## Underdog Vandals Will Battle Strong Beaver Eleven Tomorrow Idaho Prays For A Repeat Of Stanford Aerial Upset

Idaho's Vandals, with one win and one defeat on their conference record, meet the Oregon State Beavers tomorrow at Corvallis. The Beavers won their first conference tilt against a strong Washington team, 14 to 7.

After winning their conference opener against Stanford, the Idaho eleven dropped a close one to Washington State 7 to 0 Saturday. At Seattle the Beavers blocked a Husky kick from the two-yard line in the third quarter and it fell into the end zone. It was covered by Lorenz of Oregon State to give them the winning touchdown. Washington entered the game as the favorite.

Coach Dixie Howell sent his squad through a light workout yesterday afternoon before leaving for Corvallis. The team was scheduled to arrive at noon today and will limber up on the Oregon State field this afternoon. Dixie would make no statement on Idaho's chances but gave assurances that the "boys will give them both barrels."

**Strong Line**  
OSC's strong passing attack will undoubtedly be used against Idaho. In the Washington game they completed seven out of twelve attempts. The Beaver line is also very strong and could possibly give OSC the needed edge over the Vandals.

Bill Williams has been receiving extensive passing drills this week as his passing in last weeks game was not up to his previous record. The rest of the squad ran through heavy drills the first of the week in an effort to prepare them for the coming game. The varsity kickers have also been receiving plenty of attention.

Last year the Beavers pounded out a 34 to 0 win over the Vandals but this year's team with practically the same material under a new coach has proved itself to be much stronger opposition than the team that last year did not win a single conference game.

### Vandals Schedule Gonzaga Bulldogs In Hoop Opener

Under new Coach Charles (Chuck) Finley, the Vandal basketball team will open their season against the Gonzaga Bulldogs in Memorial gymnasium Tuesday, December 2, according to the cage slate released by Graduate Manager Gale L. Mix.

Idaho has scheduled seven pre-conference games before the Vandals travel to Los Angeles for a three-day, eight-team tournament under the sponsorship of the Helm's Foundation. Two other pre-conference games are on the schedule before the conference opener with Oregon State January 12.

After meeting Gonzaga the Vandals will meet the Montana Grizzlies, December 5 and 6 at Missoula. December 9 they will play the Eastern Washington College of Education at Cheney and arrive in Moscow to play host to Portland university on December 12. Montana then journeys to Moscow for two games, December 18 and 19.
