Hickman To Direct Chicago Program

C. W. Hickman, head of the department of animal husbandry, is acting this week as program chairman for the International Livestock Exposition and Horse Show, which opened Saturday in the International Amphitheatre at the Chicago Stock Yards.

He continued to Chicago without returning to Moscow, following livestock shows at San Francisco and Pocatello earlier last month.

The 47th annual exposition ends December 7, and has not been held recently due to a war-time lapse of five years.

Entries have been made by stockmen from 35 states and Canada. All pre-war records were broken in the number of entries of prime heaves, lambs, and hogs listed for the junior classes, which were judged Saturday. A total of 1,822 animals were entered.

Another feature Saturday was the national livestock judging contest for agricultural college students, which scored the contestants on their ability to judge classes of beef cattle, draft horses, sheep, and swine.

Vandals Face City College Test In New York Tonight

Beavers Favored On Home Floor

A dark-horse Vandal team will carry the hopes of Idaho basketball fans all of the way to New York tonight, as they seek to upset a powerful City College of New York quintet in Madison Square Garden. This game will be the first an Idaho team has played on this famed basketball court, and it also will open the doors of the "Garden" for the first basketball fracas of the season.

Vandals Underdogs
The Vandals, who left Moscow by train Thursday, November 28, worked out yesterday at the City College gymnasium, and although they are defending Northern division Pacific Coast champs, will go into the game rated underdogs to the strong Beavers, who sport the strongest potential team in the east. Even their perennial pessimistic coach, Nat Holman, reported: "It is potentially the greatest team I've ever had." The Beavers rely on a lightning-fast break and speedy ball-handling to win games, and in contrast to Idaho's big boys, average about five feet ten inches in height. They have some reserves, however, who average above the six foot mark.

Expected to start for the Vandals are forwards Fred Quinn and Grant Mortenson, center Jack Phoenix, and guards Bill Carbaugh and Jack Wallace or Norm Fredrick. The New York squad's starting lineup will probably be Paul Schmones and Sid Trubowitz, forwards; Phil Farman, center; and Hilly Shapiro and Lionel Malamed, guards.

Following tonight's contest, the Idaho crew will move on to Convention hall in Philadelphia for a game with St. Joseph's University on December 7. From there, they play the University of Kentucky at Lexington, December 9; University of Kansas at Lawrence, December 11; University of Wyoming at Laramie on December 13 and 14; and end the trip playing in south Idaho December 17 and 18.

Belko Cuts Jayvee Squad Down To Twenty Men

The first cut of the newly formed junior varsity basketball team was made yesterday by Coach Steve Belko, who listed twenty men whom he has picked to work with in the coming playing season.

This is not the final cut, however, as several promising basketballers who just ended the football season have indicated their intentions of turning out for the squad. Belko stated that he would make another cut later when he has seen some of these boys in action.

So far this year, the junior varsity team has consisted of up to 35 members, and has concentrated mainly on fundamentals. According to Belko, the team will continue to work on fundamentals until after the Christmas vacation, when they open their regular season. No games have been scheduled for the team until after the holidays, and then they will play preliminaries to each of the varsity's home games. Also on tap for the jayvees this year is a week's trip in southern Idaho. Nothing definite on this trip has been decided yet, but it is now being worked on.

The lack of heat and hot water in the gymnasium has prevented the team from working out so far this week, but as soon as the coal situation eases, regular practices will be resumed.

Scribe Says Brown's Release Will Not Solve Problem

Sportswriters have written reams the last couple of weeks concerning the status of Idaho and Montana in the Pacific Coast Athletic Conference. It seems that the big California schools are working to push us out and our Northern Division brothers are noncommittal. In the meantime, the University of Montana is saving face—their president, James McCain, is taking steps to get the Missoula institution into the Big Seven football conference.

Axe Ready to Fall
It seems that with the axe sharpened and about to swing, some action or indication of action should be forthcoming from our athletic officials. So far Vandal athletic director, George Greene, is sticking to his "Silence is Golden" rule.

The closest thing to an explanation is the paragraph in Babe Brown's resignation stating "he is withdrawing because of Idaho's position in the Pacific Coast Conference and at the request of Athletic Director Greene."

We will all have to agree that Brown's two year coaching record of only two wins in 16 games certainly couldn't have impressed our larger conference brothers and probably wouldn't warrant his being retained in that position for another year. However, to intimate that the Babe is responsible for the present California "Head Hunting" is wrong. The fact of the matter is, it was a vote cast by Athletic Director Greene for the Pacific Coast Conference - Big Nine Rose Bowl tie-up that really broke the ice.

Oregonians Didn't Vote
Greene had three choices at the fatal conference meeting a couple of weeks ago: He could vote with Southern California and UCLA in their effort to have unbeaten Army as one of the opponents in the New Year's day classic; he could vote with four other schools lined up behind the Big Nine deal; or he could follow the lead of Oregon and Oregon State and refrain from voting. This appeared to be the wise thing to do. However, Idaho, whose past showing in basketball, boxing, and track has more or less offset the sour taste of her football losses and has kept the Vandals on a more firm footing than the Grizzlies, voted wrong and is now on the block with Montana.

To some of us who can remember back as far as the spring of 1941, it is "quite ironic that Idaho's conference status should be coming up again. That was the year efficient Ted Bank and his well liked assistants, Bob Tesler and Forest Twogood were given the well known "heave-ho" in favor of the present staff. At that time, Idaho was enjoying only a "half-brother" status in the conference and was re-admitted to

Idaho Drops Last Game To Fresno State 13 to 12

The Idaho Vandals wound up their football season on Thanksgiving day with a loss (their eighth out of nine games) to Fresno State, 13-12, at Fresno. A successful conversion for the Fresno Bulldogs proved to be the margin of victory.

Idaho took an early lead, two minutes after the kickoff, as Halfback Willard Beltz broke through right guard and raced fifty-nine yards to score standing up. Overgaard's conversion try was not good.

Fresno State came back in the second period to score on a short pass from Allain to Kelley to knot the score at six all. Allain's attempted conversion failed.

Idaho struck again in the same period when Quarterback Bill Williams heaved a 32-yard pass to Halfback Johnny Christiansen, who went over to score. Again Idaho missed the conversion.

In the final period, after pass interference gave them the ball on the Idaho eleven-yard marker, the Bulldogs scored again. Allain's game-deciding conversion was good.

In nine games this year, Idaho has scored 64 points to the opposition's 247.

Idaho's Vandals made a game try to lift the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate cross-country title from the University of British Columbia at Seattle Thanksgiving day, but fell four points short so had to be content with second place for the third year in a row. The Canadians demonstrated good team strength in regaining their title with a low of 42 points to Idaho's 46.

In leather-lunged Vic Dyrgall, however, the Vandals produced the individual winner. Vic was all by himself as he finished the rugged four-mile course in the very good time of 19 minutes and 50 seconds. His nearest competitor, Bob Percy of British Columbia, trailed by 350 yards. Third and fourth finishers were Ward Stroschein and Art Humphrey of Idaho. They were closely followed by Doug Knott of British Columbia and Al Lawson of Washington State.

Trailing behind British Columbia and Idaho in the team standings were W.S.C. with 56, O.S.C. with 97, Washington with 107, and Oregon with 177.
