

The biggest Homecoming in the history of the university has come and gone. It featured the biggest rally, the longest parade, the biggest crowd ever to watch a football game. The one flaw in the whole affair was the Saturday night

dance. Far from being successful, the dance failed to serve as the climax to a gala weekend. No programs were given out; few decorations graced the barren expanses of the gymnasium.

Many students are wondering today why custom persists in hiring a "big-name" band that no one has ever heard of before. The custom was followed to the letter three days ago. The university is supposed to abound with good student musicians; why not hire some local talent that could do just as good a job for less money than "Bob Summers and his Big Name Band" could do?

One of the biggest gripes that students have about the dance lies in the crowning of the Homecoming Queen during intermission. The queen reigned exactly 58 minutes, from 11:02 until the police stopped the dance at midnight under a state law which forbids dancing on Sunday.

The Queen should have been crowned Friday night during the rally. She would then have had opportunity to appear in the Saturday morning parade, with the runners-up in the contest as her consorts.


