Time Used Shortens Entitlement Since the leave time used between school sessions is recorded and cancels off the amount of time a vet can go to school under the G.I. Bill, many vets are not using their time unless in emergencies. For this reason the VA recently suggested that sick and annual leave should be used during an

emergency only.

No Break Given This Spring

Veterans presently enrolled and planning to continue in the same school during the summer session will be continued in school without a break in training if the vacation period between the spring and summer sessions does not exceed

14 days, it was recently announced.
Other News In Brief Veterans in school under the G.I. Bill may receive drill pay as members of the National Guard without including it in their reports of estimated earnings.

Forty per cent of all World War II veterans have applied

for some form of education and training under laws administered by the VA.

Any G. I. Insurance policy that has been allowed to lapse can be reinstated easily prior to August 1, 1947, with the payment of two monthly premiums.

Veterans who have completed successfully a course of training under the G.I. Bill may use the remaining portion of unused entitlement to pursue another training program with a supplementary Certificate of Eligibility from the VA.


