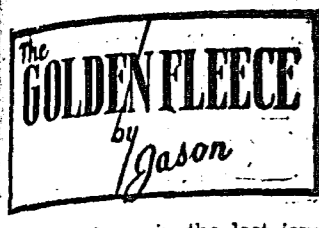

## Winona Pioneer Wills 440-Acre Farm To University For Ag Experiments

Interest of a pioneer Camas Prairie farmer, Jacob Monson of Winona, in agricultural research has resulted in the University of Idaho college of agriculture being willed his 440-acre farm, valued at approximately \$20,000.

Mr. Monson died in February and his will was probated at Grangeville March 3. Representing the university at the probate proceedings were Dean D. R. Theophilus of the college of agriculture and Dean W. J. Brockelbank of the college of law.

The farm lies about 15 miles north of Grangeville in the Winona section and consists of 300 acres of spring and fall pasture land, and 140 acres under cultivation. The will, written in long hand by Mr. Monson in 1929, stipulates that 5 acres of his farm is to go to the local school district as a site for a new consolidated school.

Although Mr. Monson never attended the university and has no relatives in this country, he has always been interested in agricultural experimentation. It was his wish that the university use the farm for work that would be beneficial to agriculture in the Camas Prairie district.

Professors Visit  
Acceptance of the bequest by the Board of Regents of the university has been recommended by the college of agriculture. Dean Theophilus; C. W. Hickman, head of the department of animal husbandry; and K. H. Klages, head of the department of agronomy visited the farm to inspect the land and buildings prior to recommending a plan of operation. Definite plans for utilization of the Monson gift have not yet been perfected, Dean Theophilus explains, and can not be for some time, since the farm is now being privately operated under a five-year lease.

## Alumni To Meet In Capitol City

Members of the Idaho Alumni Organization will meet in Boise on March 15 with representatives from the seven Idaho districts throughout the state, according to James Lyle, secretary of the organization.

Lyle said the purpose of the meeting was to make plans for alumni activities for commencement in June and to formulate policies for the coming year. "The first alumni publication since the war is expected to be available sometime this month," said Lyle, stating that the alumni organization, inactive during the war, had been reactivated recently.

George Yost of Emmett is president and Joe Brunzell of Moscow is vice-president of the Idaho group.

## Theophilus Leaves For Washington

D. R. Theophilus, Dean of the college of agriculture, left March 4 for Washington, D. C. where he will confer with Clinton Anderson, secretary of agriculture on matters relating to Idaho agriculture.

He also expects to meet with M. L. Wilson, nation director of the extension service and his staff. He will return March 17.

## Vandal Boxers Leave Saturday After Coast Ring Crown

### State Doubles U. Funds

One of the 40 bills Idaho's legislature jammed through Monday in hope of adjourning yesterday appropriated the university \$2,659,315 for the biennium beginning July 1.

This figure almost doubles the appropriation of \$1,353,486 for the current two-year period. In addition, \$347,681 was provided for the agricultural extension service compared with \$133,970 at present. Idaho State college would get \$1,053,500, compared with the present \$520,918.

Howell, former assistant football coach at the University of Alabama, and all-American in 1935, is scheduled to arrive at the university Monday to fulfill a two-year contract as head man of all Idaho football activities.

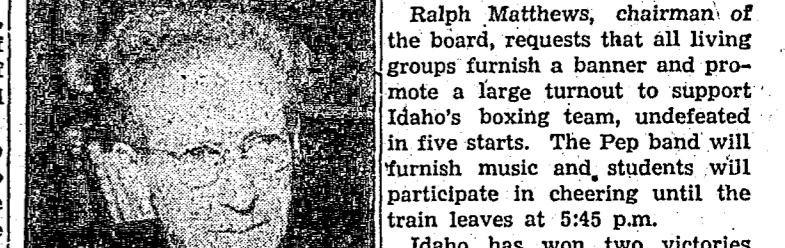
Main Attraction

## Kizer To Lecture On U.S.-Far East Before IRP Group

Benjamin H. Kizer, authority on International Relations and lecturer for Community Forum Series of the University of Washington, will address the Inland Empire branch of the Institute of Pacific Relations Tuesday at 7:30 p. m. in the New Science building, 207, in WSC. "The Role of the United States in the Far East" will be the topic of Mr. Kizer's speech.



Recently returned from China, where he spent two years as director of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration, Mr. Kizer has first hand information on his subject. In addition to his work with UNRRA he had experience in the field of international relations through his work in the Institute of Pacific Relations in Russia War Relief.

Former Spokane Lawyer  
During the war, Mr. Kizer, a former Spokane lawyer, was active in the settlement of labor disputes, both through the National War Labor board and as a Special Master of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals. He is also well known for his work as a leader in national resource conservation, having served as chairman of the Washington State Planning council and of Region No. 9 National Resources Planning board.

Several thousand music lovers including students and faculty members from the Idaho campus attended the Community concert in Pullman Tuesday evening to hear the Pasquier trio.

Those attending report the three brothers, Jean, violinist; Pierre, violinist; and Etienne, cellist; presented an outstanding program, rated as one of the best of its kind, and gave excellent interpretation and warmth to each selection presented during the concert.

Many particularly enjoyed the last number, "Trio" by Cras, which was a more modern number in four movements. A selection of Mozart's was offered as an encore as the concert concluded.
