Well-known as a concert pianist in the Middle West, Mr. Davidson gave many recitals and taught piano and allied music subjects overseas during his army service.

Coming ASUI dramatic production "Dear Brutus" portrays the whimsical humor of James M. Barrie.

"Dear Brutus," a fantastic dream play, dedicated to the proposition that the events of life are fore-ordained, first ran on Broadway in 1917. Leading roles were taken by William Gillette and Helen Hayes, one of her first characterizations.

J. M. Barrie, popular playwright, also writes novels and short stories. After ten years of writing Barrie had three plays running concurrently in London. "Peter Pan" probably Barrie's most famous play, is endeared to Americans through the charm of Maude Adams.

Realism dressed in the trappings of sly humor, fantasy, and sentiment, characterizes "Dear Brutus."

Veterans studying in schools and colleges under the G.I. bill must keep the veterans administration informed on changes of addresses if they wish to receive their subsistence checks promptly. All correspondence to the V.A. should include the veteran's full name, address, and "C" file number.

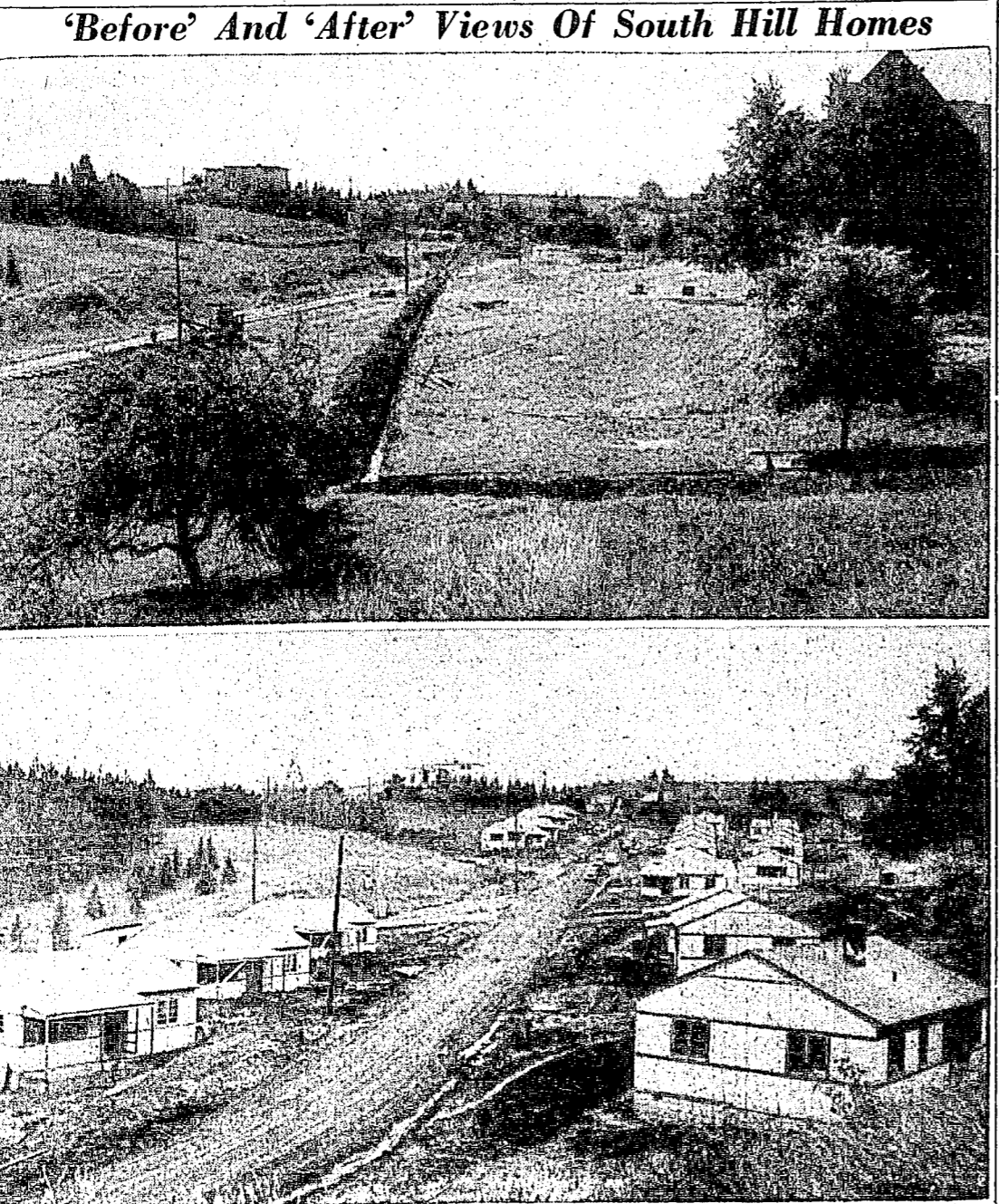
### Out-Of-State Students Again Admitted To University

Out-of-state students will again be admitted to the university beginning next semester according to an announcement this week from President J. E. Buchanan.

"The big veterans rush appears to be leveling off," President Buchanan explained, "and we appear to have met the Idaho non-veteran demand. With our increased housing facilities we believe we can resume our prewar policy of accepting our share of selected non-resident students."

Assisting in the selection of non-resident students will be the admissions committee, of which Dr. Boyd Martin, assistant dean of the college of letters and science, is chairman. Other members include Dr. Merrill Deters of the school of forestry and Prof. H. A. Winner, assistant dean of the college of agriculture.

Social consideration will be given to sons and daughters of Idaho facilities.

Ag Men Take Three Prizes In Pacific Livestock Show

An all-time record crowd of 200,000 people saw the University of Idaho carry off all three grand championships in the fat stock classes of the 37th annual Pacific International Livestock Exposition at Portland this month.

Not in any of the previous 36 years of the show has any single exhibitor had the grand champion fat steer, the grand champion fat barrow and the grand champion fat lamb.

A summary of the university's impressive winnings at the Portland show is reported as follows by C. W. Hickman, head of the department of animal husbandry:

Fat steers—Shorthorns. First junior yearling, first and second senior calf, first junior calf, first group of three steers, champion Shorthorn steer, grand champion steer over all breeds in the open classes, 4-H Club and Future Farmer classes.

The grand champion steer, Royal Clipper, was sired by the university herd bull, Killlearn Clipper Count, calved in September 1946, fed and exhibited by the university. He was bred by B. A. Lockhart of St. John, Wash., weighed 930 pounds, and sold for 71 cents a pound to Jim Valentine of Heppner, Oregon, and Carl Griest of Uniontown, Wash., who will enter him in the Grand National Livestock exposition at San Francisco, November 1.

Conference Opens For Discussion Of Swine Types

The sixth annual swine type conference, sponsored by the university department of animal husbandry opened Wednesday at the fairgrounds. Dean D. R. Theophilus welcomed swine men to the conference with an opening speech. Dr. G. C. Holm of the experiment station spoke on "Swine Sanitation and Disease Control," followed by an explanation of "The Importance of Nutrition in Swine Production," by Dr. T. B. Keith of the department of animal husbandry.

The swine judging contest and type discussion began at 1:30 under the direction of the following committee: Wade Wells, extension service, Boise; R. J. Hurni, Armour & Company, Spokane; R. E. Johnson, Washington State college, Pullman; Kenneth Butterfield, Chester White breeder, Princeton; Earl France, Poland China breeder, Gooding; and Roy Shutwell, Duroc breeder, Boise.

Afternoon discussions were on junior gilts, junior boars, and market hogs, followed by a carcass demonstration by Prof. W. P. Lehrer, Jr., of the university. The day's events were to conclude with a banquet for conference members and North Idaho Purebred Swine Breeders association at the Moscow hotel. Principal address was to be by Dr. Holm, vice-director of the experiment station.

Tomorrow the fourth annual north Idaho purebred swine sale will be held at the fair ground. Hogs will be shown at 10:00 a.m. The sale will be under the direction of Prof. C. W. Hickman, head of the department of animal husbandry. State-wide attendance is expected.

SUB Lounge Cleared

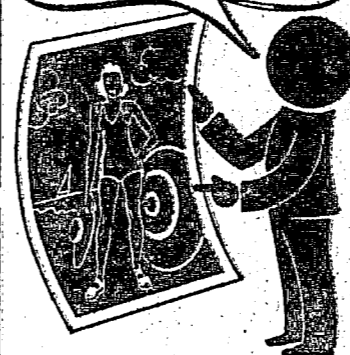

# Third Victory Hope Of Vandals For Dad's Day Grid Play

Idaho's Vandals hope to bounce back from their 33 to 6 defeat at the hands of Oregon State when they meet the Portland Pilots at Neale stadium tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

The Pilots, who have been defeated in all previous games, were walloped by the University of Nevada eleven 51 to 6 last Saturday while the Vandals were battling it out at Corvallis.

Dixie Howell's eleven enter the gridiron battle as 19 point favorites over the Portland team, but their chances for an easy victory may be considerably dimmed by injury to three of last week's starters on the Idaho squad. Rus Moffett, 195 pound quarterback from Idaho Falls and Grant Potter, 195 pound guard from Moscow, were both injured in the Oregon State game, and Carl Killsgard, 212 pound tackle from Bonners Ferry was injured during practice this week. None of the three will receive starting assignments in Saturday's game.

### Drops Four

Portland has previously been defeated by St. Mary's, Montana, Hawaiian All-Stars and Nevada. Idaho has won from the College of Puget Sound and Stánford, while dropping games to Washington State and Oregon State. Idaho marked up their only win of the 1946 season by defeating Portland 20 to 6.

The Pilots will bring a squad of 32 to Moscow including 17 lettermen. Their line will average 201 and the backfield 178. As in all previous games the Vandals will be outweighed. The Idaho line weighs 192 and the backfield 176.

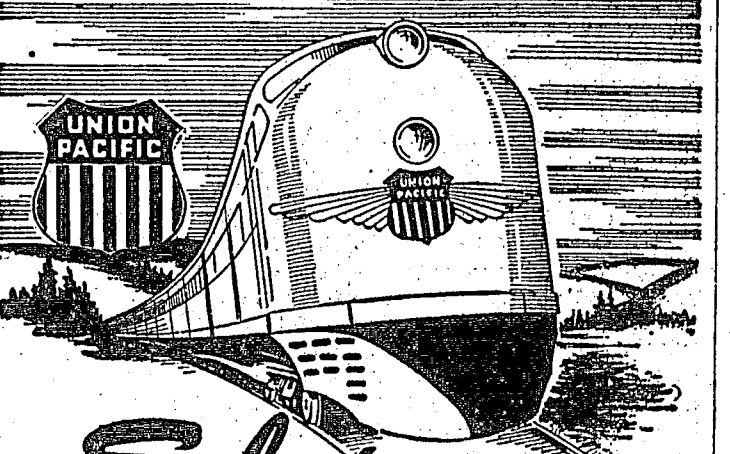
