The State of Idaho plus certain Eastern mining interests maintain the University of Idaho in the teeming, somewhat overcrowded city of Moscow. The university is Moscow's leading industry, which maintains a well recognized scholastically high average (strictly A and B), causing business men to swoop down upon its graduates begging them to fill soft jobs. The university's tradition is the training of her future citizens to their highest usefulness in private life, public service, and sometimes the maintenance of the local pubs.

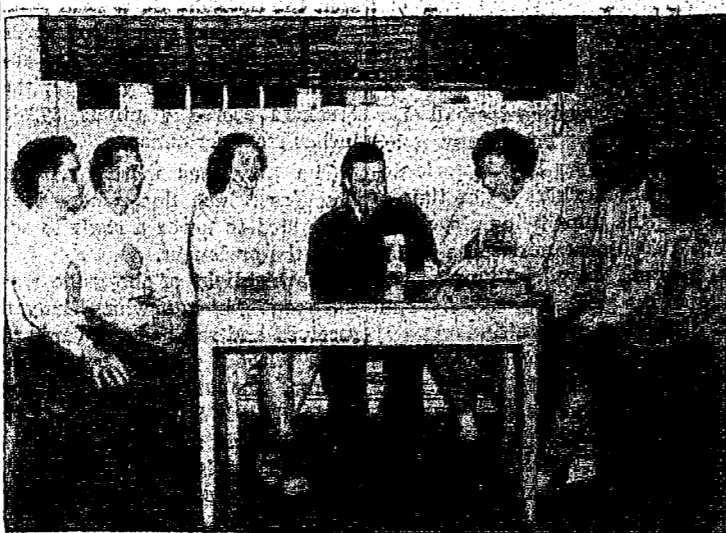

Industrial Organic Applications of Metallic Sodium



Sodium for organic reactions is shipped in 80,000-lb. quantities. It is pumped into the car, solidified by cooling and melted by hot oil for removal.

There would seem to be a considerable gap between the electrolysis of salt to make sodium, and research in the field of organic chemistry. However, at Du Pont as much emphasis is placed on organic research to develop outlets for sodium as on its inorganic uses.

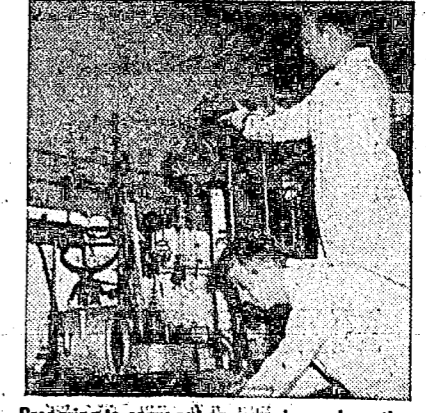

The discovery of the new reaction conditions has led to the use of millions of pounds of sodium annually for manufacture of long-chain alcohols for wetting and emulsifying agents and synthetic detergents.

Other important processes developed by Du Pont organic research include the use of sodium for reduction of fatty esters to corresponding long-chain acylolins, and reduction of nitriles to primary amines.

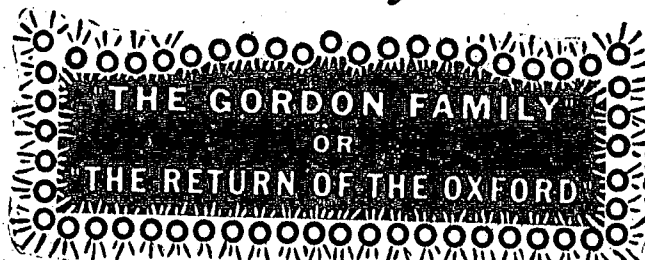

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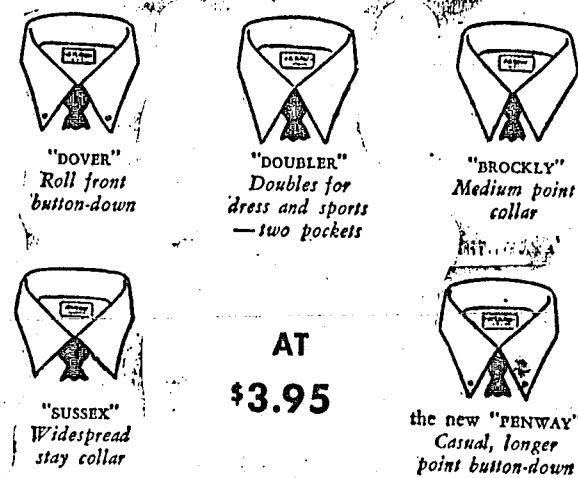

Foresters Beat Underground Farmers

In the outstanding football classic of the day, Paul Bunyan led his loyal charges in a historic defeat of the Muckers to the tune of 60 to 3; the game being played before 20,000 screaming fans at the Arboretum Bowl. Bunyan, the star of the game, accounted for all 60 of his team's points.

The Muckers lone score came in the waning minutes of the game (while the Home Ec. club was substituting for the Foresters who had retired to the woods for a short beer). The score came as the result of a misplaced air hammer

blow which landed on the ball and it covered 90 yards in the air to split the uprights for a field goal.

The Foresters furnished their own referees.

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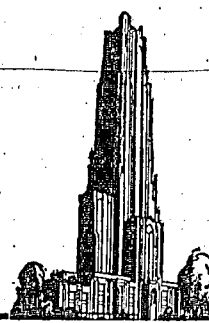
