The student body assembly which was held Tuesday morning, was very enlightening to yours-truly, and all the other new students on this campus, who were uninformed as to the scholastic awards which are annually presented to the students who earn them.

One interesting sidelight, which we believe should be a highlight, was the awarding of the Freshman Trophy for the highest Scholastic standing. This trophy was awarded to John Taylor, who is now serving in the U. S. Navy, with a grade average of 3.91. Not only was John a superlative student, but he was one of the outstanding athletes of the 1944 track season.

John Taylor and Jack Anderson were the only track men in the Pacific Northwest, who were invited and attended the Central Collegiate Track Meet at Chicago, Ill., and the National Collegiate Track Meet at Milwaukee, Wis. Both of these men, accompanied by Coach Mike Ryan, travelled to these two meets representing the University of Idaho and the Pacific Northwest.

John, who was seventeen years old at the time, won the 120-yard hurdle event at the Central Collegiate. At the National Collegiate a week later, accompanied by the nervous tension which is natural at the first attempt in the "Big Time," John hit three hurdles in this same event and finished in fifth place. Although winding up with fifth place in this event, it is interesting to note that the men who finished one, two, three, four ahead of John, were in the same order, only behind him, the week previous.

We feel that John has proven himself not only a grade "A" student, but an outstanding athlete. His accomplishments should be an incentive to other athletes, to achieve an end not only in athletics, but also in scholastic standing.

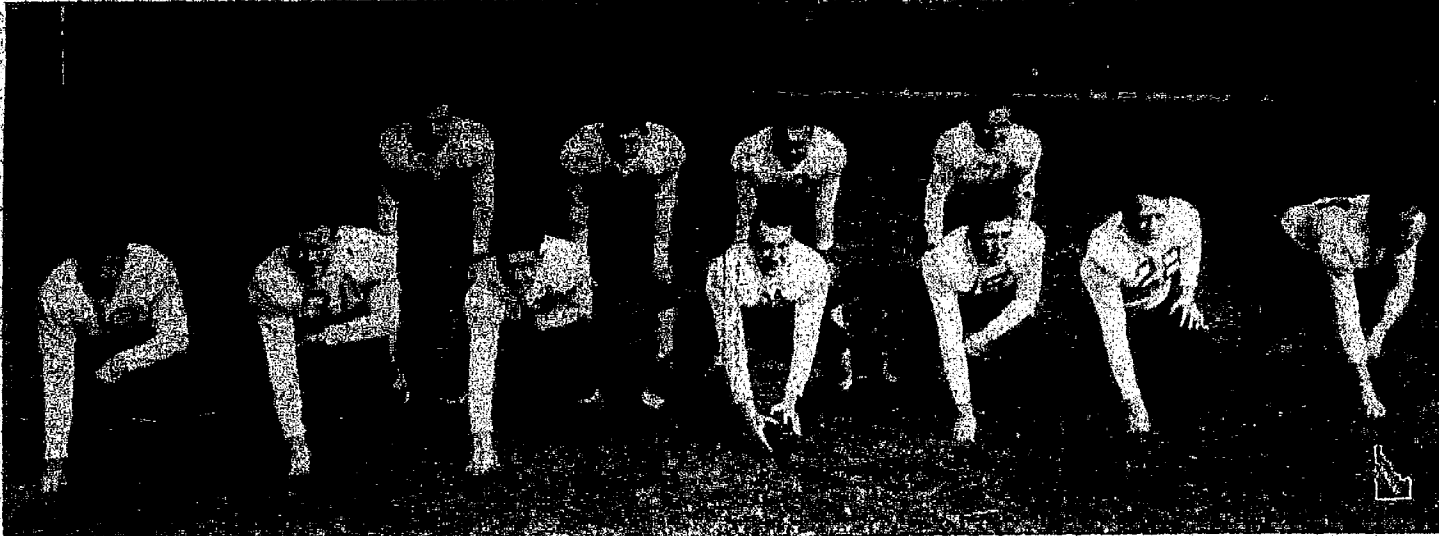

Vandal Harriers And Track Men Respond to Call

A turnout of 30 cross-country and 10 track aspirants greeted Coach Mike Ryan this week in preparation for the fall schedule. Coach Ryan remarked that this turnout was the largest since the war started.

The first meet has been tentatively set for October 20 with the University of Montana here, the same day the Montana Grizzlies meet the Idaho Vandals in the Homecoming gridiron battle.

A meet with W.S.C. has been definitely scheduled for October 27 at Pullman, when the Vandal and Cougar football squads will again tangle.

October 26 has been set as a tentative date for a civilian-navy intramural meet.

The cross-country squad will journey to Walla Walla to meet the Whitman squad on November 9. Eastern Washington College at Cheney has been asked by Idaho for a dual meet there on November 3.

On November 16 the Inland Empire Cross-Country Race will be held here. This is a race for colleges, junior colleges and universities. W.S.C., Whitman and Idaho definitely will attend. Institutions having yet to reply include Gonzaga, North Idaho Teachers College, E.W.C., Coeur d'Alene Junior College, Whitworth and the University of Montana.

Men back from last year out for cross-country include Jack Anderson, veteran cross-country star and Northwest two-mile distance champion, Art Humphrey, Ray Hall, LeRoy Beeson, Walt Smith and Dean Mosher and Chuck Larson of last spring's track squad.

Rowe, Dick Hardin, Bryan Hopkins, John Rameka, Bob McLaughlin and Dick Lingfelter; the last three returned veterans and members of pre-war squads.

Others are Joe Rumble, Robert Pruitt, Phillip Johnson, Kenneth Curtis, Robert Peifers, John Shuck, Jack Clayton, Lee Balderson, Herman Tilley, Linwood Case, Paul Anderson, John Benscoter, Alvin Denman and John Peterson.

Intra-squad track meets will be held the end of next month. Track men out include Ben Martin, Kenny Smith, Wayne Johnson, Don Haynes, John Johnson, Frank Knapp, Delbert Lindley, Dick McKevitt, Bob Ryan and Gerald Smith.

Coach Mike Ryan said that although it is too soon to make any predictions, the team members are working hard and are very enthusiastic, which is 59 per cent of the game.
