# Journalism Dept. Publishes Composite Of Newspapers

Expected to reach into the offices of every weekly newspaper publisher in Idaho, the composite of weekly newspapers for weekly papers to be published early in January by the University of Idaho department of Journalism, will be the fourth in the Journalism Bulletin series started over a year ago, Dr. William F. Swindler, head of the department and editor of the bulletins, announced Tuesday. This bulletin, which will contain the best points of Idaho weeklies with the addition of several papers in Oregon and Washington, is to be compiled into several ideal weekly newspapers.

An attempt will be made, through these several "ideal" weeklies, to assist the publishers of weekly papers throughout Idaho to edit more readable and interesting newspapers.

As the only institution west of the Rocky mountains to publish such a bulletin series, the University of Idaho has created it for the benefit of weekly and daily newspaper publishers throughout the state.

Every newspaper in the state received the first number of the series, "The Weekly Newspaper and the Editorial," which came out in July, 1944. "Legal Advertising Rates of the 48 States," the second bulletin, contained research work compiled especially for the Idaho State Editorial association. As it proved to be so popular, a second publication was planned and a review of the bulletin had to be made and published by the National Publisher magazine, Dr. Swindler stated.

# Booklet Reports Scholarships Bring Students

Approximately 450 Idaho men and women have attended the University of Idaho under Carl Raymond Gray scholarships, reports C. W. Hickman, head of the department of animal husbandry, in a booklet just published by the Union Pacific in commemoration of the 25th anniversary of the scholarship program instituted by the late president of the railroad and being carried on in his memory. The Idaho summary reveals 241 awards made in the field of vocational agriculture and 489 to 4-H club members. Scholarships actually used totaled 193 for vocational agriculture and 254 for 4-H club winners.

The booklet indicates that during the quarter century since the first scholarships were awarded, more than 4,500 of the \$100 awards have been given to farm boys and girls in the 176 counties served by the Union Pacific in 11 states. To date, 1,180 of the scholarships have been utilized by students in vocational agriculture and 1,188 by 4-H club members. Because of the war many of the winners during the last four years have not been able to make use of their awards.

In addition to a statement by Professor Hickman, in charge of scholarships at the University of Idaho, the silver anniversary booklet contains statements by Stanley S. Richardson, Idaho state supervisor of agricultural education, and D. E. Warren, state 4-H club specialist, on what the scholarships have meant to farm youth of Idaho.
