"Dixie" Howell, assistant football coach at the University of Alabama, and All-American in 1935, while sparking Alabama's Crimson Tide, has been signed to a two-year contract as head man of all Idaho football activities.

The following note was given to Jason by President Buchanan as an explanation of the manner in which the story was released:  
To the Students:  
It was my intention that the announcement of the new football coach should be timed to allow the students to read the news in their own newspaper—the Argonaut.  
Much to my disappointment the Moscow daily paper obtained the information from some source other than his office and printed the story two days before it was scheduled for official release.  
The action of the local paper made it necessary to give the name of the appointee to other Idaho and Inland Empire papers before the Argonaut could put the news in your hands.

The background may help. Since there are morning and afternoon papers in the state to be considered by the director of university publicity it was decided to give the story a morning release. ## 'Singleton' On A Tour?

The cast and singers, stage crew, director and producers of "Sing, Singleton, Sing" all rate a well-deserved pat on the back for their efforts in presenting a fine show. The production is large and all-embracing, but to our mind, the blending voices of the Vandaleers and the snappy pace set by the actors keep the play from faltering and induces in all who see it a feeling of pride in the university.

For that matter, it is the kind of play that has state-wide appeal. In suggesting that the production be presented in several of the larger cities throughout the state, we succumb again to our impulse of never letting Idaho forget about its state university. And we think it would make a hit because the indicativeness of a singing senator parked in a famous, familiar vacation-land is likely to interest audiences from Coeur d'Alene to Pocatello.

Of course there is more to it than just waving a magic wand and saying "O. K.—give the citizenry a thrill, and be sure to come back and go to school again." Plans have to be made, make-up assignments have to be done by students, and methods of financing the show on the road have to be ascertained. That indeed requires a great deal of hard work; nevertheless, it could be done—a state-wide run consisting of stops in Coeur d'Alene, Lewiston, Nampa, Boise, Twin Falls, Pocatello, and Idaho Falls could be completed in less than three weeks.

In our opinion, even an undefeated football team (we're dreaming again) would do less to publicize the University of Idaho among residents of this state than would a tour of "Sing, Singleton, Sing." Some students, no doubt, will disagree on that point. Tending an opinion, though, merely as part of the audience and not as Broadway critics, we sincerely laud the production, and call it one of the university's outstanding all-time stage achievements. —S.H.G.

## TIPS FOR VETS

### Dental Treatment

One of the many features of the new VA Sub-regional office in downtown Moscow is its ability to get applications for dental treatment through in a comparatively short time. One local dentist expressed amazement at the speed of the new office when he told a vet applying on Thursday for dental treatment and receiving approval in a few days.

On applying for dental disability now, every veteran receives an X-ray of his teeth which gives the VA Rating board a chance to see the condition of them and see if treatment is warranted. It's an improvement over the old haphazard method where nobody knew where to apply and when they did apply nobody knew for sure what would happen next.

Procedures For Applying When a vet applies for dental treatment he fills out the necessary form which is then processed. This involves looking up his service dental record and seeing which teeth were treated in the service. All teeth which received any type of work on them are subject to treatment by the VA if they are bothering a person. Some vets can easily remember the mass-production method of service dentists and swear that purple hearts would have been in order in many cases.

## KUOI Competes With Amateurs At Lindley

Three enthusiastic radio amateurs have given KUOI competition as a campus tuning-in spot at least as far as the 162 men of Lindley hall are concerned.

Louis Fortin, Richard Sprute, and Don Wenschell have pooled among themselves a phonograph, radio, 22 albums of records, and a little gadget called an oscillator that cuts down on the static of a radio and permits the phonograph to play on a radio frequency.

Occupying the north room on the fourth floor of Lindley hall, "KLH" (approximately 800 on the dial) can be picked up clearly throughout the building. The pick-up dies out a few hundred feet from the building and therefore the "radio bugs" have no fear of being apprehended by the Federal Communications Commission that has laws concerning wayward stations operating without a license.

The program is devoted entirely to music and played without vocal interference. Most of the records are in the popular vein, although the collection includes several albums of classical works. The boys are especially proud of a Bing Crosby collector's album recorded about 1920.

The Lindley men are kept in suspense as to when to expect music from their station, for the three operators spin the platters at their own leisure.
