged campus support through financial contributions to the food drive. He spoke of the food kits which the Cardinal Keys will pack as containing "a very suitable group of articles."

With reference to the clothing drive, President Dale stated: "It is a decidedly worth while project because it is a drive in which ordinary things count for so much. What they need is clothing. The drive is one in which everyone can feel a personal interest because he can give a personal possession as his contribution."

Included in the food kits is sugar, soup mix, evaporated milk, bouillon cubes, cookies, candy, a sewing kit, soap, knitting needles, adhesive tape, bandage, cigarettes, tobacco, cigarette papers, hand towels, and work gloves. Contents of each kit follows specifications determined by the national committee.

Lt. Berllus Killed At Iwo Jima

Lt. Veto Barsilowski, known to the University of Idaho as Vic Berllus, was killed in the battle of Iwo Jima, March 1, according to a marine corps telegram received by Mr. and Mrs. Ward Gano, parents of his wife, the former Mary Gano.

Graduating from the University of Idaho in 1943, Lieutenant Berllus married Miss Gano just before his graduation. His marine corps officer training was taken at Parris Island, North Carolina while in college, he was affiliated with Phi Delta Theta fraternity and was listed in the Who's-Who in American Colleges. He was a member of the varsity football and baseball teams and was Pacific coast heavyweight boxing champion. The New York Giants professional football team had signed him to play after the war.

Organization Gets Funds For Cattle

Members of the Inland Empire Aberdeen-Angus association recently gave the University of Idaho \$2,500 with which to purchase foundation animals to establish a herd of the black cattle at the university.

Prof. C. W. Hickman, head of the animal husbandry department, used part of this grant for the purchase of four heifers early in March. Although the university has been using steers of this breed for nearly 15 years at the Caldwell branch experiment station, they have not been used in the Moscow agricultural department.

The repairing being effected will include the raising of the floor three feet and the complete refinishing of the interior with celotex walls and ceiling. The entrance will also be improved upon with a main reception hall inside.

Singing Orchestra To Appear In South Idaho

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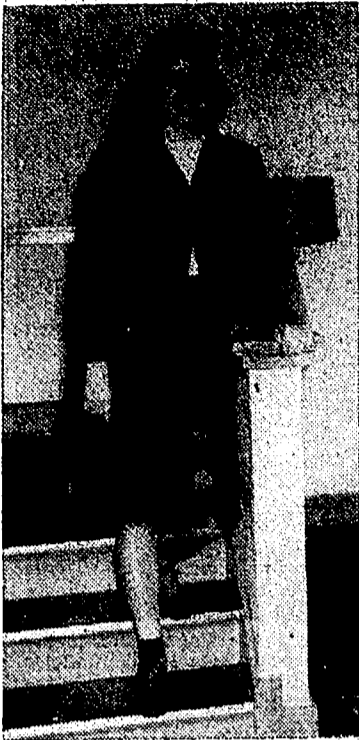

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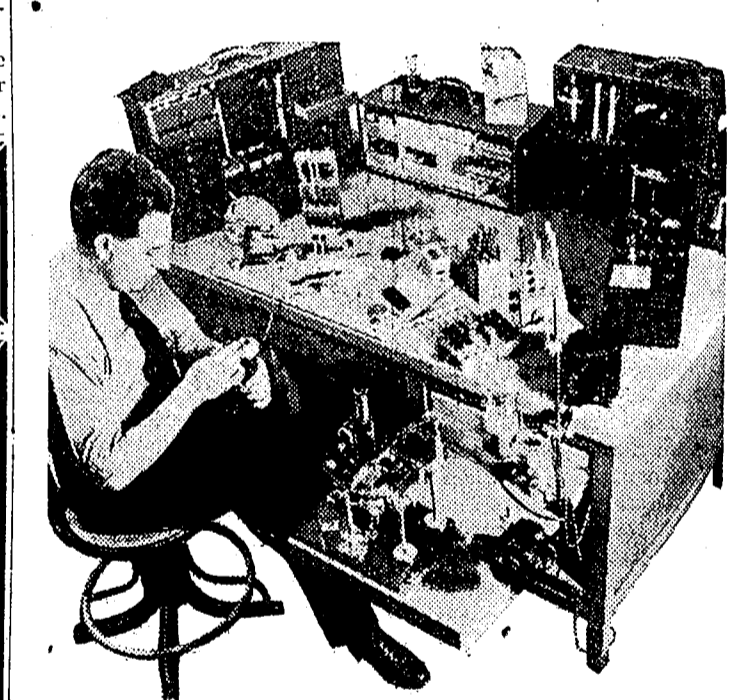
