Bird Census Shows Increase Of Ruffed Grouse In Area

A census of ruffed grouse taken in the university experimental forest by students of the wildlife management class has shown a slight increase over the number of birds found in the same area in 1946.

Under Kenneth Hungerford, instructor, each of the 18 forestry students making the trip was given a map of the area to be covered divided in small squares.

A strip of land running the full length of the selected plot was assigned each man. In a long line they moved through the forest marking on their maps the exact spot where each bird was flushed. The flight of the bird into the adjoining strip was charted, and the landing place if possible.

When the tract of land had been thoroughly covered, maps were compared to eliminate duplicate counts. In some instances the flight of a bird could be traced all the way across the census area, but the count was credited only to the man who originally flushed the grouse.

The final result of the survey showed a ratio of approximately one grouse to two acres. Hungerford explained that this result was not representative of the entire forest since he had taken the class to an area where there were certain birds would be found.

Self Styled Critic Has Own Views On 'Dear Brutus'

The faults that may have existed in the presentations of "Dear Brutus" Friday and Saturday lay in James Barrie's play and not in the technical production.

Barrie tried too hard to put across his points. The audience caught them the first time; by the third time the points became wearisome. Perhaps Barrie had not anticipated a university audience. It found the second act dragging, despite outstanding acting.

Bill Davidson lived up to expectations by playing a convincing Dearth that carried the audience's sympathies throughout the play. Bruce Stueck played a typical butler, Matey, and Dick Peterson did a creditable job as Purdie, the philandering husband.

Jack Rowe was a little too much like a character out of *Weird Tales* to be a lovable Lob. A haircut and a remedy for St. Vitus dance might have helped the role. If Guy Terwillinger would take a few more ballet lessons, he might crash the movies as a comic dancer. His part as Coade was all too short.

Mrs. Purdie was Polly Harris' first role in two years, but it maintained her standing as the top actress on the campus. Her discovery of her husband kissing Joanna Trout and her subsequent drawing of the drapes was one of the two most effectively done scenes in the play. The other was the climax, Dearth's realization that Margaret never existed.

Far-Eastern Correspondent

Hallett Abend has a vast store of information about the far East, which enables him to know how they feel about Russia. Abend was born in Portland, Oregon, and was educated at the University of Illinois and Stanford university. In 1927 he became chief Far Eastern correspondent for the New York Times in the Orient and covered guerrilla warfare, bombings, sieges and one civil war after another. Abend has more than a speaking acquaintance with the key officials of both China and Japan—among whom were Chiang Kai-shek, Tso, Konoze and Matsuoko.

Three months before Pearl Harbor, Abend made a 38,000-mile sweep of the Pacific area that proved to be vital in World War II. He visited Honolulu, New Zealand, Australia and the Philippines and from the invaluable information he gained he wrote a series of books on the Far Eastern situation. Later in 1945, Abend was selected by the Army to make a whirlwind tour of the arenas of action both in the Pacific and European theatres.

Subsistence Ends When Vets Leave School

Veterans enrolled under the G. I. Bill are urged by the Veterans Administration to notify them immediately when abandoning their training program. This will prevent subsistence allowance overpayments.

Any overpayments must be refunded to the government. Immediate or advance notice of training discontinuance will assist VA in reducing the amount of overpayments. Veterans will be spared the necessity for refunds.

Failure to make arrangements to repay subsistence allowance overpayments may prevent the veteran from re-entering schools or job-training courses under the G. I. Bill. Payment of government funds to persons indebted to the United States is prohibited unless repayments are arranged.

Overpaid veterans need only make arrangements for monthly repayments to qualify to resume their training.

Seventy-one years ago this month the first group of students to enroll in the University of Oregon went through the initial process of registration.

The total of 177 was divided into two groups, 80 of whom were of college grade, and 97 in the preparatory department. The original faculty consisted of five members, three professors and two women teachers. In those days, social life as it is known today on college campuses was nonexistent. Dancing was taboo, and the theatre was frowned upon.

A single injection of the vaccine at this time should offer protection against influenza during the coming winter months, according to Dr. Cramer.

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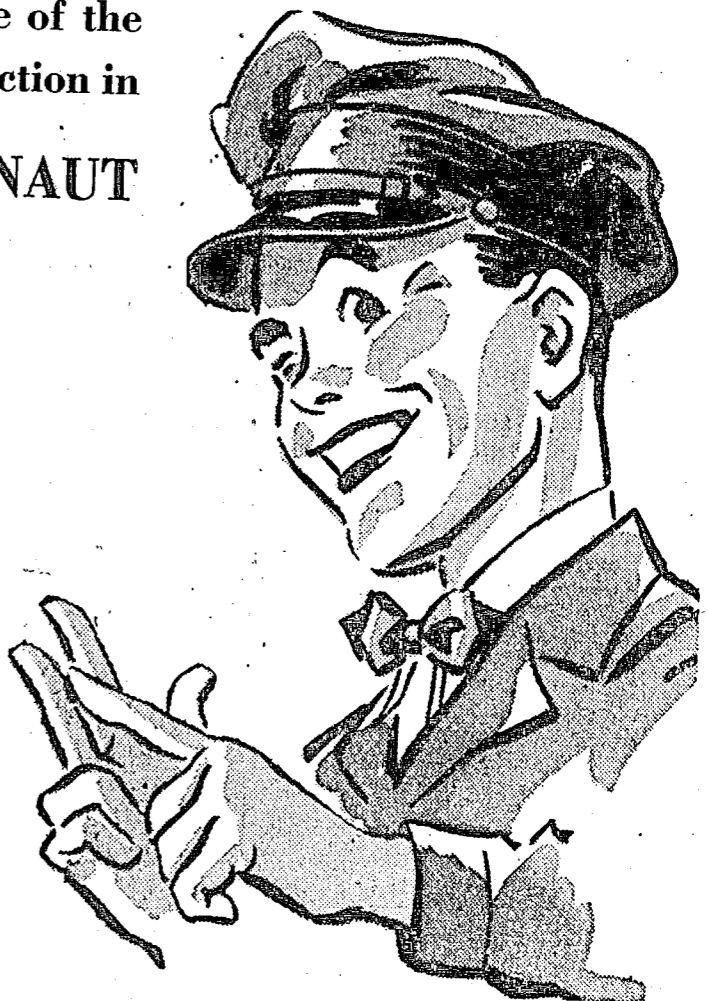
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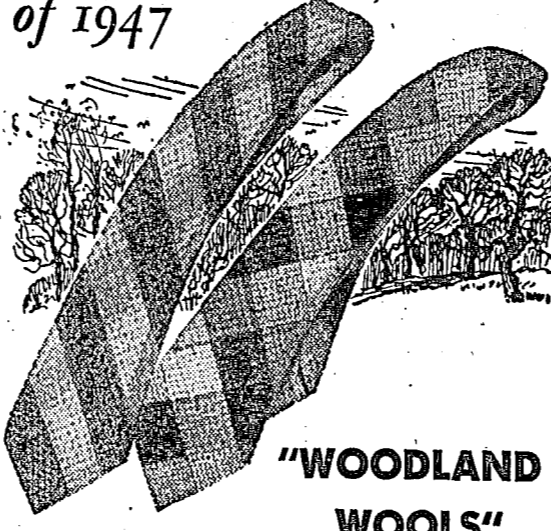
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
