

At the present time veterans are being allotted housing on the basis of "first come, first served." This means that those who were released from service early enough to place their names on the housing list when it originated will be given a place to live as soon as such facilities are available.

Washington State college has solved the problem in a much more effective way, Jason believes. They have discarded the chronological list of names in favor of a system based on points. Veterans who have most need of housing will therefore receive it first. A system such as this could operate quickly and efficiently at Idaho, too.

A schedule of figuring out points to be given each married couple can be determined as WSC determines theirs. For instance, only veterans of World War II who are either previous students or have qualified for admission are eligible to make application for married students' housing.

In adapting the system to Idaho, a specified number of points should be given to residents of this state. Points should also go to families for each child or expected child. Previous students at Washington State college are being allowed preference points on this basis: freshmen and sophomores, 2; juniors, 3; and seniors, 4. The system would be satisfactory at this institution also.

Veterans on that campus will be allowed points for each half-year's performance of active duty in World War II, and also for each ten per cent of physical disability pension payment which a disabled veteran receives.

Also in the system is the statement that in case the total number of points for two applicants are equal, preference would be given to the older applicant. The date of application has no bearing on the selection.

The shortage of space for students with children in the town of Moscow would be alleviated if those families could move into housing units. If a point system were established, veterans who deserve immediate housing would be given adequate places to live—even if their names appeared on the present list at a relatively late date chronologically.

A short business meeting will also be held. Because of the difficulty of getting accommodations, this will not be a dinner meeting but refreshments can be obtained for a small cost.

"To investigate and report on Idaho's athletic situation," is the assignment given a special committee appointed by the "I" club at a meeting last night.

After a comprehensive discussion of the athletic situation at the university, the athletes chose the investigating committee method as the best means of accomplishing their objective.

Objective of the committee as set up by the club will be to "investigate and report on the athletic situation at the University of Idaho at present and to recommend to the proper authorities suggestions for improving Idaho's position in the Pacific Coast conference."

The athletes stated that our athletic situation is "unhealthy" but cannot be remedied by the ruthless hiring and firing of coaches. They also stated that by this investigation, they hope to help establish a more lasting and successful athletic program. Their investigation will be pursued in the following fields:

- A. Administration.
  1. Physical Education.
  2. Intercollegiate Athletics.
- B. Financing.
  1. From physical education funds.
  2. From associated student funds.
- C. Athletic Schedules.
  1. Making of schedules more advantageous to Idaho teams.
  2. Making schedules more enjoyable to Idaho students.

The working committee chosen to conduct the investigation is composed of Bill Williams, chairman; Ted Thompson, Bob Vonderharr, Vic Dyrvall, and Ben Ryan. Spoke To President

Further! They have had a dance! In the Blue Bucket! With young ladies in attendance!

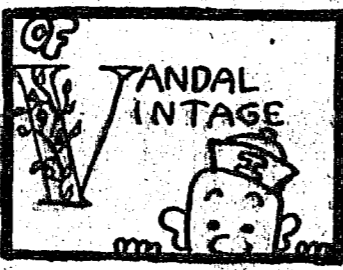

## Pests To Be Hit In Conference

Insecticides, spray work, and spray equipment will be the topics up for discussion at the state-wide spray conference held Thursday and Friday in the entomology building. Professor H. C. Manis, entomology head, stated that available commercial products and a new insecticide soon to be available will also be discussed.

On Thursday, the meeting began with a discussion of insect pests involved in customs spray operations, and continue with a consideration of biological hosts, giving descriptive types of damage and destructive stages.

This will be followed by control and custom operation experiences of the previous pest season (summer of 1946), giving detailed information of pest cattle grubs and cattle lice. Colored movies of sheep ticks and the question of the housefly and earwigs will be included in this information.

At the meeting today the discussion of hog lice, cockroaches, silverfish, and insect pests will be followed by a talk on weed control at 11 a. m. by Lambert C. Erickson, associate agronomist.

In the afternoon Dr. Glen Holm, university veterinarian, will talk on the value of insect control from the standpoint of animal health. A discussion of advertising and the utilization of photography, salesmanship and service will conclude the meeting.

At twelve o'clock the Athletic Director was again questioned by Hunchbach and the director said he would still have to see "so and so." Exclaimed Hunchbach, "See 'so and so,' B.S., here's the keys; I quit!"

After two or three individuals took a crack at the equipment room during which much loss in efficiency of former years, two men were finally hired to do what one man had done formerly. One receives \$130 a month, ten dollars less than Hunchbach received; the other salary is unknown but it must bring the combined salaries well over the old equipment room manager's salary.

Faithful old Jim is out of a job. Idaho is spending more money.
