President Buchanan Discusses Athletic Situation In Letter To Alumni.

Idaho can make an athletic comeback with proper backing and understanding, President Buchanan said today in a letter being sent out to alumni and friends of the university. Dealing with the university's athletic situation, the letter attempts to explain what is wrong at Idaho athletically and what can be done about it.

Forty-Five Attend Hygiene Meeting

Approximately 45 people attended the first open meeting of the Mental Hygiene association in the upstairs lounge of the Student Union building Tuesday evening. Dr. Allan C. Lemon and Mr. C. H. Bond talked on "Student Counseling activities and their relation to mental hygiene." Mr. Bond described counseling as an important service for veterans in helping them to become adjusted and formulate a goal. Dr. Lemon discussed the aspects of counseling as applied to non-veteran students. Their talks were followed with a general discussion by the group.

Because of the absence of Laurence G. Goebel, president of the organization, the constitution and by-laws were not voted upon but will be at the next meeting to be held February 25. Harold Klobucher was appointed to plan the program which will be presented at the next meeting. Irwin Rinder, was program chairman for Tuesday's meeting.

The Independent Council met last night to nominate their representatives on the coming ticket. Both parties tentatively plan pre-election entertainment for the entire campus.

Regular Business Other business conducted by the executive board included the naming of two representatives of the student body at the Pacific Northwest College Congress. Betty Jean Ingraham and Irwin Rinder were selected from a list of six recommended by the International Relations Club.

Due to the inability of the registrar's office to supply Phi Eta Sigma with the statistics necessary to determine eligibility for the freshmen men's scholastic honorary, men who qualify are asked to contact representatives of the fraternity in the near future.

Those qualified include men who have just completed their first semester in college with a 3.5 or above grade average, and men who completed their first year last semester with an overall average of 3.5 or above.

Loyalty Needed Writing that help must come from all over the state, the president says "What this university needs right now is some sympathetic understanding of its problems, constant defense by its friends, some cash, some time, and above all else, loyalty."

Answering the question, what is being done about the athletic problem, President Buchanan said that (1) a new football coach is being selected, (2) the alumni of the state are being organized into a strong force, (3) the Placement service has been coordinated with the Director of Athletics to improve high school-university relations, and (4) other institutions, successful athletically, are being studied.

Opinion Studied Studies thus far, here at Idaho, have shown that the consensus of opinion is against dropping football. Opinion is also against withdrawing from the Pacific Coast conference.

Reviewing Idaho's football records in the past, the president showed that the university has played 324 games from 1893 to 1946. Exactly 132 of these were Idaho victories, 171 were losses, 19 were ties and 2 are unknown.

The selection of a new coach will not solve the problem, President Buchanan said. The records show that "Idaho has had 15 different football coaches since it began this sport in 1893. There have been five more football coaches than presidents of the university."

Date Is Selected For Formal Inter-Frat Dance

The ball will be held in the student union building, and such an arrangement, said Renfrow, may make it necessary to limit the sale of tickets in men's houses.

At the request of James Lyle, alumni secretary, the council also decided to obtain the addresses of individual house alumni to aid Lyle in his contact work.

Group Contacts Idaho Lawyers

Members of a committee appointed by the American Bar association to strengthen relations with law students in schools over the country recently contacted Acting Dean William Brockelbank in an effort to establish a liaison with the Idaho student lawyers.

The committee looks toward furthering such projects as employment counseling, stimulation of moot court activities, essay contests, and scholarship.

The Bench and Bar society of the university, including all law students, has authorized the acting dean to appoint a younger member of the faculty to represent the school and the students in cooperating with the American Bar association to further these purposes.

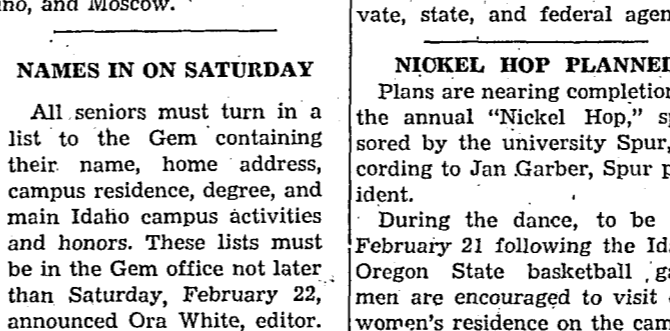

Students Attend College Congress In Portland

Betty Jean Ingraham and Irwin Rinder were named by the executive board Tuesday to attend the second Pacific Northwest College Congress at Reed college, Portland, March 6-8.

These delegates will do advance research on some phase of foreign policy or international administration to prepare them for sectional committee assignment in the conference on international affairs.

On hand to keynote the congress and address the final public meeting will be Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, recently named chairman of the section on human rights and civil liberties of the United Nations. She was a member of the American delegation which met the visiting Pacific Northwest College Congress representatives last year.

Other top national figures will also be on hand to add the weight of their experience, stated President Peter H. Odegaard of Reed college, who is heading arrangements. Main emphasis, however, will be upon sectional meetings at which delegates make their reports and recommendations.

Students included in the executive committee are Grant Skelley, University of Portland; John Elwood, Lewis and Clark; and Hans Linde, Reed college. All three are ex-GIs and veteran delegates to the first congress.

Idaho schools participating are the university, the College of Idaho, and Lewiston State Normal.

Spurs Present Annual Waddle

During the halftime of the WSC-Idaho basketball game played last Saturday night, the Idaho chapter of the Spurs, sophomore women's honorary, presented its traditional "Waddle" to the game audience.

Using lights fixed on their "I" caps, the 18 spurs performed in the darkened Memorial gymnasium several intricate marching movements, ending by singing "And here we have Idaho" in which the audience joined. Other marching routines and formations included the Shoe String, the Figure "8," and the formation of an "S" and the State of Idaho.

Lawyers Request New Exam Date

Law students submitted a recommendation to the Board of Commissioners of the Idaho State Bar Wednesday petitioning that the December bar examination should be moved up to September in 1947 and advocating a bar examination to be given in March, 1948.

Prior to the action taken by the students a request had been issued by the Commissioners that the students decide upon the desired time for the examinations.

These recommendations are going forward to the Board of Commissioners soon and probably will result in bar examinations being given in Idaho at more convenient times for the students. If a bar examination is given in September it will accommodate students graduating at the end of summer school as well as those who fail to pass the examination in June.

Debators Travel To Lewiston

Idaho will defend her right to possess the debate trophy sponsored by the Lewiston Chamber of commerce when she competes at Lewiston today in the annual triangular series between Lewiston Normal, WSC, and Idaho.

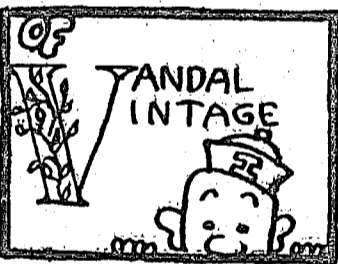
We can't agree completely with the professor about the bobby-sox transformation. Love, however, will always be a disease, and the veteran has no higher a degree of immunity than do other men.

TIPS FOR VETS

The Veterans Administration has requested that the following information be relayed to veterans on this campus. It mainly concerns one important point—that of non-receipt of checks. The sub-regional office at 113 South Main in Moscow now has things well in hand and a good majority of the action or information needed by veterans can be handled here. If correspondence with the Boise office is necessary the local office can tell you how to "write it right" in order to get speediest results.

Each month, hundreds of badly needed government checks are returned undelivered to the main Veterans Administration office in the state. The reason for this is that veterans who move fail to notify the VA of change of address thinking that by notifying the Post Office their checks will come to them as before. Both the VA and the Post Office must be notified to get things on the ball. Also give full name, address, service serial number, and, if you have one, your claim number, on all correspondence with the VA. Your own case file in Boise may be hard to find among the 35,000 others there and if all 35,000 of the veterans in the state with case files in Boise decide to write in at the same time, there will be more chance of action being taken first on those which are properly identified and therefore more easily located.

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Navy To Appoint Supply Officers

Qualified civilians will be accepted for appointments as ensigns, USN, and in the supply corps, according to a report from the Navy department.

Qualifications set forth are: (1) be a graduate of an accredited college or university, (2) be a native born or naturalized citizen for at least ten years, (3) be not less than 21 or more than 25 years of age on July 1 of the calendar year in which appointed, (4) be physically qualified, (5) establish mental, moral, and professional fitness.

House To Consider Emergency Fund

A bill which would appropriate \$230,475 from the current general fund to augment operation expenses at state educational institutions until June 30 was introduced in the Idaho house of representatives February 12.

The university would be chief recipient, with most of the funds allotted for increased salaries and wages already approved by the board of regents.

The university and its Moscow experiment station would receive \$35,890; the university extension division, \$12,670; and the veterans housing here, \$79,515.

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Unbeaten Vandal Boxers Tangle With Zags

Punchers Pointing For Fourth Win

With less than a month to go for the Pacific Coast Championship bouts in Sacramento, California, the unbeaten University of Idaho boxing squad is starting its last lap of intercollegiate boxing cards tomorrow night as they square off against the Gonzaga Bulldogs in the Memorial gymnasium. The Vandals are highly favored to cop the Pacific Coast championship by their recent win over the strong San Jose State boxing team in California.

Coach Ken Butler of the Vandals stated yesterday that the team was stronger and more experienced since their previous encounter with the Bulldogs and should do a better job or just as good as they did last time in Spokane. Idaho thumped Gonzaga five bouts to three last month, to chalk up its first win.

Watch Carlson

The feature bout of the evening is expected to be the 155-pound event, which pits Idaho's Herb Carlson against Dan Longpre. Carlson and Longpre fought a close one in their first meeting, with both battlers throwing their best punches until the final bell. Carlson floored his opponent in the second round and went on to gain the decision.

Bill Williams' fight with Bob Latendresse of the Bulldogs is expected to be another thriller in the 145-pound division. Williams won a decision over Latendresse last month in Spokane and is expected to repeat his performance over the Bulldog battler.

In the light-heavyweight division Warren Briggs, member of Idaho's 1943 boxing team, will tangle with Paul Gillcrest of the Bulldogs, although it is not known definitely whether the Gonzagans will appear, due to injuries. The Vandal team captain Laune Erickson scored an easy knockout over Gillcrest when the Vandals met the Bulldogs in Spokane.

Diehl Opposes Tremblay

Ted Diehl will take the 165-pound assignment for Idaho against Max Tremblay. Diehl and Tremblay did not appear in the first card between Idaho and Gonzaga, but it promises to be a good match. Diehl lost a close decision in his last go with San Jose State, but has a victory over Washington State in his credit.

Neumayer Fights

In the 125-pound event Ray Neumayer will be pitted against Art Radford if Neumayer doesn't move up into the 135-pound class. Neumayer is one of Gonzaga's classiest boxers and T.K.O'd Idaho's Ken Clark in Spokane last month.

The heavyweight division will feature Idaho's Larry Hanson against Don Jabbara of the Bulldogs; Jabbara was T.K.O'd by Hanson in the last meeting. Hanson will be seeking his fourth straight victory tomorrow night as he enters the ring.

The "Whitest of White" Pigments from Black Ore

It is a strange fact that the ninth most prevalent element in the earth's crust should have been regarded as "rare" for over a hundred years after its discovery in 1791. But that is the story of titanium, actually more abundant than zinc, copper, lead, tin, and nickel combined. One of the factors that have kept titanium from being better known is the difficulty of handling some of its compounds commercially.

If, as a student, you were to look up the equations for the manufacture of titanium oxide pigment, you might find something like this:

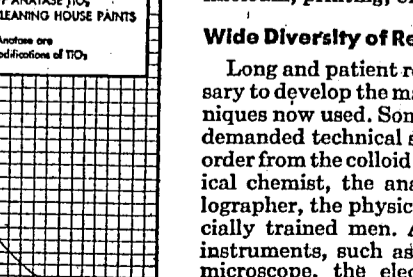

From these equations, the manufacture of the "whitest of white" pigments from black ilmenite ore appears to be chemically simple and straightforward. However, the processing required to obtain industrial titanium oxide of sufficient brightness, hiding power and fineness is more complicated than one would anticipate.

Controlling a Metastable System

The final product must have a particle size averaging 0.2 microns in radius and varying between 0.1 and 0.5 microns.



Wide Diversity of Research Problems

Long and patient research was necessary to develop the manufacturing techniques now used. Some of the problems demanded technical skill of the highest order from the colloid chemist, the physical chemist, the analyst, the crystallographer, the physicist, and other specially trained men. A wide variety of instruments, such as the petrographic microscope, the electron microscope, x-ray diffraction unit, ultra-centrifuge, and spectrophotometer were used in
