Campus political campaigns for the coming ASUI elections went into full swing Monday with the distribution of multi-colored handbills telling the advantages of each party's platform and candidates. The most notable effect of the campaigns thus far has been to cancel the work of Blue Key, men's honorary, which had just completed a campus clean-up drive Saturday.

A feature of the campaign has been the "Battle of Hello walk." Early Monday morning United party handbills were posted on all of the trees and lamp posts along the campus walks. These were soon torn down and replaced by Independent handbills which were in turn torn from their places of display and scattered about the lawns.

If you read this column on Vardis Fisher, recently, you will remember he had a sentence that he gave to his pupils to copy verbatim. According to him not more than one or two students in classes of 30 or 40 copied it correctly. Often not a single student did it right.

Following is an extract from a letter received by Jason:

I conducted the copying test which Mr. Fisher used and suggested we teachers use also. I placed the sentence on the blackboard and asked my students—high school freshmen, juniors, and seniors—to copy it exactly as written, "leaving nothing out and adding nothing." I had 107 students in my classes that day, and I found that 40 of them copied it correctly. I threw out all papers which were written so that "p" resembled "r" or an "a" resembled an "o", so I consider that there is no question about the 40 being able to "see what they look at." A little better average than Mr. Fisher thinks possible in our high school and colleges.

I'm sure we are doing a better job in our schools than Mr. Fisher is able to see through his cynical eyes.

While not a comprehensive sample of the state, Jason feels the results found by Mr. J. Neff Bothe, English Instructor at Preston high school are indicative of Vardis Fisher's judgment.
