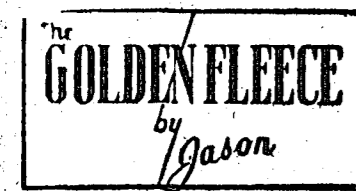

'Speed' Lang To Escort Parade; Route Mapped

Homecoming parade will begin to form at 8 Saturday morning and move toward the campus at 9:45 sharp, Barbara Bedwell, parade chairman for Homecoming announced today.

The parade will form on West A street in the following order: "Speed" Lang and police escort, Idaho pep band, A.T.O., Willis Sweet, Alpha Chi, Beta, Ridenbaugh, Delta Chi, Pine hall, Alpha Phi, Deltas, Idaho club, Kappa Sigs, and the Tri-Delts.

Following the Tri-Delts will be the L.D.S., Phi Delt, Hays hall, Fijis, Lindley hall, DG, Phi Tau, Chrisman hall, Gamma Phi, SAE, Theta, Campus club, Sigma Nu, Kappas, Sigma Chi, Forney hall, Pi Phi, TKE, T.M.A. and the D.T.G.

Several floats will be entered by the business houses of Moscow. Among those entered will be: David's department store, Willis tractor company, First Trust and Savings bank, Washington Water Power, Wards Paint and Hardware, and the Daily Idahonian.

The downtown floats, most of which will welcome the returning alumni, will be sifted throughout the order of student floats listed above.

Forming on West A street the parade will turn down Main street to Sixth street, and up Sixth to Deakin avenue. It will proceed past the Blue Bucket to University avenue, which it will follow one block to Elm. Turning on Elm the procession will go up past Ridenbaugh, around the Administration building circle and back to University avenue, turning south past the Memorial gymnasium to Rayburn avenue where it will disband.

It is requested that good care be taken of the floats until pictures are taken of the winners.

The celebration will begin Friday evening with the pajama serpentine to begin at 5:15 at the intersection of Sixth and Line near the Idaho club. Freshman women will meet at that time dressed in pajamas and proceed with the serpentine through the men's living groups.

The rally will begin at 6:45 in front of Forney hall and follow the route that was announced in the Tuesday Argonaut. Pajamas will be the uniform of the evening and will be worn throughout the rally and the mixer. Torches made of cans of sand soaked with kerosene and banners will be carried by the members of all living groups. Disposal cans for the torches will be set up at the entrance to MacLean field.

The rally parade will be led by the pep band, the cheer leaders and the majorettes.

A short program will be held at MacLean field while a delegation from WSC is introduced and yells are led by the cheer leaders.

The Intercollegiate Knights will assist in setting off the fireworks for a twenty minute display.

Mixer at Bucket

Following the fireworks the crowd will move to the Blue Bucket ballroom for the mixer. Music will be by the Rhythm-Airs and the dance will last until 11:00. Pajamas will be worn throughout the mixer.

House decorations must be up by 8 Saturday morning. Judging will start at 8 a.m. sharp.

The parade will begin to form at 8 and will move toward the campus at 9:45. Judges for the floats will be scattered along the route of the parade. Care after the parade should be taken of the floats so pictures may be taken of the winners. The parade will pass Memorial gymnasium and disband on Rayburn avenue.

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War's Effect On Prisons

Warden Clinton T. Duffy of San Quentin prison spoke his mind recently on the calibre of the post-war convict. "The men entering my prison," said the warden, "have changed—for the worse."

Duffy went on to explain that the professional criminal is fast disappearing, and that he is being replaced by a younger and a more violent type of convict. The average inmate of San Quentin today has become a citizen of that institution for committing a crime of premeditated violence. San Quentin is typical of prisons the country over. They are crowded and were built in an age when punishment, and not correction, influenced every guard and warden.

The war has contributed greatly to the increase in prison population. Veterans whose lives of crime were only interrupted by the war and defense workers who were used to easy money, dominate the prison scene.

The situation gives rise to the theory that reform of the criminal will again give way to the old policy of laxity and carelessness. The resulting social retrogression in the methods of criminal confinement is just another example of the flotsam carried in the backwash of war.

Checks Enlarged For Disabled Vets

Seriously disabled veterans in training under provision of the Vocational Rehabilitation Act will receive automatic increases in minimum allowances effective September 1, the Veterans Administration reports.

No action will be required of eligible veterans as the increased rates will be paid automatically in the September checks.

The new law was passed by the last session of congress and provides that a veteran enrolled in a course under Public Law 16 whose disability is rated 30 per cent or higher, will receive a minimum of \$115 a month if he has no dependents; \$135 a month if he has one dependent. Additional allowance for one child is increased from \$10 a month to \$20 and the previous allowance of \$7 for each additional child is raised to \$15. No change is made in the monthly allowance for a dependent parent.

Families To Move Into South Hill Homes Project

The housing situation on the Idaho campus is being augmented this fall by the addition of the South Hill Homes project. The new project, which is situated east of Hays hall, will provide homes for 25 faculty members and university employees.

South Hill Homes are two and three bedroom cottages, modern in both equipment and design. Several families will occupy their premises within the next few days. Actual construction was not begun until July 17. Landscaping and street improvement will depend entirely upon weather conditions this fall.

Married Vets Predominant

Other university housing accommodations for married veterans and university employees are occupied to capacity. Eighty families are living in the North Main project and 140 families occupy apartments in the North Sixth street homes. Vet Village contains 100 occupied trailers and 29 prefabs. University housing authorities estimate 400 or more married families are living downtown. The university has acquired and remodeled two properties near the Keith property on West Sixth and also the Humphrey property on Taylor avenue for faculty and university employees. The Bateman House, near the South Hill Homes project, has been remodeled into a two-family dwelling unit.

The men's dormitories on the campus are stabilized at regular capacities and in one there is an overload. 192 men occupy Willis Sweet; 106 Chrisman; 118 Campus club; and Lindley has 146. The normal capacity of Pine hall is 356 but now houses 376. Men may request a transfer from one hall to another in order of their room deposits of last April.

Less Women Than Room

All of the women's dormitories contain less occupants than the listed capacities. Hays hall has 95 members; Forney 93; and Ridenbaugh 63. Idaho club is stabilized at the present and will remain so for the remainder of the semester. If second semester enrollment of women is up, the hall will remain open.

Preliminary studies are being made for erection of new women's dormitories in the near future. This will eliminate the congestion now being experienced in some of the independent living groups.

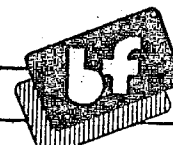
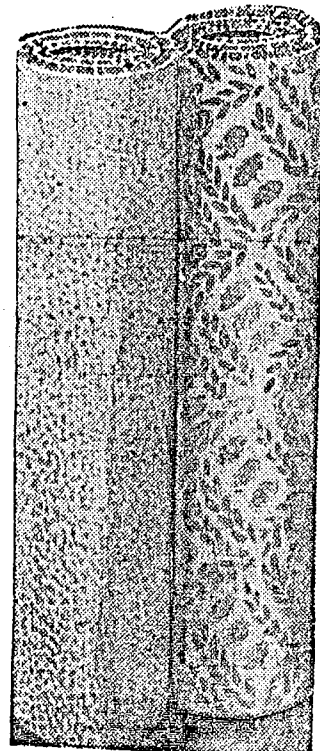

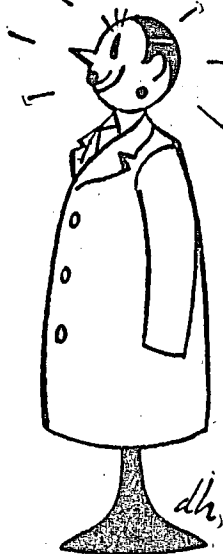

Happy over Idaho's upset of Stanford, Leo Calland, Vandal coach from 1929 to 1934, was the first to reach town. He and Mrs. Calland are on a month's vacation. Calland is municipal recreation director for the city of San Diego, Calif. "About three months ago, Mrs. Calland and I decided this was the year to come back for the WSC game," said Leo, smiling.

No sooner had the Stanford-Idaho score reached Florida than Earl David, Moscow business man, received a wire from his old classmate, John R. Middleton, who played football at Idaho from 1904 to 1906 and coached the Vandals during the 1907 and 1908 seasons. Middleton made quite a name for himself by introducing a spread formation which came to be known as the "Idaho spread."

"Get me some tickets, I'm going to be in the stands Saturday," Middleton wired. He recently retired from business and now resides in Florida.

During his five years as player and coach, Middleton tasted defeat but once at the hands of the Cougars, a record unusual in Idaho coaching history. As a player he was on two winning teams, as a coach he won once and tied once.

Third of the returning coaches is expected to be Charles F. Erb, who coached in 1926 to 1928. Erb is now located in California and is traveling representative for a farm machinery company. George W. Greene, director of athletics at Idaho, met the former Vandal coach before the Stanford game.

"At that time Erb said his travel schedule called for his being in the Northwest sometime this fall," said Greene. "After the game Erb said it was quite apparent that his Northwest itiner-

Vandals Meet Border Rival In Annual Gridiron Civil War

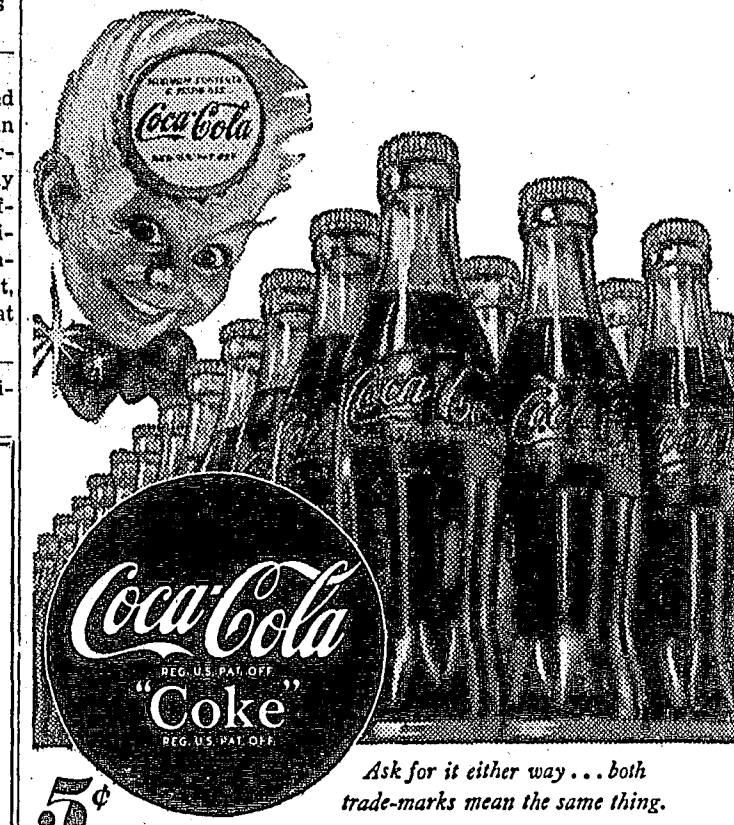
