

This week a three-person planning committee was ap-pointed by the executive board to investigate the possibilitis and propensities of obtaining a new student union. Attempts have been made in this direction in the past, but have failed because they consisted merely of screaming loudly over the need, but presenting no substantial evidence to support the cries.

The committee is divided into parts, each with a definite objective in view. When the completed project is ready for revelation, or presentation to the board of regents, the issue will be unavoidable, sidestepping will be impossible.

The present student union building is unquestionably rap-idly becoming too small to adequately serve an expanding student body. The history of the "Bucket" is shrouded in mystery. Erected in 1937, it was financed by a bond issue, the bonds being held by the board of regents. 


