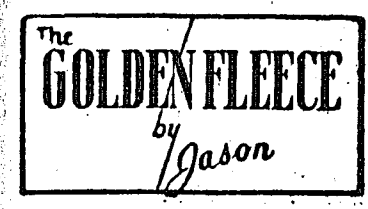

Hayden Audits ASUI Funds; Makes Recommendations

The annual audit of ASUI funds, required by the ASUI constitution, was completed and presented to the executive board early this week.

A recommendation made by the auditor, J. F. Hayden, Moscow, calls for the addition of a man to the staff in the graduate manager's office to take control of, account for, and make financial reports on "all athletic contests and other activities for which admission is charged."

The total 1947 balance as of June 30, 1947, the end of the fiscal year, stood at \$24,685.39.

ASUI incomes for the year were as follows: General, \$52,611.74; Men's Athletics, \$69,511.82; Women's Athletics, \$54.00; Golf Course, \$5,351.50; Music \$261.68; Publications, \$29,007.18; Miscellaneous (including Agricultural Judging and Dramatics), \$1,957.69; and Bus (ASUI station-wagon) \$570.24.

Total general income for the year was \$159,325.85. The class accounts and Intercollegiate Knights incomes are listed under Agency (Cont. on page 2, col. 5)

Legislators Plan Moscow Visit

The house agriculture committee will visit the agricultural college of the university in their tour of the northwest next month.

Rep. Abe Goff of Moscow suggested that the committee—also tour the Palouse farming area adjacent to Lewiston and Moscow and inspect the sawmills of the area.

Committee members will go to Spokane by train from Salt Lake City where they will hold a hearing on November 8. The Idaho trip is scheduled for November 11.

On November 12 the group will leave by automobile for Grand Coulee and Wenatchee, Wash., where it will entrain for the final hearing at Fresno, Calif.

All Classes Dismissed 2:40 Monday Afternoon

Classes will be dismissed at 2:40 Monday afternoon for the special assembly to be addressed by United States Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, it was announced today by President J. E. Buchanan.

Senator Taft is the son of the nation's twenty-seventh president, William Howard Taft, who in 1911 planted the second of the presidential trees on the university campus.

Because of the split-second timing necessary for radio broadcasting at this assembly, the first of the year under sponsorship of the university public events committee, President Buchanan urged that all students be in the Memorial gymnasium by 2:50. This will allow ten minutes for introductions and preliminaries.

Promptly at 3 o'clock, the assembly will go on the air and the doors to the gym will be closed.

Kerr Will Preside
Dean T. S. Kerr of the college of letters and science, chairman of the public events committee, will preside at the assembly. President Buchanan will introduce Senator Taft.

A network broadcast, originating with station KRPL, Moscow, will carry the senator's discussion of national and world affairs. Other stations in this area which will carry the broadcast include KNEW, Spokane, and KVNI, Coeur d'Alene.

Bert McAllister, general manager of KRPL, indicated that transcriptions of the address might be cut for later rebroadcast by other stations, possibly in southern Idaho, not able to carry the program direct.

"In bringing Senator Taft to the campus, the university is following a long-established policy," explained President Buchanan. "We have had many special assemblies in the past to give students an opportunity to hear distinguished public figures who are in this part of the country and available for addresses."

"Big Bill's" Visit
Senator Taft's appearance at the university has a double significance. His talk will be just eight days short of 36 years since his father visited the university. It was on October 7, 1911, that President Taft addressed a university audience and planted a Port Orford cedar in front of the administration building, the second in what has come to be known on the campus as the "presidential grove."

A cordial invitation to the general public to attend the assembly Monday afternoon was issued by President Buchanan.

"Many people have indicated an interest in hearing Senator Taft and the university wants them to feel welcome," he said.

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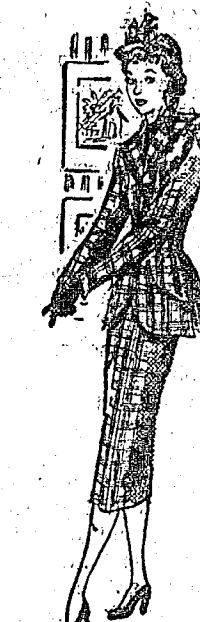
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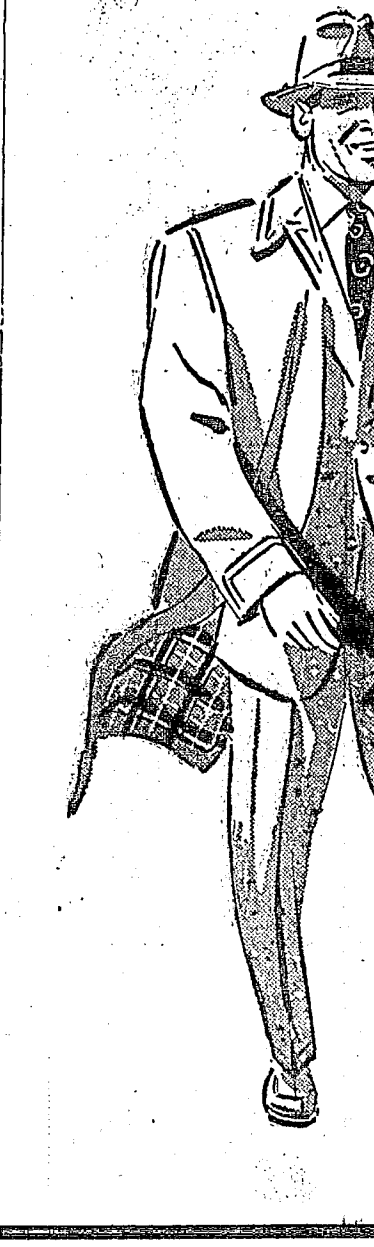
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Vandals All Ready For Tilt Against Strong Indian Eleven

Outweighed Idaho Team Gunned For Air Play

Coach M. F. "Dixie" Howell will field a Vandal eleven at Palo Alto tomorrow afternoon vastly improved from the Idaho team that lost to the Indians 45 to 0, that shows promise of giving the heavier Stanford team the strongest competition they have had from this quarter for many years.

The squad of 35 players boarded their train in Moscow yesterday evening as a shouting mob of enthusiastic Idaho students waved and cheered. The team left the train at Portland Thursday morning to complete the trip to San Francisco by airplane. Their arrival was scheduled to permit a Friday afternoon workout.

Missing from the Vandal starting lineup will be 230-pound Ed Watkins, who was injured at the Wednesday night scrimmage and was unable to make the trip. Halfback John Christensen, whose accurate punting was sorely missed in last Saturday's game, will be ready for action against Stanford. The past week Coach Howell has been drilling on pass defense. A large portion of the five game score by Stanford last year were due to weaknesses in Idaho's pass defense.

The Indians, average weight 206 pounds per man, are the second heaviest team in the conference bested only by Southern California in that division. The Vandal per-man average is only 187 pounds.

Stanford has 17 returning lettermen but was hard hit recently when Lloyd Merriman, who was rated one of the greatest backs in Stanford history, signed a professional baseball contract with Cincinnati.

Biggest threat to Idaho's hopes for a good showing will probably be Left Halfback Bob Anderson, a 187-pound sophomore who is rated as an All-American candidate. Anderson is a fast, powerful runner, with a long and deceptive stride, very reliable on defense, a tough blocker, and a fine pass catcher. He tied for honors with Merriman on the Stanford squad with ten touchdowns, 60 points, last year.

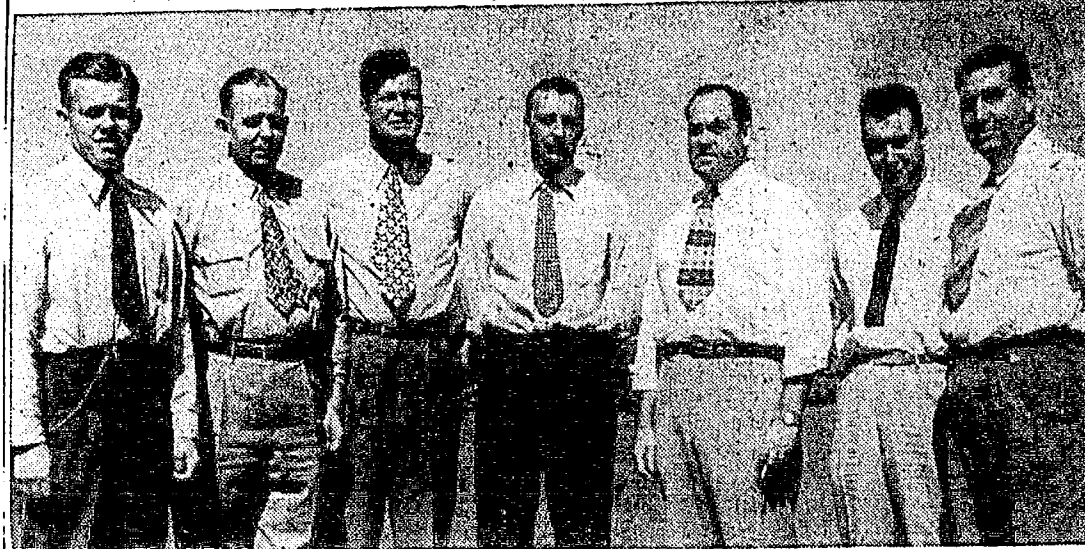
