

The week of intense rivalry between Idaho and neighboring WSC ended suddenly Saturday. Idaho was defeated by a fast, hard-hitting Washington State team.

The Vandals came out on the short end of the score but the Cougar was worried. Maybe he can see his throne tottering. The end of his twenty-year reign over Idaho may come soon.

After the game Idaho students found themselves repeating the too-familiar "Wait 'till next year." The tone, however, was different from that of previous years. Somehow, the wistful, battered quotation has taken on a new meaning.

The rivalry with WSC continues, but on a subdued scale. It is probably safe for an Idaho student to appear in Pullman territory unescorted this week.

Relatively Calm
Both schools escaped with relatively little property damage during the hectic pre-game feuding. The unpublishing guard system had a lot to do with it, but perhaps the conflict is gradually leaving the childish level.

Student leaders of both schools, as well as college officials, have long been working toward a more mature rivalry. The talks by WSC's student body president and Evergreen editor at Friday's rally were a part of this program.

Incidentally, Idaho sent Assistant Coach Perron Shqemaker over to the WSC rally. He gave a short, but effective talk to the Cougar fans.

Arrangements had supposedly been made to send a Washington State coach to our rally, but somewhere the plans bogged down. The slip-up came from the WSC side of the border. Keith Adams, Idaho rally chairman, fulfilled his half of the preparations 100 percent.

Yellow Stripes Again

Dr. L. C. Cady, chairman of the traffic and safety committee, has this to say regarding the problem: "... Regents Approve New Faculty Appointments

Appointment of Dr. C. O. Reiser, for three years a petroleum engineer with the Standard Oil Development company, as head of the department of chemical engineering at the university was announced today by President J. E. Buchanan, following approval of the board of regents. Dr. Reiser, who has had six years of college teaching experience in addition to his professional work, is now associate professor of chemical engineering at Oklahoma A & M. He also taught at the University of Wisconsin and the Colorado School of Mines.

Joining the school of business administration as assistant professors will be Scott E. Seager and Orville W. Turnbaugh. Seager is a graduate of the University of Texas and has had several years experience in private industry. Turnbaugh is a University of Idaho graduate, has had teaching experience, and recently was employed by the U. S. department of labor.

Other appointments announced by President Buchanan included Virgil Scharrer, graduate of the University of Chicago, instructor in economics; Lawrence Spencer, University of Idaho graduate, teaching assistant in music; Herbert M. Edwards, agricultural graduate of the university, extension agent in Valley county; John A. Rowe, Jr., research fellow in forestry under a Potlatch Forests fellowship.

Although the Idaho Vandals were forced to bow in defeat to the Washington State Cougars, Homecoming 1947 brought the largest crowd of returning alumni to the University of Idaho for one of the biggest weekends in years.

Lois Winner, pretty Kappa pledge, was crowned Homecoming Queen by football Captain Bill Williams at the intermission of the Homecoming dance Saturday night at the Memorial gymnasium. A trophy was presented by Casey Wescott, representing the state alumni association. The trophy will have the queen's name inscribed on it and will be placed in the trophy case at the gymnasium. A matched set of rhinestone bracelet, necklace, and earrings were presented to Miss Winner by Kenneth Anderson of the junior chamber of commerce. The queen was nominated by Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity.

Largest Parade
The parade Saturday morning was regarded as one of the largest ever seen by the city of Moscow. It began on A street in downtown Moscow and wound its way up across the campus to the Memorial gymnasium where it disbanded.

1190 Sophomores Largest Class; 500 To Graduate

Whoever is president of the board of regents in the spring of 1950 will draw the toughest handwriting assignment in the university's history, President J. E. Buchanan warned the institution's governing group at its annual homecoming meeting.

"The board's present president, J. L. McCarthy of Orofino, will have to write his signature over 500 times on the diplomas to be given out next commencement," the president added. This will be the first postwar graduating group to pass the 500 mark.

Still Registering

With late registrations coming in daily, an all-time high of 3,516 students are now registered at the University of Idaho. Of this figure, 1,190 are sophomores who will comprise the graduating class of 1950.

President Buchanan pointed out that the swell in the sophomore class is typical of the national college enrollment trend. This is a result of the flood of returning veterans in February and September of last year. Also, this fall saw the University of Idaho receive its first heavy transfer of students from the junior colleges of the state.

South Hill Opens Homes To 25 Faculty Families

Miss Mabel Locke, physical education instructor, and her mother, Mrs. E. R. Locke, moved into the first completed home in the South Hill Homes housing project for faculty members last week.

With the remaining 24 homes in advanced stages of completion, Dean of Men H. E. Lattig, project coordinator, estimates one house will be occupied each day until the project is filled. Edward S. Stimson, new dean of the college of law, moved into the second completed home on October 2.

The houses are of solid prefabricated design, and were purchased in complete units. Each is equipped with an electric stove, refrigerator, and oil burning floor heaters. Hardwood floors and wide plate glass windows are an added feature. Twenty of the houses have two bedrooms; the remainder three bedrooms each. The estimated cost of the project to date is \$190,000.

The university undertook the construction when critical shortage of housing in Moscow made it impossible to hire instructors until they could be assured a place to live. When the private residence facilities in the town proves adequate for housing faculty members, the university project will be used for teaching fellows, research fellows, and married students.

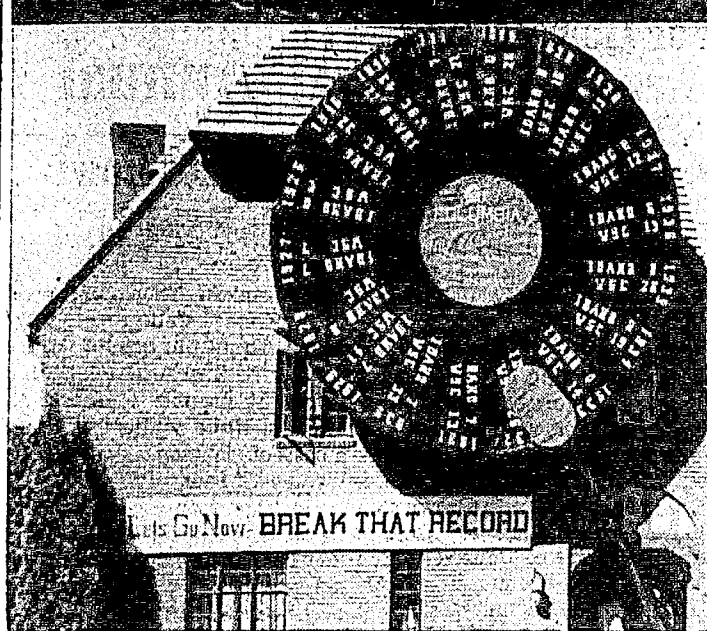

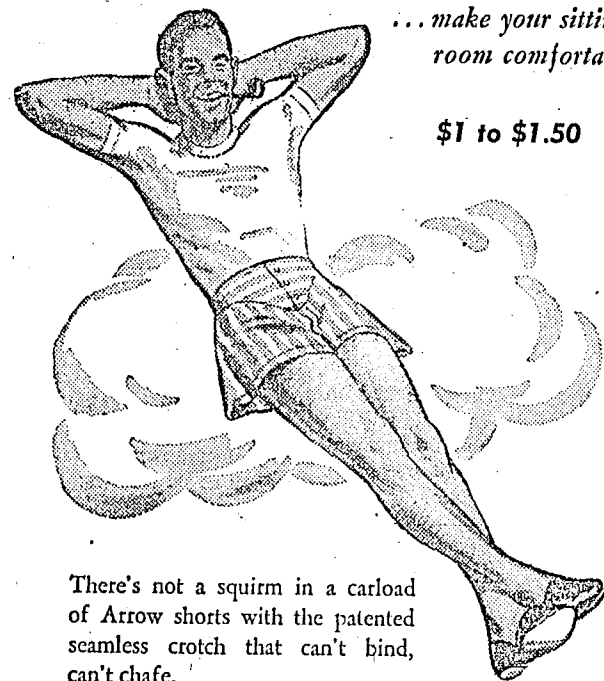

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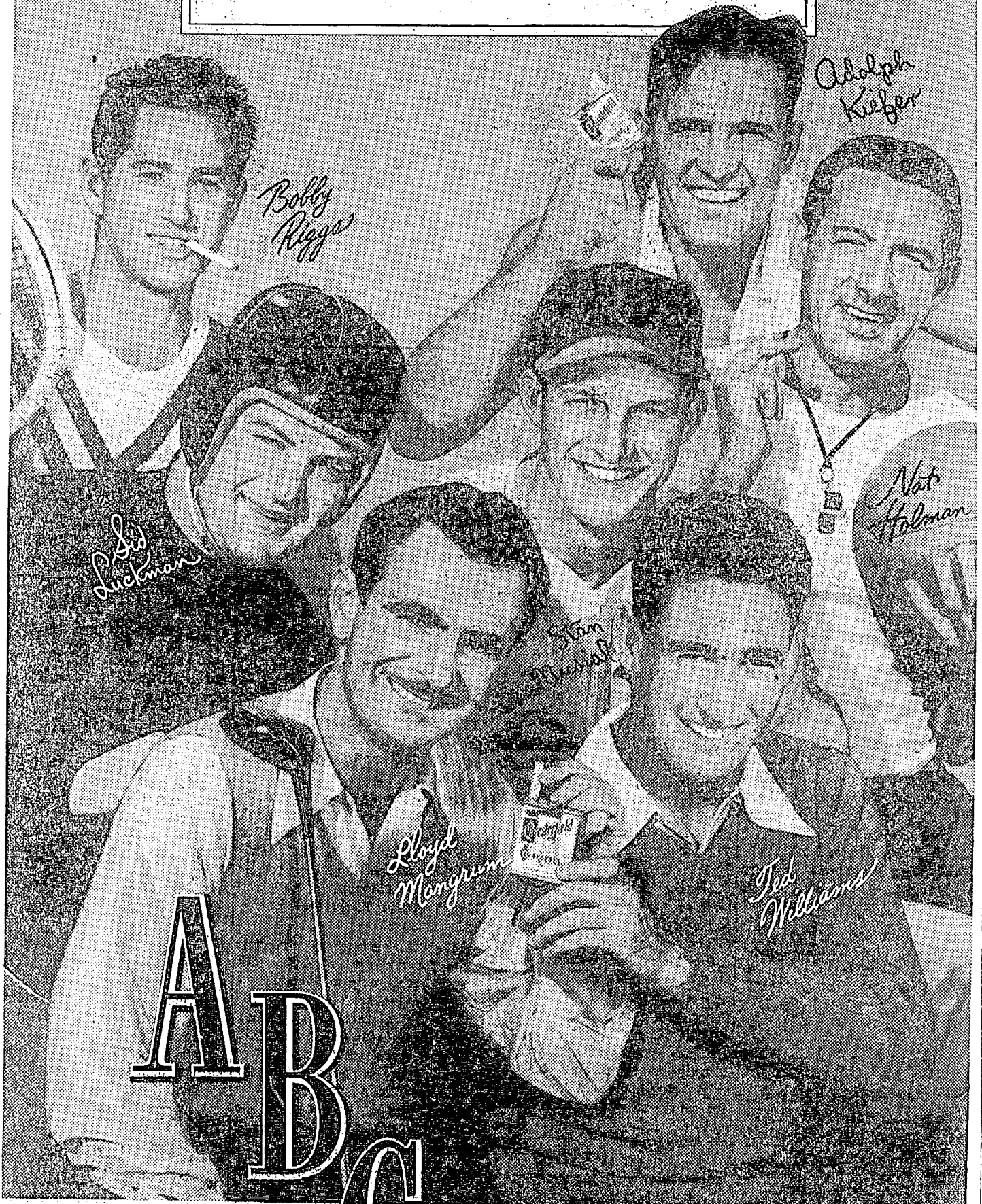

We cannot understand the basis for charging such prices for haircuts. Surely the prices are not necessary—the overhead on

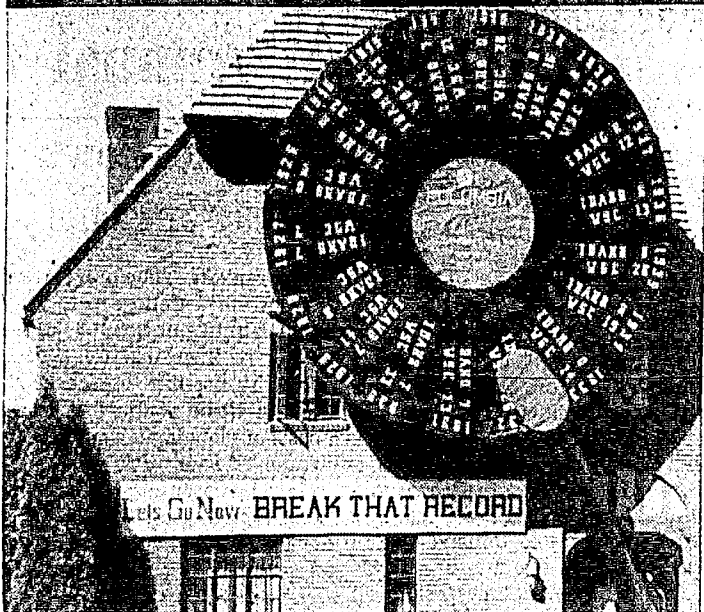
these shops have not gone up enough to justify them.

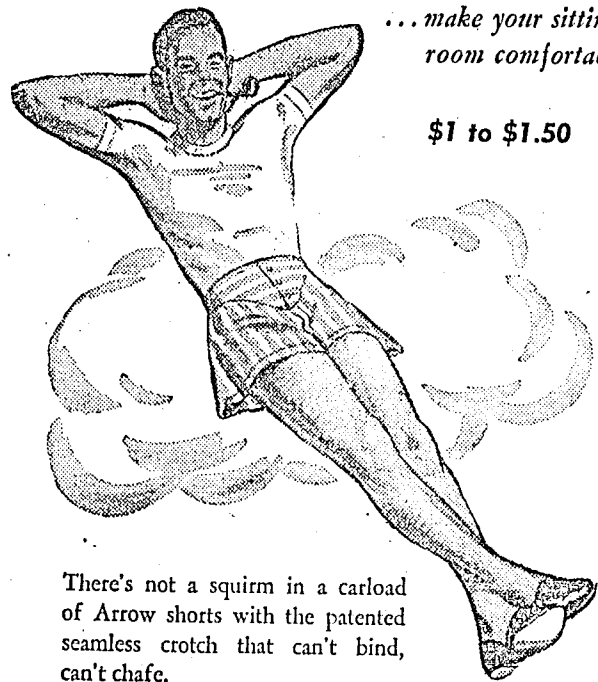

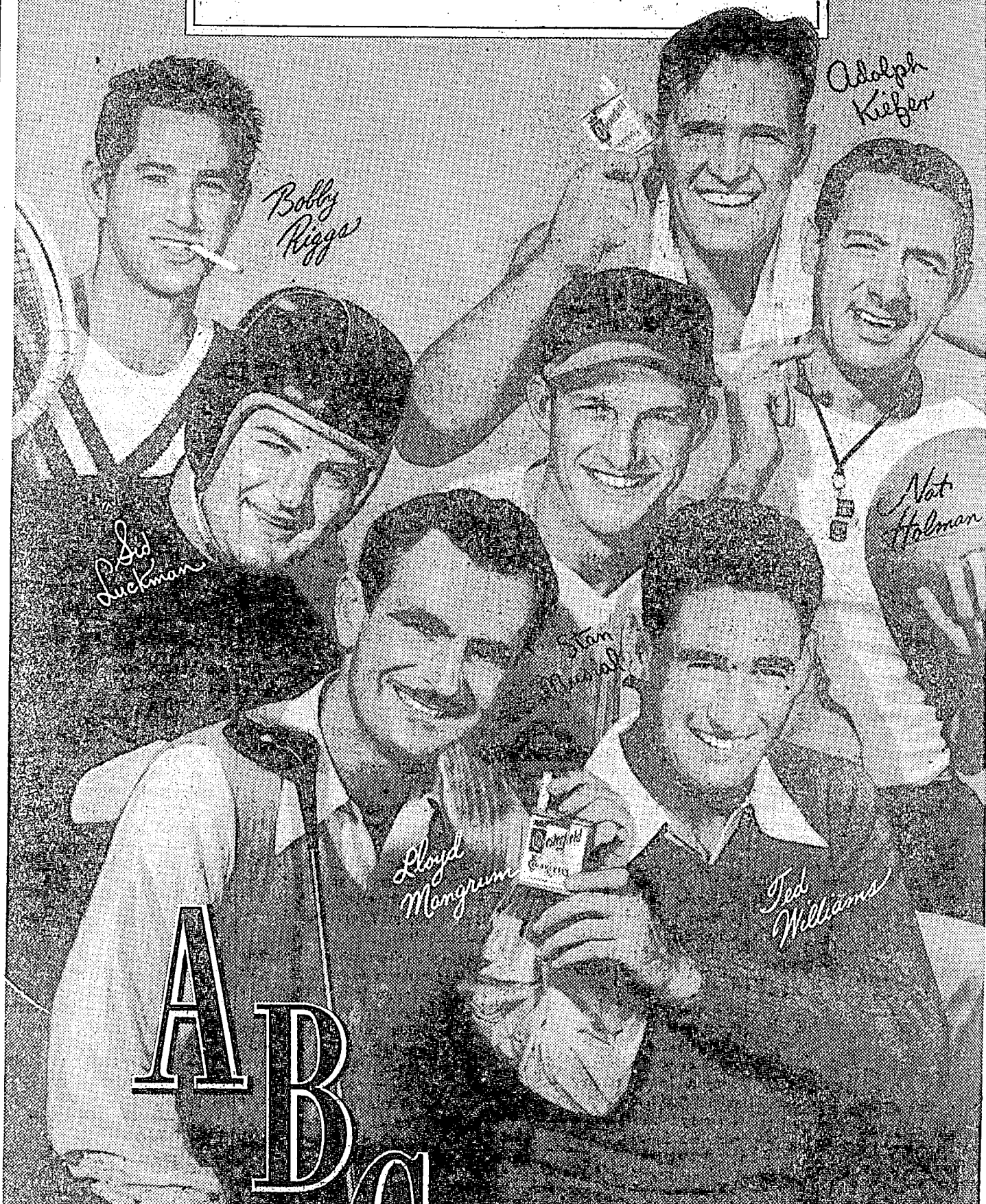

Dixie Howell's hard fighting Vandal eleven were overpowered 7 to 0 by a determined Cougar team at Neale stadium Saturday afternoon as 22,500 spectators watched the WSC gridmen hand Idaho its twentieth consecutive defeat in 22 years.

The Cougars made the only score of the game late in the second period with Jerry Williams hitting the end zone and Bill Lippincott making the placement to bring the score to 7 to 0 where it remained.

Will Overgaard started the game with his kick into the end zone which was taken to the WSC 18 by Jerry Williams. In the next play a lateral from Bill Lippincott to Jerry Williams took the ball to the 41. Idaho took over the ball on the WSC 40 when J. Williams fumbled a lateral from Lippincott several plays later.

In two successive plays, Wilford Beitz and Jerry Diehl took the ball to the 28 for a first down. There Billy Williams passing attack was knocked down by the Cougars and they took over the ball on their own 27. Their effective attack moved the ball up to their own 48 before the first quarter ended. Then the WSC team managed to power to the Idaho 31 before the Vandals took over on downs.

In the future veterans will be issued supplemental certificates of eligibility and entitlement only when the interruption resulted from a good cause and if the institution in which he was in training is willing to re-accept him as a student of trainee.

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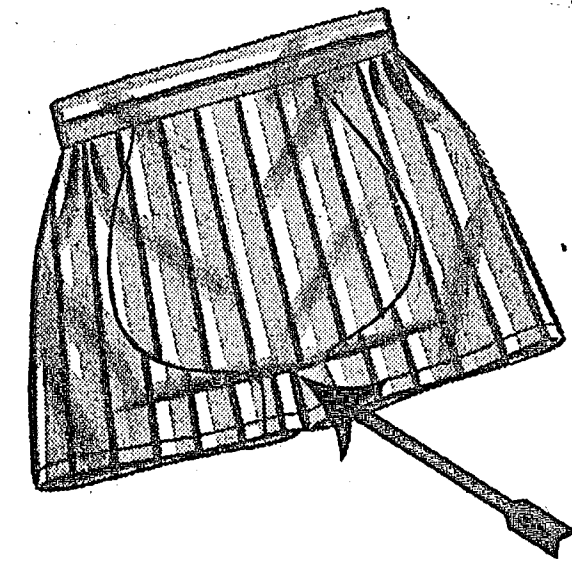
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
