## TIPS FOR VETS

As a reminder to former veteran students and a little info to the new vet-on-campus here are a few of the important places on the campus to remember: the Vets Counsellor in the Dean of Men's office, the bulletin board outside his office, the guidance center in the university classroom building, and the VA contact office in the post office building. Briefly here are the functions of each which may concern vet students:

Vets' counsellor: Guidance and counselling in relation to personal problems, academic problems, and married veterans' housing.

Vets' bulletin board: Here you will find all the latest notices from the VA concerning pay, housing notices, jobs, etc.

Guidance center: Change-of-address forms are obtainable here along with statements to be used during registration in lieu of a certificate of eligibility if that hasn't been received. Public 16 men are required by law to take the advisement program offered by the center to aid in selection of a vocational objective. Public Law 346 men can take this if they so desire. Approval is given here for changing a course of study and also approval for Public 16 men to accept part-time employment in addition to the regular university schedule. Four absences from classes will chalk off one day's pay so it would be well to arrange with the guidance center before any long absences are going to take place. Advise-ment and counselling are the general functions of the VA guidance center.

VA contact office: Reinstatement, conversion, and waiver of premiums of national service life insurance are handled in the downtown office along with applications for disability compensation or pension, applications for loans for homes, non-emergency treatment, and applications for sugar rations and surplus war commodities.

Veterans living now at temporary addresses are urged by the VA to list their mailing addresses as: General Delivery, University Station, Moscow, Idaho. C. O. Decker, Veterans Counsellor, wants this to be especially remembered by all new veterans on the campus. Postal regulations prohibit the forwarding of veterans' subsistence checks so mainly for the veteran's own sake this request is being made. Then as soon as the new student veteran finds permanent housing he will report his address to the VA and his checks will be mailed directly to him.

A campaign in the university last semester proved successful when it was announced that the new VA sub-regional office is to be located here in Moscow. This should cut a lot of red-tape for vets in arranging affairs with the VA since they may deal directly with the VA here instead of waiting for the word from the Boise office.

## Gymnasium Holds Overflow Of 300

Dean H. E. Lattig has revealed that although there is still a critical shortage of housing facilities, all married couples have been taken care of. However, there are still approximately 100 couples not on the campus who are waiting for housing.

He commented upon the fact that the Moscow people have cooperated in providing housing for some of these couples for several days. The new housing project was to be finished by Sept. 15, but due to the fact that the "sanders" quit working, the floors were not finished. This meant that the couples had to be housed in the town until veterans housing was completed.

Approximately 300 single men have been housed in Memorial gymnasium. At the present time mattresses are available, but bunks are being brought down from Spokane for them.

## Pocatello Takes Army Buildings

The University of Idaho southern branch at Pocatello will be given the use of buildings recently released by the army air force at Pocatello air base, Gov. Arnold Williams announced this week.

Among the buildings are three structures with capacity for between 100 and 150 veterans, plus several barracks for single veterans, a former officers' quarters and club, and a portion of a hospital building.

Buildings will remain at their present site on the air base and officials announced they would institute a bus service between the school and the air base.

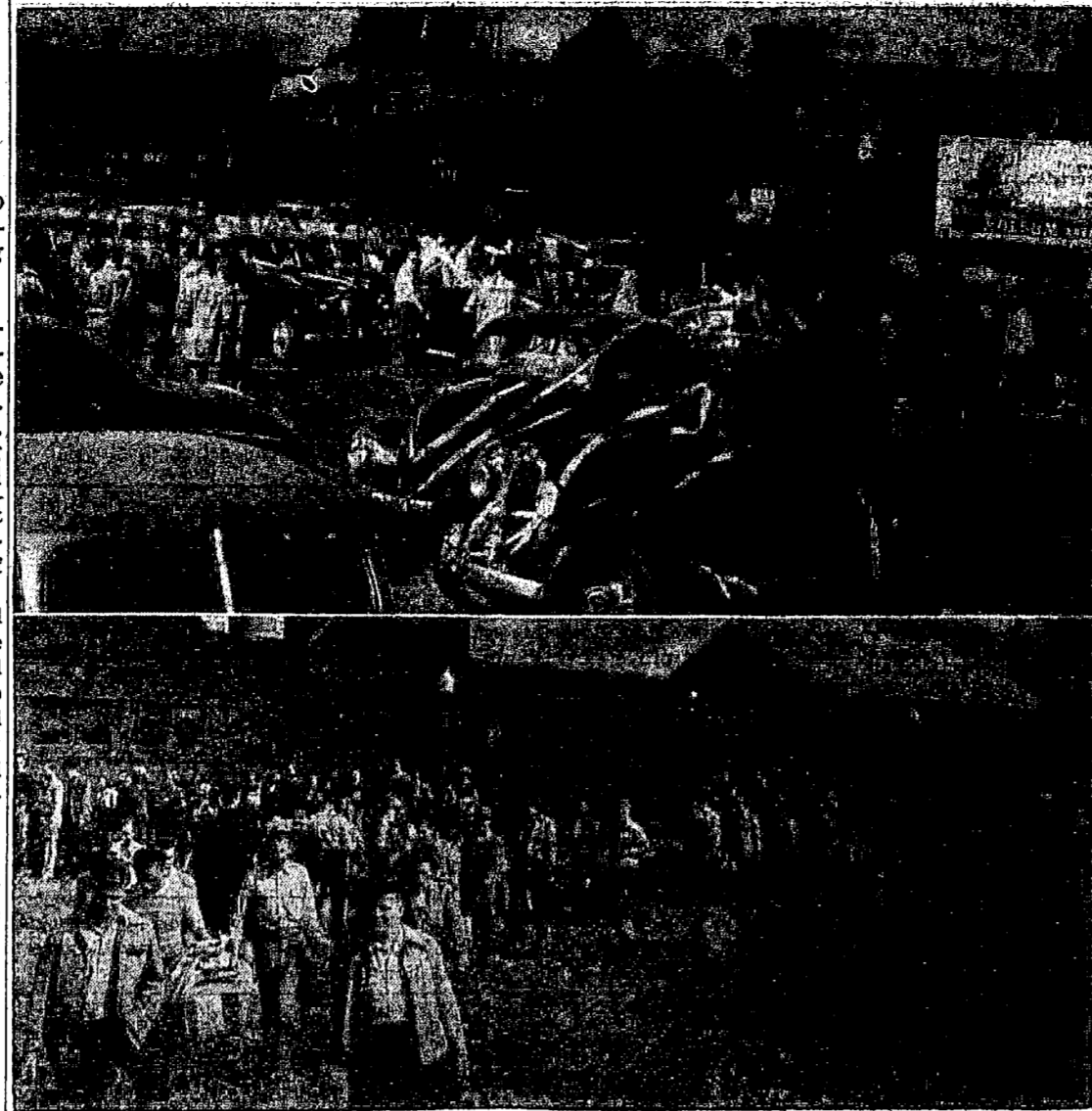

## Vandal Star Takes Reins As Freshman Mentor

Steve Belko, former all-conference basketball player and football halfback at Idaho, will probably assume freshman (junior varsity) football coach duties Saturday, according to George Greene, Athletic Director. Belko was appointed to the position, unfilled since 1942, by President J. E. Buchanan yesterday, subject to approval by the board of regents.

Belko was graduated from the University of Idaho in 1939, after winning three varsity letters in football and three in basketball. In his senior year, he was co-captain of the Vandal basketball team.

His first coaching assignment after graduation was at St. Maries high school, Idaho. In 1940 he became assistant football and head

basketball coach at Lewiston high school, and the next year head coach for both sports. He has held those positions since then, except for three years of naval service.

During the war he was a communications officer on a ship plying the Alaskan and South Pacific waters in anti-submarine work. He was placed on inactive duty in April of this year with the rank of lieutenant, junior grade. His home is Gary, Indiana.

their registration blanks after tomorrow in the office of the dean of college in which they were last registered. Registration blanks for students owing the bursar will be held in the registrar's office until authorization is received from the bursar for their releases.

### Change Courses

For students who wish to change their curriculum, the registration blank and a change of curriculum card are to be secured from the dean of the college in which the student was last registered. The duplicate record should then be transferred to the new college and registration completed in this curriculum. The change of curriculum card must then be filed with the registration blank. The procedure for old students is then the same as for those entering for the first time.

Transfers from the Southern Branch are supposed to have a notice of acceptance of transfer. If they do not, one may be obtained at the registrar's office. Students having this notice may obtain their registration blank in the office of the dean of the college in which they plan to register. The rest of the program is then the same as for other students.

Incidentally, the offer made August was approximately \$400 increase.

Washington State has announced cross sectional boxing matches; Idaho has no boxing coach and has announced no scheduled matches.

This is legal as long as the team remains set for one second, but it will be difficult for the officials to determine a second delay.

## High School Coach Named To Combined Position

Stanley J. Hiserman, former Stanford track star, was named yesterday as track coach and trainer by President J. E. Buchanan, subject to confirmation by the board of regents. Hiserman will fill the position vacated when Michael J. Ryan accepted a similar position at the University of Wyoming.

Hiserman comes to the University of Idaho from Gonzales Union high school, California, where he was head coach.

A sprinter and hurdler, Hiserman went through his college paces under "Dink" Templeton at Stanford, and was on the team which now holds the world's record in the sprint relay. He won three letters in track and was captain of the 1939 track team at Stanford during his senior year.

Upon graduation, he became head trainer for all sports at Stanford while doing graduate work in physical education. This era included the Shaughnessy Rose Bowl football team.

After receiving his master's degree from Stanford, Hiserman became head track and basketball coach at Salinas Union high school, California, where his team won the league championship. He then served in the air forces for 42 months, leaving service this year as a captain and becoming head coach at Gonzales high school. He will fill the vacancy on the Idaho coaching staff left by Mike Ryan in accepting the track coach position at the University of Wyoming.
