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Vandals Unleash Torrid Hitting; Down OSC

Idaho Wins First Behind Auer's Masterful Job

A free-swinging, hit-the-first pitch Idaho Vandal baseball team stepped out of the murky depths of the conference cellar yesterday and pounced on two Oregon hurriers for 13 hits and 6 runs. The Beavers were able to touch Idaho's Lefty Auer for only 7 hits and 4 runs.

This afternoon, the two teams will meet in the second and final game of the two-game series on MacLean field at 3:30 p.m. Coach Guy Wicks has not yet announced his starting hurler but it is expected that he will open with his freshman hurling ace, Johnny Robinson. The Beavers are also expected to counter-attack with their star southpaw, Chuck Sauvain.

Hitting Galore

The jubilant Vandals unleashed their torrid hitting attack in the first inning when their leading hitter Charlie Couper started the fireworks with a line-drive single, his first of three hits for the day. After the next hitter, George Huffman had flied out, Idaho's right fielder Buck Bybee powered a terrific triple into deep right field, scoring Couper.

Idaho's only lapse in the well-played game came in the second inning. After Lefty Auer walked the first two men to face him, Simas, Oregon State pitcher, unleashed a scorching line drive over Charlie Couper's head in deep center for a grand slam home run. Auer immediately settled down and forced the next man to ground out.

Single Run

Oregon State's only other run came in the fifth inning when they combined three hits and a fielder's choice for a single run. After this inning, Auer was never in trouble and the slim southpaw pitched beautiful ball.

By the time the lucky seventh inning rolled around, the Vandals brought forth every hit that they had been storing all year and pounded out 4 hits for 4 runs.

Big Inning

It was up to pitcher Lefty Auer to start the inning and the southpaw reached first base via an error by the Beaver shortstop. After Charlie Couper had flied out to right field, George Huffman drove a single into the hole between first and second with Auer taking third. Bybee followed Huffman with a single in the same slot and Auer scored. Toby Masingill, third baseman, tied the count at 4 all when he whistled a two and two pitch into left field and Huffman scored.

After Frank Viro had grounded out, big Don (Red) Fodrea smashed his fourth straight hit of the day to put the Idahoans into a two run lead which they never relinquished. Ozzie Kannik-keberg filled out to end the inning.

The recent five-day trip into Oregon proved costly to the Vandals. Against Oregon Friday, the visitors carded their best scores to date but were soundly trounced by the NCAA title contenders who boast six straight victories. The Vandals fared better against OSC but lost a 20 to 7 verdict.

Idaho's John Morely turned in a creditable performance, playing Oregon's Lou Stafford, who is National public links runner-up, even all the way only to lose out on the final hole. He also won over Johnston of Oregon State.

Although on the losing end, James said that he was well pleased with the performance of the inexperienced Idahoans.

The remainder of the Idaho schedule will be played at Moscow, ending with the Northern division championships to be held here May 25. Six teams will be represented at the finals, boasting some of the outstanding golfers in the northwest.

In kicking, Carl Munson, Chicago, Ill., and Johnny Christensen, Nampa, are shaping up as likely booters for next year's revamped Vandals.

Coach Howell has promised plenty of hard work for his team.

Scrimmage workouts will be held from now until the end of the spring session.

In other colleges, practice was continued during the absence of the head coach to the coast meeting, but Idaho discontinued practice during this interval. There-

fore, Howell has nearly 15 days remaining on the spring calendar. The season is expected to be completed by May 20, before semester exams.
