The contradiction to the preceding statement occurs in the social order by which our daily lives are lived. We have all of these modern facilities, cures and preventatives—except that our legal code is the same one which was founded hundreds of years ago. Consequently it depends upon the position of the accused, the amount of money possessed, or the influence he exerts, whether he is to be convicted or acquitted of a crime.

Not to be forgotten is the role law authorities play in finding the accused and presenting the evidence. There have been many instances of false testimony, trumped up charges,
