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# Library Displays

### Rare Books

First of the rare books given to the university by the late Jacob Monson of Grangeville went on display in the library Friday. The books selected for the initial showing contain artwork by Gustave Dore, famed 19th century painter.

Other valuable old books in the Monson collection include a large volume of the "The Complete Works of William Hogarth" with 150 steel engravings, "Travels in Upper and Lower Egypt" by C. S. Sonnini, published in London in 1800 and "Hyperion, A Facsimile of Keat's Autograph Manuscript."

More than 400 books are included in the collection which Monson left to the university in his will. He also bequeathed his 453-acre farm and stamp collection to the university.

### Dr. White To Teach Graduates At WSC

Dr. Elwood V. White of the forestry department, will teach a course in carbohydrate chemistry at WSC, according to word received from the office of Dean C. W. Hungerford.

Scarcity of carbohydrate chemists in the United States prompted the two schools to take this action. Since the majority of students enrolled in this course are at WSC, the class will be taught there with Dr. White taking Idaho students there in his car on the day of the class.

In introducing the Idaho professor to the unusual class at its first meeting Dean S. E. Hazlet, head of WSC's graduate school, said: "The State college of Washington feels particularly fortunate in being able to secure one of the outstanding carbohydrate chemists in the northwest. He is widely known in his field, and is a regular contributor to research journals."

The annual triangular tournament of the Northwest Division will be held December 12 and 13 at WSC with Idaho, Whitman and WSC participating.

At the meeting members voted to enter all future intermural competition.



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# Vandals Score Once As O.S.C. Wins With Flashy Passes And Fast Line

The University of Idaho Vandals, blessed with a bright, sunny day, returned to the practice field this afternoon to groom themselves for their Dad's Day tussle Saturday afternoon, October 18, against the University of Portland.

Last Saturday the Idaho team received their second loss of the season from a powerful Oregon State squad 33 to 6. Previous to that game Idaho had defeated the College of Puget Sound 27 to 7, and Stanford university 19 to 16 and lost to Washington State 7 to 0. The squad today said they hoped to get back on the victory trail against Portland.

Russ Moffett, Idaho Falls, and Grant Potter, Moscow, both received serious knee injuries in Saturday's play and may see the game from the bench according to Dr. Norman Jacobson, trainer. There were numerous other bruises but Coach Dixie Howell felt that all but Moffett and Potter would be able to work out.

### OSC Good

Dixie stated that OSC was the best football team he and the Vandals has seen this season. The Idaho forward wall stood up well against the bigger Oregonians, but power and speed told late in the contest.

The Beavers' strong line and aerial attack gave them the victory. The Vandals also displayed outstanding passing but were unable to gain through the stronger OSC line. An Oregon State fumble on their own 35 gave the Vandals their only score when they recovered the ball and passed their way across the goal in two plays. Jerry Diehl made the touchdown for Idaho.

### Played Well

Outstanding on the Idaho team according to Dixie were Paasch and Ambrose at center; Buoy and Kilsgaard at tackle; and Ballew and Smith at end. It was Smith's first game since he was hospitalized before the Stanford game with an infected shin.

In the backfield Howell said that Theis played a great defensive game, particularly in the last two periods.

Pass defense which showed weakly against Oregon State, will get plenty of attention this week. Pass offense will be shaken up and revised. The running game will get its share of attention too, Howell said.

### Scoring To Change Says Coach Butler

Coach Ken Butler has revealed that a new system of scoring for college boxers is being pioneered by the University of Idaho and San Jose State college.

The new method which is known as "circled scoring" is designed to eliminate fouling, poor decisions, and to allow spectators to know what the score is during the progress of the bout. A wall clock with two indicators will show the relative standing of the boxers at all times.

The new system stresses boxing for position instead of points, similar to the scoring used in intercollegiate wrestling. The winner is determined by the contestant who can hold his position in the center of the ring for the greater length of time.

If circled scoring is approved it will probably be introduced into the Pacific Coast and national tournaments, according to Coach Butler.
