Idaho's Two-Fold Purpose

The University is off on a new athletic policy, designed to allow the Vandals to forge from the background in all conference standings. A sincere effort is being made to make the name "Idaho" known to sport fans throughout the nation. To some people the university's new emphasis on athletics may seem incongruous with the basic principle on which the school was founded—to foster scholarship and to train Idaho students for their own and the state's benefit. The truth is that academic learning is not being de-emphasized. The administration is striving to bring athletic activities on a par with its academic standing.

A boost in sports is vital, since America places such a high regard for the winner in athletic competition, but scholarship is equally important.

It is a matter of common knowledge that if the state provided more funds for faculty members' salaries, the path of the scholar would be less thorny. "Dead wood" could be hewed away, and the professorial forest combed for the best lumber available.

As far as the college student is concerned, scholarship is a matter of choice. If a student wants an education bad enough, he will obtain it even if the odds are stacked high against him. If he isn't interested, no amount of pleading will make him conscious of the benefits of academic learning. Idaho's two-fold purpose is a right step in the right direction. It has a chance of some day achieving for this university full respect for both athletics and scholastic standing.

TIPS FOR VETS

Give a Man An Inch and He'll Rent It

There were 34 construction projects stopped in southern Idaho and eastern Oregon the other day for violations of the housing program regulations. It seems that commercial building such as garages, restaurants, and tourist courts were being constructed while many residential projects could not obtain necessary materials for veterans housing and other permanent housing which is needed so badly now. All non-residential construction must be submitted to a non-residential construction district office for approval by the OFFICE OF HOUSING EXPEDITER. Veterans wishing to build homes cannot compete with commercial construction for scarce materials and labor.

Supply? No. — Demand? Yes.

In nearly two years since the war has been over the demand for building materials for permanent veterans housing has been high and the supply has not been able to meet it. The policy now is to approve only essential and non-deferable commercial and industrial construction until the building materials and labor are adequate to take care of home-building. We are wondering if service stations, garages and warehouses are more important in the city of Moscow than homes for veterans and their families.

Up the Line

The guaranty under the original Servicemen's Readjustment Act was \$2,000, and under the act as amended in December of 1945 veterans are eligible for a further guarantee of \$2,000 on a real estate loan, or \$1,000 on a business or non-real estate loan. However, due to the lack of any definite program by the Federal Government in the past two years and also because the supply is not yet adequate, veterans still have a hard time getting materials for building a home even though they do have the money. Veterans would like to see some type of clear plan for vets housing laid down.

Exhibits of new wood products are being featured by the school of forestry in observance of Idaho Forestry Week, which ends May 4.

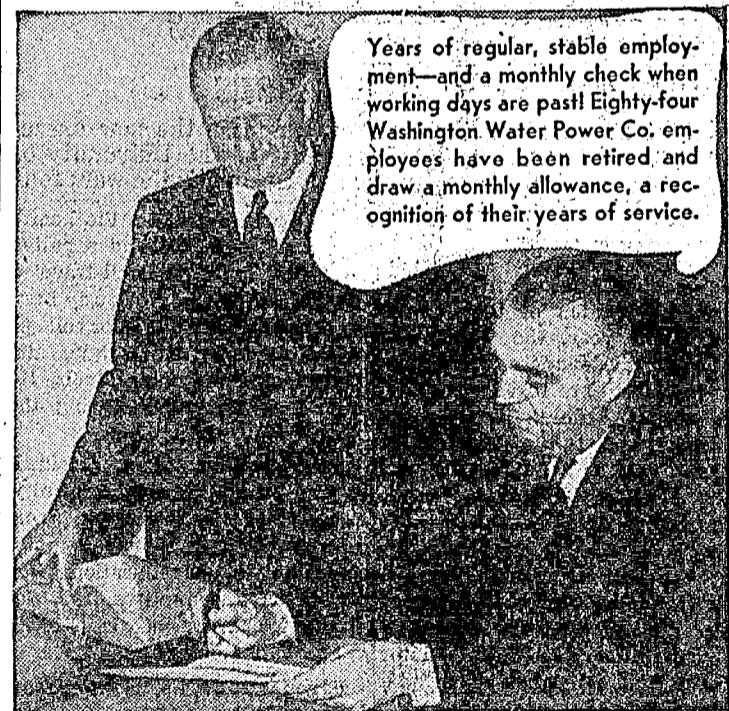

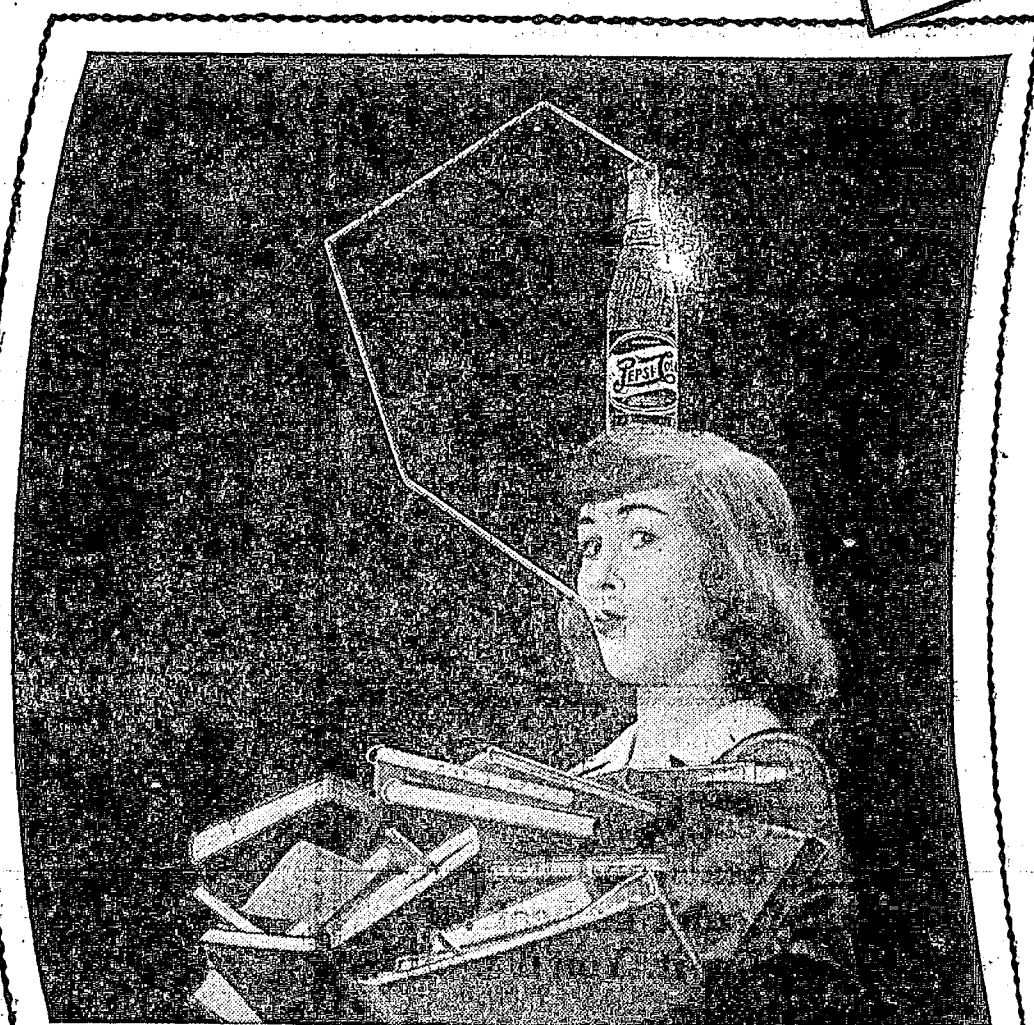

Activated at Washington

The first national convention was held on the Washington State campus in 1924. The organization has now grown to include 19 chapters located in five western states. The program for Saturday, May 3, will begin at 9 a.m. and go until 12 noon. Lunch will be from 12:30 to 2 p.m. The final session will be from 2 to 5 p.m. and at 6 o'clock a picnic will be held. Military Training Favored, Students Reveal In Poll

The question asked 889 university students last week in a poll conducted by the Argonaut was "Do you favor passage of a law which will require each physically fit male American to undergo compulsory military training?"

Results of the campus poll showed students favoring compulsory military training by a conclusive 77 per cent. While there were several noted differences of opinion between men and women students polled, the men's numerical superiority was great enough in most cases to outweigh the women's decisions.

All campus living groups were polled with 889 students participating to give as complete a survey of campus opinion as could practically be obtained.

The first question on the survey concerning compulsory military training for men showed 490 persons favoring it, 378 opposing and 21 expressing no opinion. A breakdown of these figures show 164 women favoring the question, 177 opposing and 14 expressing no opinion while 326 men favored training, 201 opposed it and 7 expressed no opinion. These figures possibly show that the women students are reluctant to return to the extreme man shortage situation which was so evident during the war.

Duration of the suggested military training period was the next question on the poll and men and women agreed on the 12 month period over 6 or 18 months. The survey showed 70 per cent of those polled favoring 12 months, 17 per cent favoring 18 months, 12 per cent favoring 6 months and 1 per cent expressing no opinion. A third question concerning compulsory training for women

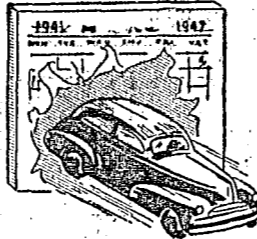
was overwhelmingly defeated with 771 voting no, 104 voting yes and 21 expressing no opinion. On this question only 8 per cent of the men voted for, while 23 1/2 per cent of the women favored such training.

A question pertaining to the maintenance of a large standing army, navy and air force was favored by 586 to 166 with 61 persons expressing no opinion.

"Do you believe the present U. S. foreign policy will lead the country into war with Russia?" was the last question on the poll and resulted in the most controversial voting. Of the men polled 213 answered yes, 225 no and 53 expressed no opinion. The women's vote of 95 yes, 74 no and 147, no opinion, managed to tip the grand total to the affirmative by a sparse nine votes. Also noteworthy were the 147 women who would express no opinion on this question.

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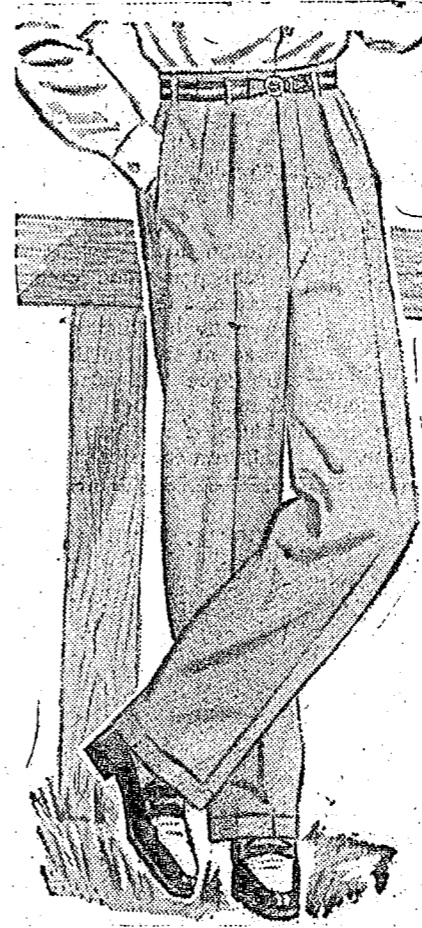
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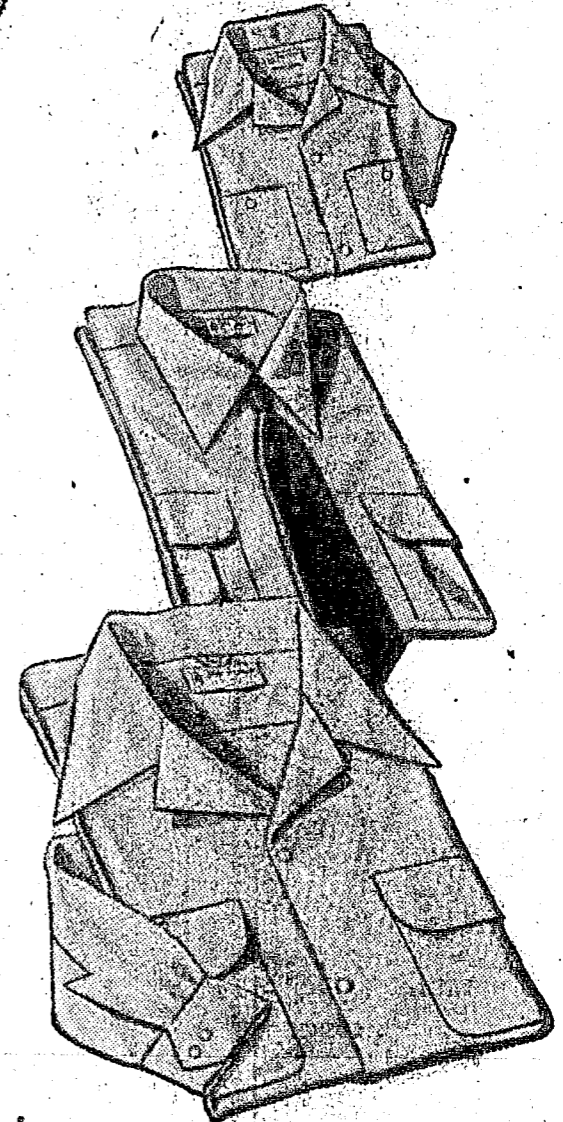
