The rising of Italian partisan forces in northern Italy, culminating in the seizure of Milan, Genoa and Turin, and finaland Virginia Campbell, not way desired and surveying work for and was affiliated with Beta Thely in the capture and execution of Benito Mussolini, signalize the beginnings of a potentially powerful peoples' movement ried with problems of gov't, were interests. in that country. Northern Italians, smarting under the yoke of the Nazis, rose spontaneously to defy them. The fact that they were able to do this under German occupation gives some indication as to the apparent strength of their forces. The dispatch with which they executed Mussolini and his murred. followers gives a cue to their determination to rid the country of Fascist criminals.

Just how the Allied military authorities will deal with the partisans remains to be seen. Now that the Germans in Italy have capitulated, the juncture of the allies and the partisan forces should be immediate. The British will undoubtedly oppose the continued existence of an armed partisan within Italy. In the first place, the partisan group is of a leftist character. Secondly, its continued existence would threaten the position of the Bonomi puppet government.

A great deal depends on the aims of the partisans. Allied insistence on disarmament may turn Italy into a second Greece. The Italian people are resentful of the Bonomi government and its failure to pursue efficient rehabilitation measures. The future of Italy may well hang on the relations between the Allied authorities and the north Italian par-
