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## 'Let There Be Light'

"The career of an artist always begins tomorrow." The above words were once used to describe the tenacity of Thomas Alva Edison, scientist, inventor, and sincere American. Edison was no artist in the accepted meaning of the word, but he "lived for the future" during the peak of an industrial age that saw his inventive capacities better the lives of millions of human beings.

Today is the hundredth anniversary of the birthday of the great inventor of the incandescent bulb, the phonograph, and the "kinetoscopic camera." His life was filled with one experiment after another, and inventors of today keep in mind the marvelous encouragement Edison received from his failures—the inexhaustible will and energy he directed toward his work characterized the true scope of greatness he won by his scientific endeavor.

Edison spent over \$40,000 and long patient years of his life before he first induced a loop of carbonized cotton to glow in a little vacuum bulb and thus put an end to the era of the kerosene lamp. Nevertheless, the inventor has been quoted as once remarking that, he received from the innovation of the phonograph more personal joy than from any other of his many inventions—even though he was caused by his deafness to call on friends to his workshop to help perfect the instrument.

New Jersey's adopted son (he was born in the small town of Menlo Park, Ohio) also contributed much toward the development of the telephone, radio, the telegraphic system, and the stock ticker. He also contributed countless hours of hard work designing methods of distributing electric light, heat, and power.

The inventor also won fame for his many anecdotes, and for his odd working habits. We can include among the latter his almost religious practice of engaging in research until two or three o'clock in the morning, and then getting all the sleep he needed in only three or four hours. "Lack of sleep never hurt anybody," Edison once said while laughing at the luxury of spending eight or more hours a night in a comfortable bed.

One of his most-quoted sayings came about in answer to a persistent reporter who wanted to know what the great scientist thought about the modern girl. The inventor snapped back: "Don't ask me anything about women: I don't understand them." Thus Edison, too, realized the folly of comprehensive study dedicated to the solution of man's biggest riddle.

Edison's birth on February 11, 1847, was unheralded and marked only by congratulations to his parents by their relatives and friends. But today, February 11, 1947, finds the whole world paying tribute to the man whose name has become synonymous with application, success, and the advancement of science.

## TIPS FOR VETS

A considerable amount of comment has been heard from veterans and veterans' organizations concerning the on-the-job ceilings which have cut many veterans' monthly checks. At a time when prices are so high and the living costs so high it seems that the law passed last August is a definite curb on any vet who has the initiative to get out and earn as much as he is able to on the side. From the taxpayers' standpoint a removal of the ceilings to enable vets attending school to earn as much as they are able is much more economical than other measures which have been suggested.

Representatives of the various veterans' organizations recently were granted a hearing before the house veterans affairs committee in congress and openly criticized the VA for recommending such a hastily-imposed law. They hope for a considerable increase in the ceilings if not an altogether repeal.

Originally enacted to prevent abuses that were discovered by the VA this law has worked undue hardship on those who have been fulfilling their obligation to the VA and now because of the dishonesty of a few all suffer. During the house hearing it was pointed out that 66 per cent of the veterans without dependents and 81 per cent of the veterans with dependents live away from the campus where the cost of living is higher. Cut out this law which cuts out the personal initiative of the veteran!

Dr. J. E. Kraus, professor of horticulture, left Sunday for Caldwell where he spoke at a meeting of Idaho Vegetable Growers yesterday. Dr. Kraus discussed work on freezing and canning of field crops in Idaho. It has been found that Idaho's climate is ideal for this field and the industry is growing to such proportions that the 1946 legislature appropriated a special fund for research in this field.

Dr. Kraus will also attend similar meetings at Boise and Lewiston to discuss some of the conclusions his research has proven.

A luncheon for dads and their sons and daughters will be given Saturday, and the Oregon vs. Idaho basketball game will be in the spotlight Saturday night. All dads are invited to visit any of the student residences after the game. Eugene churches will give special recognition to the occasion during the Sunday services.

The University of Idaho does not seem to be the only school having library trouble. Slow service in the circulation department is causing student complaints at the University of Washington. The principle reason for the poor service is the limited stacking space, which means that the books are scattered all over the building. Books are shelved in halls and offices, and are divided between the science and main stacks.

Library efficiency has been cut down by the inability to procure well-trained professional librarians. The only permanent relief in sight at the Seattle institution seems to be an addition to the library.

A committee of students participation has been appointed at the University of Utah to kindle the fire of school spirit. The committee will coordinate school affairs and foster participation in all events—with the entire student body cooperating.

Half-time stunts at the basketball games will be promoted; and the group is endeavoring to secure an ice-skating rink. Utah students hope that ice-skating will become a regular activity. During Founders' day activities, all business offices handling student activities will be open for inspection and explanation.

## College Congress Calls Delegates

Delegates to the second Pacific Northwest College Congress, meeting at Reed college March 6-8, will be named by the executive council today.

Thirty-seven colleges from the four northwestern states, Canada and Alaska will be represented at a conference aimed to strengthen student participation in international affairs.

The Portland League of Women Voters, who gave the original impetus to the idea, will again sponsor the event with Reed college. Added to the sponsors' list this year is the Northwest Institute of International Relations.



# DON'T QUOTE ME

'Way back in the year 1921, two new teams—Idaho and Southern California—were admitted to the Pacific Coast Conference. The Vandals "cracked" the conference wide open that year as they won eight straight conference games and were crowned undisputed coast champions. Aply coached by Dave MacMillan, the Vandals racked up 19 wins while losing only four games.

In the following year the Pacific Coast conference was divided into northern and southern divisions with Idaho, Oregon, Oregon State, Washington and Washington State forming the northern division. Again the amazing Vandals, led by their only other all-American, Al Fox, swept past all opposition and emerged victors over the Washington Huskies in a play-off series. Not content with the Northern division title, they blasted the University of California Bears two straight and again walked off with the Pacific Coast championship under their belt.

Following that season, years slipped by as the Vandals vainly attempted to regain the coveted honor of capturing the conference crown once more. But until 1946, the highest position on the conference ladder that they could obtain was second place in 1927 and 1929. Then in 1946 they became the "Cinderella" team of the Northern division as they fought "tooth and nail" down to the last game and finally regained the conference crown after 23 years.

During the 23 years that Idaho has enjoyed a position in the Northern division, no team has ever gone through the entire season without a win.

But the Vandals are in a spot where they can very easily be the first to attain this dubious record. Traveling to the Willamette valley for a four-game series with Oregon State and the University of Oregon, Idaho is a definite under-dog. To add to the difficulties, the Vandals meet the strong Beavers first and Oregon State is unbeaten on its home court. After a one-day rest Idaho will journey to Eugene where they will meet the improving Oregon Ducks. Already tired from their two-game series with the Beavers, the Vandals will be at a disadvantage in Eugene. On returning to the Palouse country, Idaho has but three remaining games, two with Oregon State in Moscow and one with Washington State at Pullman. These games could easily slip by without a Vandal win and thus leave the Idaho quintet deeply entrenched in the conference cellar with a record of 16 losses and no wins.

In last Saturday's game with Washington State, the Vandals missed their first good chance of breaking into the win column. Fans voiced their disapproval to the outcome of the game "long and loud" when a winning combination was broken up at what could have been the turning point in the game. Another \$64 question which held sway both during and after the game was "Why did Wendell Christensen, after playing such an inspiring first half, remain on the bench all but two minutes of the second canto?"

Steve Belko, junior varsity basketball coach, has two or three ball players on his baby Vandal team who are definitely "comers" for varsity competition. Hoopmen like Bill Eimers, Glenn Cushman, Tom Mendiola and maybe a few others will be watching in the near future. Jim Merrey, in his first game with the junior varsity, also showed basketball ability and gained himself a spot on the Vandal travelling squad for the Oregon series.

## Vandal Boxers Preparing For Card With Bulldogs

Idaho's unbeaten boxing squad will tangle with the Gonzaga university Bulldogs this Saturday night in the Memorial gymnasium in a return match. In their previous meeting the Vandals chalked up a 5 to 3 victory over the Bulldogs in Spokane.
